Marathon... Portage

Once state troopers thought he was dead, and flat tires combined with sore knees to make the going tough.

But 28-year-old Bruce Harris kept on praying and pedaling to complete more than 2,600 miles to his new home in Castro Valley, Calif.

Harris, the eldest of eight in the family of Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Harris Jr. of Shalersville Township, left his family's home June 7 on the two-wheeled westward journey. Although stops along the way delayed his arrival until July 23, he averaged 92 miles a day on his bicycle during the 29 days and 90 minutes of actual travel.

The trip completed a six-year-old dream for Harris, who wanted to test his endurance. He succeeded, although the

pedaling helped him shed 20 pounds.

The experience also had a spiritual significance.

"I'm a Christian and I wanted to get alone with the Lord," said Harris. He has taken up residence at Heritage House, a church-sponsored facility in Castro Valley. Harris also is working as a custodian at a nearby church. Harris cycled six days a week and took Sundays off to attend church when there was one to be found in the town he was in.

The trip had its high and low points in more than one sense.

One day of his five-day mountain riding leg, Harris traveled over Colorado's Trail Ridge — a 12,183-foot peak. The mountain tour, which he originally allowed a week to accomplish, also took him over Milner Pass (elevation 10,758

feet) and Rabbit Ears Pass (9,426).

Yosemite National Park's Tioga Pass offered the challenge of a 6 percent grade on the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

A 96-mile stretch of desert between southern Utah and Nevada tested his endurance in 110 degree temperatures.

"I carried about two gallons of water and I drank it all," Harris said.

"There was nothing but desert between the two points. Everybody back east thinks there's nothing out there but sand, but I thought the desert was really pretty in the early morning."

During the beginning of the journey, Harris stayed overnight in an abandoned Indiana park where a report of a fight led state troopers to believe he

was dead.

Torrential rainstorms in Iowa interfered with his progress, and tendonitis began plaguing his knees during the final miles.

Nevertheless, Harris looks back on the trip as a healthy accomplishment and boost for his spiritual awareness. He also met some genuinely interesting and benevolent people.

When he got to the halfway point at Greeley, Colo., Harris had two flat tires, 13 cents and sore knees. The townsfolk responded with help — arrangements for temporary lodging, medical help and odd jobs to earn money for the rest of the trip.

In Tonopah, Nev., Harris met another Buckeye State cyclist heading east. The east-bound Ohioan, Kevin Hawke,

was homeward bound for Springfield. Harris also was treated to dinner by the mother of another cross-country cyclist.

Tonopah also was significant to Harris, for his log shows it as the beginning of a 135-mile cruise, his biggest day.

Harris kept contact with family members in Portage County by telephoning regularly to let them know where he was. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Harris Sr. of Ravenna, traced his progress on a map he left with them. His other grandmother, Achsah Hoise of Ravenna, also shared in the excitement of Harris' successful trip.

"He's kind of a survivalist," said Harris' father. "We're pretty thrilled that he's accomplished it."

Harris graduated from Gar-

field High School in 1972 and spent four years with the Air Force. During his military hitch he was stationed in Thailand, where he jogged, rode a bicycle and did voluntary work with local missionaries.

After attending a bible college in California after his discharge from military service, he returned to Ohio where he attended Kent State University. Just two years shy of an accounting degree, Harris plans to establish residency and complete degree work at the University of California.

The most ironic part of the journey came after Harris arrived in California. While riding near his new home, he collided with a car that pulled out in front of his bicycle.

The only thing hurt was his pride.

Frances Harris Dies In Hospital

Miss Frances Harris, 29 W. Lincoln-av, Westerville, prominent in music circles and a teacher at Otterbein College 27 years, died Friday at Doctors Hospital.

Miss Harris, who was 48, had been ill for several weeks of cancer and had undergone surgery.

For a number of years Miss Harris, a member of the Otterbein College music department, had been head of the piano section. She was organist for the First Evangelical United Brethren Church at Westerville for 26 years.

She leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Harris of the residence; a sister, Mrs. Ethel Wertz, Akron; two nieces and two nephews.

Friends may call at the Frank E. Hill funeral home, Westerville, after 2 p. m. Saturday. Services will be at 2 p. m. Monday in the First EUB Church. Burial will be in Otterbein Cemetery.

Minister Who Married Willkie Was Native of Plantsville

Rev. Joe Harris and wife, formerly Miss Bertha Lambert, and their two sons, Rev. James Harris and Richard Harris, a teacher, all of Columbus, were calling on relatives in Chesterhill and Plantsville vicinity, Saturday. Mrs. Harris, is a sister of the Rev. Ira D. Lambert who was the officiating minister at the marriage of the Republican presidential nominee. Mrs. Eva Worthington and the Edgerton family are relatives of the Lamberts. In the twinkling of an eye, the nomination of Wendell Willkie for president, brought a former Plantsville resident into the lime light and across the fields from Plantsville, in a neighboring Quaker village, has caused some complicated comments such as: "Well, I went to school with Ira Lambert." "Ira Lambert! I knew him well." "Ira Lambert is a cousin of my mother." "Indeed! Ira Lambert was my old beau," etc. Ira Lambert was the son of Daniel Lambert and wife, and was born and raised on a farm near Plantsville. He became a minister in the Presbyterian church when a young man, and in 1918 was pastor in Elwood, Ind., the home town of Wendell Willkie and Edith Wilk at the time of their marriage. Later, Rev. Lambert returned to his native state and is now at Dresden. Sunday morning, following the nomination of Willkie, Rev. Lambert was leaving his church after the services; he was confronted by news reporters who wanted to know the details of the Willkie-Wilk wedding. Rev. Lambert replied that he had other appointments and didn't have time to talk. However, he recalled that the day of the now famous wedding was a bitter cold, January day and the young bridegroom, in being transported from an officer's training camp, back to the home town to claim his bride, had both ears frozen and the flowers he had brought for the wedding. Frozen ears and frozen flowers was a price to pay for three letters added to a name that day. Your Name HARRIS?

DO YOU KNOW THAT:

HARRIS, and its equivalent Harrison, are among the commonest of English surnames. Their meaning is literally "Harry's son." Harry is the familiar form of Henry which, in turn, is of Saxon origin and is derived from "ham" and "ric" signifying respectively "home" and "ruler." It is interesting to note that the English kings named Henry were generally known as "Harry" to their subjects, a circumstance that gives royal significance to HARRIS and accounts in a large measure for its popularity. It is also said by some authorities on nomenclature that, when of Scottish origin, HARRIS was first bestowed upon residents of the district of HARRIS in the outer Hebrides Islands.

ISAAC HARRIS (1746-1836) and JOHN HARRIS (1754-1838) served as captains respectively in the Massachusetts and Pennsylvania troops during the Revolutionary War. The latter's home was near Valley Forge and it was a haven for soldiers of all ranks when the army was wintering there.

Numerous histories of the HARRIS family have been published. One was compiled by Joseph S. Harris of Philadelphia in 1908; another by Mary Letitia Chalmers of Philadelphia in 1895; and still another by Charles B. Harris of Cleveland in 1922.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER HARRIS (1849-1909) was United States senator from Kansas.

JOSEPH HASTINGS HARRIS, a native of Plantsville, Morgan county, Ohio and a distinguished scientist, was professor and head of the department of botany, University of Minnesota at the time of his death.

EVERETT EARL HARRIS was ordained to the ministry of the United Brethren in Christ in 1914, served in various pastorates in Ohio, including Crooksville, was editor of The Watchword from 1942 to 1946 and is now editor of The Telescope Messenger.

RINGLAND HARRIS, general, U. S. Army, G. H. A. is chairman of the executive committee Trust.

Dr. J. A. Harris, U. Botanist, Dies; Services Today

Scientist Came to Minnesota In 1924 to Head De- partment

Funeral services for Dr. J. Arthur Harris, head of the botany department at the University of Minnesota, who died Thursday afternoon at the Midway hospital in St. Paul, will be conducted at St. Mathews church in St. Anthony park at 2 p.m. today. Burial will be at Hillside cemetery.

Dr. Harris, who held a prominent place among the botanists and statisticians of the United States, underwent an operation for appendicitis early in the week and complications set in. He failed to rally after a second operation Thursday.

Teaches in N. Y.

Born in Plantsville, Ohio, September 29, 1879, Dr. Harris was the son of Jordan Thomas and Ida Ellen Harris. In 1901 he graduated from the University of Kansas and a year later received his master's degree at the same institution. At Washington University in St. Louis he received the degree of doctor of philosophy.

He remained at Washington University for some time teaching and serving as librarian of the Missouri botanical garden. Called in 1907 to the station of experimental evolution of the Carnegie Institute at Cold Springs Harbor in New York, he remained there until 1924. He left there to head the botany department at the University of Minnesota.

Wrote for Periodicals

Included in the number of learned societies of which he was a member are: American Society of Naturalists, Botanical club of America, "Torrey Botanical club," Ecological Society of America, American Statisticians' association, Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine, American Meteorological society and Sigma Xi.

Dr. Harris was a frequent contributor to scientific publications and was the author of a work entitled, "Biometric Study of Basal Metabolism in Man." The Weldon medal and memorial prize from the University of Oxford was awarded him in 1931.

Dr. Harris is survived by his wife and four sons, James, Alanson, Daniel and George.

PERSONAL NOTES

James Arthur Harris

Dr. J. Arthur Harris, Professor and Head of the Department of Botany in the University of Minnesota, passed away on April 24, 1930, after a very brief illness.

Born in Plantsville, Ohio, on September 29, 1880, he early moved with his family to Kansas where, during his boyhood, he was associated with pioneer conditions that had a very profound influence on the rest of his life, for he became a pioneer of indomitable spirit in scientific work until the day of his untimely passing.

His studies as an undergraduate were pursued under the care of the faculties of Kansas University. At the age of twenty-one years, he had taken his A.B. degree and had to his credit four worthy publications. The latter are stimulating in the glimpses they give of his very keen power of observation and rational deduction at that early age concerning natural phenomena. His love for an understanding of natural laws ran sufficiently deep to make every observation of great value, and he quickly grasped the importance of the description of variation in quantitative terms. It became his chosen life task within the next few years to attempt to help place Biology alongside of Physics and Chemistry in the ranks of the so-designated "exact" sciences. He pursued this course with untiring energy, and against very heavy opposition in the early days when many another lacking his conviction, his courage or his industry would have given up the ideal in disgust.

His first professional appointment was that of Assistant Botanist at the Missouri Botanical Gardens from 1901-03. During that period he completed the requirements for his A.M. degree at Kansas University (1902), and in 1903 received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy at Washington University. In 1904 he accepted the responsibilities of Librarian at the Missouri Botanical Garden which position he held until 1907, when he became Botanical Investigator to the Station for Experimental Evolution of the Carnegie Institution at Cold Spring Harbor. From 1903-07 he also combined an Instructorship in General Biology at Washington University with his other work.

As the opportunities and facilities for the pursuance of his research broadened, so did his tremendous energy intensify and his scientific writings increase in number and power. Paying computing assistants to the limit of all he could spare from his own salary in addition to those available to him from his research budget, he himself spent long and weary hours computing on his Brunsviga. Finding himself physically capable of working thirteen hours a day, nothing could excuse him from that period of devotion *per diem* to his labors.

A lover of the quantitative and precision of description in biological work, he nurtured a profound admiration for Karl Pearson, whom he regarded as "the Giant of our time in Biological Science." In 1908-09 he availed himself of an opportunity to carry his studies to within the walls of the Galton Laboratory. Those days enriched his enthusiasm for his work in a very high degree. He retained till his death his veneration for the mind that had so inspired him in his biometric work, and passed that feeling on to his students.

In 1921 he was the honor to receive the Weldon Medal and Weldon Memorial Prize from the University of Oxford.

In 1924 he was called to the post he held at the time of his death. His coming to the University of Minnesota proved to be one of the richest gains in the history of that institution. The progress of the development in teaching and inspired diligence in research in the Department of Botany remains a tribute to his keenness of judgment,

OBITUARY

Nancy Work Harris was born near St. Clairsville, Belmont county, Ohio September 1, 1819, and died April 4, 1910, aged 90 years, 7 months and 3 days. She was the daughter of David Work, who died in Belmont county, and Theodate Todd Work, who with her family, came to Morgan county, Ohio, when the deceased was a small child and settled near Pennsville, where they lived for many years. Three brothers and two sisters passed away many years ago. She was married to Watson Harris, of Jefferson county, Ohio, April 9, 1835. To this union were born seven children, five boys and two girls. Of these there are now living: John Work Harris, of Mt. Hermon; George K. Harris, of Athens; Charles Harris, of Prosser, Washington and Mrs. W.E. Marquis, of Trimble. Two sons, William, of Plantsville and Leander, of Athens, and one daughter, Jane have preceded her to the better land. She had lived to number as her descendants, forty-five grandchildren, seventy-eight great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren, a record of which she was justly proud. Sixty years ago the family settled near Mt. Hermon on what is still known as the Harris farm, although of recent years occupied by strangers. The death of her husband in 1871 made it impossible for her to live on a farm and since that event she had lived with her children, in whose homes she has been a welcome inmate. She united with the M. P. Church when about 26 years of age and since then has been a consistent and active member of that denomination. She possessed a pleasant personality, was always patient and cheerful and having lived a useful life, in full possession of her faculties, after a short illness, she fell.

He entered the service on February 25, 1864 at Marietta, Ohio and he was mustered out on July 27, 1865 at Wheeling, West Virginia.

LEANDER HARRIS, was born in Morgan County, Ohio February 22, 1841, and when nine years of age came to Bern Township, Athens County. June 22, 1861, he enlisted in Company D, Fourth Virginia Infantry, and served three years. The first eighteen months he was in a number of skirmishes in West Virginia; afterward was in battles of Jackson, siege of Vicksburg, Resaca, Mission Ridge and Dallas. He was discharged July 8, 1864, two days before the battle of Kennesaw Mountain. He was married April 9, 1865, to Sarah E. Holdcroft, a native of Athens County, December 15, 1845. They have had eight children, only six now living --- Arza E., born March 31, 1866; Vesta Viola, born January 24, 1868; Addie V. born February 13, 1870, died June 1, 1871; Ruth E., March 16, 1872; Fannie E., born February 28, 1874; Augusta, born July 25, 1876; Flora B., born March 13, 1879, Died June 13, 1880; Georgianna, born September 21, 1882. Mr. and Mrs. Harris are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Mr. Harris is a member of Savannah Lodge, No. 466, F. & A.M. Mr. Harris came to Stewart in April 1876, and now has a pleasant home and good trade.
