and then conducted business sessions at Bloom Rose St

live in an undesirable house. I slept and took breakfast
at Jas. Runyan's then took train 7:59. Richardson has
over this trip. The forests are beautiful and the
scenery splendid. There are only four passengers
on our coach and three get off now but here comes a
school girl so I am not entirely alone. Farmers are
hustling with their work. I am to be with Allebaugh
and while tonight. I presume I will know about
trip to W. Va when I get to Porters.

Tomorrow is your birthday. In making my
schedule I tried to plan to be at home, but it meant
the delay of this long trip another week. There is no
way to estimate how much your life has meant to me and
I trust that you may have many more birthdays
whether I send a material present or not you know

that I am with you in thought, with people at our
age it is uncertain how long we may be permitted
to be together and I suppose it need cause us
no worry if only we fill the little niche of life's
program the best we can. I get pretty weary of this
constant going and the foolishness of a lot of people
but I suppose if people were all perfect there would be
no need of our efforts. I am deeply solicitous
that all four of the boys may make all that is possible
of their opportunities now. It was on this same trip 6
years ago that word came to me of the death of Theodore
going to the hospital. I trust that all yours will
meet you. If Bank sends notice about Paul's
note you had better pay the interest.
