# Alumna Gives Talk in Assembly

Mrs. Frederic Conover, the former Alene Wharton, '26, chose "A Summer in the Atomic City" as her subject when she spoke in assembly last fall.

A chemist by profession, Mrs. Conover worked with radio isotopes at the Institute of Nuclear Study in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, last summer while her husband was on a six months leave of absence from Vanderbilt University to do atomic research in an Oak Ridge plant.

She explained the nature of radio isotopes, the manner in which they are transported to and from the laboratories, and the use of geiger counters. Mrs. Conover also mentioned the use of radio isotopes in industry and medicine.

# Faculty Includes Ten New Members

Ten new members have taken their places on the faculty at Ward-Belmont. Among the group is an alumna, Miss Challie Thornton of San Antonio, Texas. Challie, an instructor of physical education, received a diploma from Ward-Belmont in 1948 and a B.A. degree from the University of Iowa last June. In addition to her classes, Challie is sponsor of the Tri K Club.

Others who have joined the faculty are Mr. Werner Zepernick, dean of the conservatory; Miss Marie P. Wilson, head of the home economics department; Mrs. Harry A. Hardison, assistant in home economics; Miss Juanita Byrd, director of the Y.W.C.A and instructor of religion; Miss Dorothy Lancaster, instructor of physical education; Mrs. H. M. Barton, instructor of history and Latin in the preparatory school; Mrs. Thyra Raeben, teacher of remedial reading; Miss Lisle Turner, instructor of chemistry and general science; and Mrs. Paul McKnight, instructor of English.

Before accepting the duties of the late Dean Alan Irwin, Mr. Werner Zepernick was head of the piano departments at Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois, and Eureka College, Eureka, Illinois.

The new dean began his musical education at the Conservatory of Bremen and made his debut with the Breman Symphony at the age of fourteen. Later he studied with the renowned European concert pianist, Eduard Erdmann, at the Staatliche Hochschule fuer Musik in Cologne and continued his studies with Leonid Kreutzer and Heinz Thiessen at the Staatliche Hochschule fuer Musik in Berlin.

After coming to America in 1931 as the first recipient of the International Exchange Scholarship offered by the Staatliche Hochschule fuer Musik in Berlin and the Chicago Musical College, Dean Zepernick received his M.M. degree from the Chicago Musical College. He also did graduate work at the University of Iowa and Northwestern. Dean Zepernick, a concert pianist of wide acclaim, has appeared with several European and American orchestras.
