at this new company, they here resumed work under the guidance of their architect, Mrs. Souby. Their newly chosen contractor, Miss Ewing, and their Chief Engineer, Anne Kirkpatrick, assisted them in their principal objective for the year - the construction of the framework of the house. The builders found the work to be more tedious than it previously had been, and they seemed to forget that the enormous weight of the whole structure would depend upon the strength of the framework as well as the foundation. This attitude is commonly known among more experienced laborers as the Sophomore Slump. During this period their difficulties were increased because of the remodeling of their new headquarters. They were thus forced to receive orders in an underground section of their future construction center, and for a few months they were employed for only a half day's time. However, they proved their fortitude through projects undertaken for the benefit of their newly attained quarters. Each builder gathered coat hangers to sell and contributed to a class cake sale. Although they were not yet qualified to participate in the annual Junior-Senior activities, they nevertheless enjoyed attending the festivities honoring the Lady of the Hall, the most outstanding senior worker. Their work was finally concluded at a gay celebration held at Gene Jarman's, to climax their accomplishments for 1952.

The autumn of 1953 found the builders again gathered at Harpeth Hall ready to begin work on the roof of their house. The group soon discovered that in order to complete this task satisfactorily, each girl would be required to assume greater personal responsibility than she had in the years before. To guide them through this year of progress, They selected Martha Grizzard as their Chief Engineer,
