fall with the hockey stick she had been given when she left the campus in the spring. We carried on the tradition of hockey as soon as we had a field. We still have the George Washington celebration but now it is put on by the 7th grade with 8th graders representing George and Martha Washington. George still wears the costume from your day but Martha has a new one. But the old lavender Martha costume is still around. The yearbook is still the "Milestones" and when you visit the Ward-Belmont Room in Souby Hall you will see that I was able to get together a complete set to keep there.

Almost every building on the campus is named for someone associated with Ward-Belmont. This is the Frances Bond Davis Auditorium. Her son was instrumental in having this named for her. The other wing of the building is the Catherine E. Morrison Gymnasium. This was dedicated while Miss Morrison was able to be present. The Marnie Sheridan Art Gallery was named for a Harpeth Hall student whose mother was a friend of Sam McMurry's. The door to the chapel off the gallery is one of a pair which were the main doors to Ward Seminary. The other door is on the other side near the gym. This was my office until I retired. The story of these doors is in your packet. The entire complex is the McMurry Arts and Athletic Center and is named for Idanelle "Sam" McMurry, a Ward-Belmont graduate who was the second headmistress of Harpeth Hall.

The 6th grade building is named for Dorothy Cate Frist, a Ward-Belmont alumna and Harpeth Hall booster. The next building is the Daugh W. Smith Middle School. Dr. Smith was one of the men
