2. Invitational, District and Regional Coverage

A. Permission to telecast, live or delayed, any part of any invitational, district or regional tournament in wrestling or basketball must be approved by the tournament director or tournament committee. (This does not apply to news coverage.)

B. If such permission is granted a fee must be charged the television station or each station connected by a network. The tournament director shall negotiate the fee with the television station. A minimum fee of \$200.00 must be charged per basketball game or per wrestling session to the television station or to each television station on the network.

C. All fees shall be considered as part of the gate receipts.

Fairley, Harpeth Hall Win CC Crowns

Chuck Brown and Tania Wells Capture Individual Honors

Chuck Brown of Sullivan East and Tania Wells of Memphis Melrose turned in record-shattering performances to take individual championships in the TSSAA State Cross Country meet.

Memphis Fairley copped the boys' crown with 76 points while the girls' title went to Nashville Harpeth Hall with 30 points. Nashville East finished second in the boys' team standings with 98 points followed by Memphis Harding with 109 points. Tullahoma was second in the girls' race with 56 points and third was Nashville Hillsboro with 97.

Brown covered the three-mile distance in 14:38 to defeat Darrell Clemmons of Memphis Westwood. Wells was timed at 8:02 in capturing the mile and half for girls. Tullahoma's Phyllis Hines was second.

Results Listed For Boys, Girls In Regional Cross Country

Memphis Fairley's boys' team and the Germantown girls captured the West Tennessee Regional Cross Country meets.

Fairley had 59 points to Harding Academy's 62 and 74 for MUS. Mark Porter of MUS was the individual winner in 15:08 and was followed by Darrell Clements of Memphis Westwood and Tim Isbell of Harding. Other individual qualifiers for the state were Frayser's Jimmy McClain and Hamilton's Terry Bynum.

Germantown scored 42 points to Jackson's Old Hickory Academy 49. Third was Memphis Frayser with 51 points. Tania Wells of Memphis Melrose won the girls' individual race in 8:18 followed by Glenda Valley of Catholic. Jennifer Russell of Catholic also qualified for the state.

Murfreesboro Oakland won the Middle Tennessee title with 117 points followed by Nashville East with 121 and Clarksville Northwest with 141. Nashville Harpeth Hall won the girls' crown with 29 points, Tullahoma was second with 42 and Nashville Hillsboro third with 87. McGavock's Jimmy Iddins was the individual champion in 15:16 followed by Van Wadlington of Brentwood and

Open Letter To Students, Faculty, Parents and Board Members

(The following is an open letter to students, faculty, parents and Board members of the Friendship Christian School at Lebanon, Tennessee. The letter is by Headmaster Leonard K. Bradley. Besides the two-page letter, attached was another page listing excerpts from the TSSAA 1976-77 Official Handbook. These excerpts are also included below.)

November 15, 1976

Open Letter To Students, Faculty, Parents and Board Members:

The Tennessee Secondary School Athletic Association each year presents **Honor Awards** to those member schools demonstrating unusual courtesy and sportsmanship to opposing teams, coaches and officials. I hope we can earn and display some of these certificates in our trophy cases at Friendship.

We are trying to teach our athletes to be Christians first, and athletes second. Good citizenship and good sportsmanship are necessarily encompassed in Christianity.

The TSSAA runs a "tight ship" and is in complete control of high school athletics in this state. They can penalize, suspend, or withdraw membership from any member school or can declare any player ineligible for further competition.

Saturday night at Webb School one of the officials threatened to report Friendship School to the TSSAA for unsportsmanlike conduct directed at the officials. This is most regretable and embarrassing. I happen to know that the warning and threat was justified because I heard enough during the games to convince me of that.

Yelling insulting remarks at officials during a game, not only is uncouth, it is stupid:

1. It endangers our standing with the Association.
2. It tends to prejudice officials against us (will the Webb officials want to work our games again?)
3. It encourages players to demonstrate unsportsmanlike conduct. (They cannot play their best when their minds are cluttered with ideas of retaliation.)
4. It sets the wrong example. (How better can we teach our children and students than by example?)
5. It embarrasses school officials and we are tired of being embarrassed. (Saturday night was not the first time our behavior

at ball games has been embarrassing.)

6. The efficiency of the officials is impaired. (They should be able to give full attention to what goes on **inside** the boundary lines.) Sure, officials make mistakes. They are human as are we. Most of them officiate because they enjoy it, not for the money they make out of it. They are, at best, not overpaid and their lot is not an easy one, especially in a hostile atmosphere.

The building of character has long been one justification for high school athletics. Is this just so many words, or should a Christian school stand in the forefront of those affirming this principle?

We have the finest students and parents in the county. We appreciate your support of all our programs but we have made mistakes. Let's endeavor to correct them.

The opening of our new gym last Friday night was a genuine success and a most pleasurable one. Thank you for your help.

Excerpts From TSSAA 1976-77 Official Handbook

ARTICLE IV

Section 2

It shall be the duty of a game official to file immediately a report with the state office if there is any unusual incident involving unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of players, coaches, cheerleaders, or fans.

Section 3

The Executive Secretary shall have authority to suspend or fine officials who are guilty of unsportsmanlike conduct at athletic contests, or who fail to file required reports immediately with the state office.

Section 6

Visiting teams shall be accompanied by the principal or someone designated by him.

Section 7 (second paragraph)

Member schools are responsible for the conduct of their own fans and students at every athletic contest, regardless of where it may be held.

The coach and principal of each of the schools participating

WHISTLE NOTES

TSSAA proudly presents the Distinguished Service Recognition to Mr. Buford Bible of Knoxville. Coach Bible not only was an outstanding basketball coach, but a dedicated teacher and educator. Coach Bible observed his team's line-up for more than 800 games during his span of coaching.

Coach Bible graduated from Carson Newman College with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. Following graduation in 1927, he began his coaching and teaching career at Lake City, Tenn., then called Coal Creek. While teaching there, he met his future wife, Reba Norman. They were married on June 1, 1928, only months after they met.

He continued his educational career at the University of North Carolina and completed his Masters Degree in administration and statistics at the University of Tennessee with an A average.

In 1930 he moved to Jefferson City where he taught math and coached at Jefferson City High School. While coaching, his team won the district tournament five years and finished fourth in the state in 1931. After leaving Jefferson City, Coach Bible took over coaching duties at Knoxville High School and continued to teach math. Except for a period of service in the Air Corps from August 1942, to July, 1946, Coach Bible completed his coaching career in 1962; but served as principal at East High School through the 1967-68 school year. He continues to teach as a math instructor for the University of Tennessee evening school.

Coach Bible had a hand in three state championships won by Knoxville High School. His 1938 team was runner-up to the state champions. In 1939,

Coach Bible's hard working effort paid off as his team won the title as State Basketball Champions. He predicted that his 1940-41 team would turn out better than the 1939 state champs and they went on to capture the state championship. The last Knoxville High team to win the state championship was the 1951 team which were runners-up in 1950 and came back to capture the state championship in 1951. His teams advanced to the state tournament six times in 11 years. They finished fifth in the state one year, second two years, and won the state championship three years. He always stated that dedication is the big thing in winning state championships.

In 1951, Knoxville High School was closed and Coach Bible was named coach and teacher of math at Knoxville East

High School. Among his many successful teams at East, one team which competed in the state tournament was composed of players who are now principals of high schools in Knoxville. Doc Simpson serves as principal of Knox-West High School and Frank Hall is principal of Knoxville Bearden High School. Other outstanding individuals in the Knoxville area who played under Coach Bible are Tommy Cannon, who serves as assistant basketball coach at Rule High School; Bob Frye, who is assistant principal at Knoxville Central High School; and Bill Wright, who serves as baseball coach at the University of Tennessee. There are many other individuals in the educational field, as well as, other professional fields who played for Coach Bible during his span of coaching.

In 1958, he was one of the two men chosen from Tennessee to participate in the filming of a National Federation basketball film entitled "Basketball for Millions". Coach Bible was chosen because of his outstanding coaching ability. He served as a technical director in the film which was made at Central High School in Shelbyville, Tennessee.

Coach Bible has served as a Sunday School Teacher and many other important positions at the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church where he is a member.

Among his many honors from the coaching field and educational field, one of his most honored and treasured tributes was the 1961 dedication of the school annual entitled "The Beacon". Also, the senior class paid him a tribute by having "This is Your Life".

Coach Bible has been termed as an extraordinary conversationalist. His wife states that even though summer school classes do not start until 8:30 a.m., he always likes to get there early to spend an hour or so talking with the custodian regarding world affairs. Also, no activity interferes with his morning visit to the Bayless Gulf Station where he meets with many other conversationalists to solve the world problems. Among them is Pat McGlothlin, ex-Brooklyn Dodgers pitcher.

Coach Bible states that he has watched basketball change over the years, but it has not altered his way of thinking. He has always maintained that you must run and shoot in order to win games.

TSSAA proudly salutes Mr. Buford Bible for his many years of outstanding coaching and dedicated work in Tennessee.

Girls' Rules Change

In girls' basketball a change has been adopted. Any time a center division line violation is called, the ball shall be put in play in front court at least three feet from division line.

State Basketball

The basketball that will be used during the TSSAA Girls' and Boys' State Basketball Tournaments this year will be a Spaulding. Many schools desire this information ahead of time as they may wish to adopt the state tournament ball for district or regional tournament play.

Basketball Interpretation

Comment: Newly revised basketball rules 10-11 Exception and 10-6(f) now permit dunking a basketball during a game. There has been no change in the rules to permit dunking prior to the

game or during any intermission. The Basketball Rules—Simplified and Illustrated Book as well as Case Book plays 10 through 20 in the Basketball Case Book further explain it is not permissible to dunk the basketball when it is dead. There is no conflict between the statements in the Rule Book and Basketball Examination—Part I question 37a or the Simplified and Illustrated Rules. It is a technical foul to dunk the basketball when it is no longer a live ball. Following are some illustrations which divulge when a technical foul would not be called for dunking a dead ball.

1. A1 driving toward the basket and contact ensues immediately prior to or as A1 is in the act of dunking. A1 continues the try and dunks the basketball.

2. A1 is in the process of dunking the ball and a foul is called off the ball on A2 or B1.

3. A1 is driving for a lay-up on a fast break. Crowd noise is such that A1 might not have heard the whistle blow when he or she is in the free throw circle. A1 continues and dunks the ball.

In each of these three illustrations A1 might not have known the ball had been declared dead; and, therefore, there should be no technical foul called for dunking a dead ball. Also note in these illustrations there were other individuals or circumstances involved out of A1's control. Another illustration when a technical foul should not be called for dunking a dead ball would be if A1 were to jump to dunk the basketball and B1 were to touch the ball in the cylinder or basket. In this illustration there should be no technical foul called should A1 follow through with the dunk. The ball should be ruled dead, since B1 touched the ball while in the cylinder, and two points should be awarded for basketball interference. Should there be a second party involved, such as B1,

Kirkman Wins First Volleyball Crown

Chattanooga Kirkman High School won the first TSSAA Girls' State Volleyball Tournament that was held at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro.

Coach Juanita Merrell's team ended the year with a 35-0 record. The only game that Kirkman lost in all 35 matches was in the first round of the state meet.

Kirkman beat Jonesboro Daniel Boone in the championship match 13-8, 15-7, after halting Knoxville South-Young in the semi-finals 15-10, 15-7. Boone reached the title match after stopping Chattanooga East Ridge 12-10, 15-9.

In first-round action Boone beat Memphis Harding Academy 15-7, 15-6; East Ridge beat Nashville McGavock 15-13, 15-3; South Young beat Memphis Bishop Byrne 15-4, 15-12; and Kirkman beat Nashville Harpeth Hall 15-8, 9-15, 15-1.

SUMMARY OF BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Hermitage, November 1, 1976

1. Approved the proposed football play-off sites.
2. Discussed proposals for regional meetings.
3. Appointed committee to make the draw for the State Wrestling Tournament.
4. Took no action on the request of Kingsport Dobyns-Bennett for TSSAA to sponsor girls' flag football.
5. Approved the decision of the Executive Secretary and to allow Elizabethton city schools to employ Susie Pansock Johns as basketball and volleyball coach for the remainder of this school year.
6. Ruled that John Hill shall be eligible in athletics at South Pittsburg High School for the school year of 1976-77.
7. Took no action on the recommendation of the State Basketball Committee that a registered official be appointed to serve on the TSSAA Board of Control as an ex-officio member.
8. Denied the request of Beech Bluff High School to participate in the district basketball tournament if the school is closed by a federal court order on Jan. 17, 1977.
9. Approved the previous interpretation of the Board that no action be taken on contracts with schools moving from a higher classification to a lower classification since all schools have previously been notified that all football contracts shall be placed on a two-year basis with contracts ending at the start of the new classification period.
10. Took no action on redistricting of basketball teams in Class AA and requested the Executive Secretary to place this item on the agenda for the Jan. 10, 1977, meeting.
11. Voted that Donna Gail Douglas be declared eligible to participate in athletics at Camden High School for the 1976-77 school year.
12. Took no action on the classification regulations and instructed the Executive Secretary to write a letter to schools whose enrollment will have a large increase beginning with the new classification period encouraging them to play in the classification their projected enrollment indicates.
13. Voted to allow the East Tennessee Regional Track and Field Meet to be held as a morning and afternoon meet at Tom Black Track at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville.
14. Voted to adopt Rule 4-4-4 and Rule 4-5-4 for the 1976-77 wrestling season.
15. Approved the request of Memphis Central High School that they be granted an exception to Article II, Section 13, for students enrolling for the first time in the enriched academic program set by the federal court at Central High School, and that this exception will be granted for this school year only.
16. Voted that the basketball contract between Clarksville High School and Henry County High School is a valid contract since it is signed by the principals of both schools. The forfeit fee would have to be paid by Henry County High School if the game was canceled without the approval of Clarksville High School.
17. Approved the interpretations for the football tie breaker procedure.
18. Ruled on the following hardship cases. (Complete summary of each case is in the minutes, and any school desiring information about any case may obtain the complete summary by writing the state office.)
 - Thomas L. Boyd (David Lipscomb High, Nashville)—Eligible
 - Ron Voss (Hixson High)—Eligible
 - Terry Scott Holder (Franklin County High, Winchester)—Ineligible

Track and Field Rule Changes

1-2-1 and 1-2-2: Specifies that the race course for distances run around a curve on a 400 metre track shall be measured 30 cm outward from the inner edge of the track (in lane one) when a raised curb is used and 20 cm when a painted line or any lane line is used.

1-2-3: Clarifies each lane shall be marked so that the left hand boundary line is **outside** the runners lane, and the right hand boundary line is **within** the lane.

2-2-2 and 7-2-7: Authorizes a finish tape of soft breakable material not wider than 2 inches.

2-3-8 and 9-3-9: Removes "throwing the baton" from an individual unsportsmanlike act to a team disqualification penalty.

3-3-5: If the course is round or oval, wind velocity is not considered when the distance of the event involves one or more complete laps (circuits) or if around one curve, equal portions of the race are run on both straightaways (as in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles).

4-1-1: A "Finish Line Recorder" has been added to the suggested list of meet officials.

4-2-3: Referee will note and call aloud, for the benefit of each runner, the laps remaining in individual races or relay lengths of **three laps** or more.

4-8-5: Measurements in the field events shall be to the nearest lesser $\frac{1}{4}$ inch or centimeter, except in the case of the discus, javelin, or hammer throws, distances shall be recorded to the nearest lesser inch or **even** centimeter.

5-3-2: A competitor who competes with an illegal uniform shall be disqualified from that event.

9-2-2: Authorizes the clerk, with the approval of the referee, to reduce the number of heats if the number of contestants to appear is not more than the number of available lanes.

RULE 11 — ORDER OF EVENTS — NOTE: The present order of running events shall be changed to the accepted metric distances in 1980. Schools building new, or refurbishing present track facilities, are encouraged to make accommodations for metric races.

1. The construction of the sector lines in the discus (1-4-4)
2. An unsuccessful trial in the pole vault or high jump (10-3-2 and 10-4-3)
3. The final authority to rule on an appeal (4-6-4 and 4-8-4)

Open Letter (Cont.)

in an athletic contest shall file a report immediately with the state office if there is any unusual incident involving poor sportsmanship, during or following the game, on the part of players, coaches, school administrators, game officials or spectators.

Section 8

The principal of each school, in all matters pertaining to the athletic relations of his school, is responsible to this Association. He shall exercise control over all finances, the scheduling of contests, and all other matters involved in the management of the school's athletic program. Any school whose athletic program is managed by a non-school group shall not be eligible to hold membership in TSSAA.

Information Needed On Tournaments

District chairmen and tournament directors for junior division districts, senior high basketball districts and regions, and wrestling districts and regions should notify the state office of tournament sites, dates and the name of the director. This will help facilitate shipment of tournament packages and trophies to tournament directors.

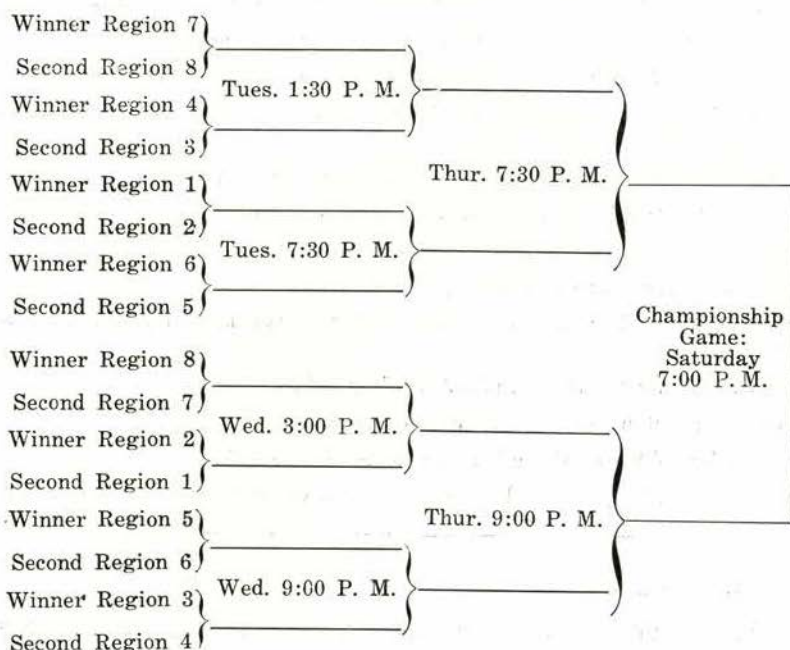

or other circumstances out of the shooter's control, then the officials might conclude the shooter wasn't knowledgeable the ball had become dead prior to dunking. On the other hand, if all action is created by the shooter, then the greater responsibility rests with the shooter in the event a dead ball is dunked. Illustration: A1 takes the ball off the board and while still air-borne dunks the ball. In this situation A1 has the full responsibility to know whether he or she touched the ball in the cylinder prior to or when gaining control. Should he or she touch the ball in the cylinder prior to or as control is gained and then dunk the ball, a technical foul should be called for dunking a dead ball.
