to me & I thank you a

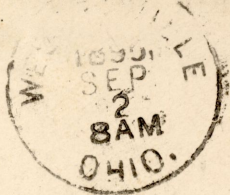
thousand times for the kindness I feel that you do a great deal more for me than you ought or than I deserve. I do not know how I can ever repay such kindness.
