about you, and often wished we
could vissent you but we dont
keep a horse and Daniel goes
on the train when he goes to
his other appointments, he,
has one at Lemon hill, and
one at oil springs, which
he fills the same day, and the
day he Preaches here he goes to
Brush creek in the afternoon and
home at night. now he is at home
the most of the time every week.
If you will stop here in the
evening, at south Gilo station
you can find us just a short way
from the station, west, on the hill

or if you come on the morning
train that stops at 9 A.M. you
stop at the other station it is
farther away but people can
tell you where we live, in the U. B.
Parsonage close the church. (you can
stop at 9 A.M. and a train leaves
here at 2 P.M. and 5 in the eve-
ning. We would be pleased any
time to have you both come and
