












VARSITY ECOLOGY TEAM


ACADEMIC TEAM

ACT Assessment

The best indication of how well you will do in college is a measure of how well you can perform the skills necessary for college coursework. The ACT assessment measures these four skills in four major curriculum areas: English, mathematics, reading, and science reasoning. These areas are tested because they include the major areas of instruction in most high school and college programs.

Many college and scholarship agencies recommend that students take the ACT during the second semester of their junior year. By this time, students typically have completed most of the coursework covered by the ACT. There are a number of advantages in taking the ACT during the spring of your junior year:

* You will receive test scores and other information that will help you plan your senior year in high school;


* Many colleges begin contacting prospective students during the summer before the senior year;

* If you don't score as well as you believe you can, there will be opportunities to retake the ACT in the early summer or fall of your senior year and still have the new information available to meet admission and scholarship deadlines.
