This visit seemed so very real to me; doubtless because we were meeting each other now and then just as we would be likely to do in home life [i.e.] working together, only I hope you may never have so much work to do as you have had for a few days. I will try to meet the fellows here today and then will likely go to Marietta Monday, but perhaps you had better send mail to Athens and then it will be forwarded; or if having company you are too busy to write you might wait until I go to Marietta, but I can't think of waiting very long so if you have

opportunity to write tomorrow you might
do so and it will be forwarded at once.

I hope you may have a nice time during
commencement, and then I think you ought
to take a wk. or more to be just as lazy
as you can be, not studying a bit.

cream. I wanted to look for her yesterday, but
