


JOAN HANNOLD



MAE THOMPSON



Class History

In the fall of 1939 some 20 little monsters started on a great adventure, namely they were entrusted to the care of Miss Thompson, who was, and I might add, still is the first grade teacher at Kinsman Public School. Among those gentle (?) children were Maryelen Shaffer, Carol Myers, Barbara Mathews, Keith Bower, Wendell Panak, Joyce Jewell, Mae Thompson, and Marvel Sisley. The aforementioned were therefore throughout their school days old veterans of Kinsman and always initiated new members with glee and a superior air. To five and six year olds, that year was full of never ceasing wonders. One of the first lessons was--"Don't be a me-first!", which advice, I am afraid, was not



very well followed by them that year. Taking part in operettas, building play-houses (the work done mostly by Mr. Noble the janitor) making stuffed animals, drawing self-portraits, and displaying artistic abilities by disfiguring other objects; also along that line, making clay figurines, and building snowmen (the latter our own idea) filled the year to overflowing and perhaps served as a vocational guidance course, who knows?

The next year, as second graders, we followed much the same path, with the exception that there were two ladies work-

ing to drive knowledge through the tiny, but dense heads. They were our old friend, Miss Thompson, and a new arrival, Miss Stephens. There was also a Halloween party, with all the grade school masking, and afterwards eating doughnuts, sandwiches, and cider; and again at Christmas there was a party plus an enormous tree and an exchange of presents. On Valentine's Day there was a big letter box and an improvised post office where one could mail his valentines, and several mail carriers, appointed by the teacher, delivered them. Thus, one more year ended happily.

In the third grade, we added making all kinds of scrapbooks to our list of activities. The teacher was again Miss Stephens, who did a good job of teaching us to recite poetry in unison.

During our fourth year of school, Dick White and Elsie Carmichael joined the class, and we caused Mrs. Allen many a headache for it was in that year that many of us started on band instruments (and continued band work through our senior year) and were out of class as much as two or three times a week. But when she listened to Barbara Mathews, as drummer; Wendell Panak, also drummer; Maryelen Shaffer on trumpet; and Keith Bower as clarinetest, she realized that it was worth while. That was the year Mr. Demintez organized us with a few others as a junior band, and we were very proud when we participated in the concert with our own little group. The rest of our spare time was spent in playing Chinese Checkers and other games.

Sometime during our fifth year of school, Lucille Camp and Joan Hannold decided that Kinsman would be a nice place to finish school and so, being 10 years old, joined our class. The members of the junior band of the year before became senior band members which greatly pleased them. Mrs. Brooks, who is the only other grade school teacher who is still in Kinsman was the teacher that year along with Mrs. Allen. Another honor came to one of the members of the class - Maryelen Shaffer was chosen for the main part of the operetta as the fairy queen. When all of us heard that we had passed into the sixth grade a sigh of relief came over us, only one more year downstairs1

Having discontinued spelling bees, we started competing for the title of best writer in the class. Almost three-fourths of the class received writing specimens stating that we were excellent penmen. This pleased Mrs. Brooks immensely. A play was given that year for our mothers and the five lower grades. It was a fairy tale complete with costumes. Cast as King was Keith Bower; Prince, Wendell Panak; Queen, Maryelen Shaffer; and Princess, Lucille Camp. All other members of the class also took part and everyone had a good time getting out of class to practice for it. Another theatrical performance was given in the Christmas Operetta that year by Wendell Panak, as one of the bad elves, and Joyce Jewell, Mae Thompson, and Carol Myers as good fairies.

As seventh graders we moved upstairs with admonitions still ringing in our ears that life would be harder there. However, with more freedom to roam about, we found life easier until the fateful day that we received our first report cards. Here we also found that classes were organized and so we elected Elsie Carmichael, president; Mr. Jones, advisor; and a secretary, treasurer, and vice-president. Dues were set at one dollar per person. Miss Brown was our home-room teacher, and we spent many a delightful hour listening to her interesting stories. The band under Mr. Suchanek, also a new teacher, went to Kent District Contest and received a "one" rating. The boys who went out for basketball also had fun playing games with neighboring towns. The girls took part as cheerleaders. Our first class parties took place that year, and we played in the gym and then ate downtown with a movie afterwards. We had our own chorus that year and the next, and it was a splendid one, too.

When we became eighth graders, one new member was added, Henry Innocenzi. We

reorganized the class, choosing Keith Bower, President, and Ward Banning, advisor. Those were about the only changes made that year with the exception that dues were lowered to 25 cents because of our financial situations. We sang carols for the grade school operetta.



The first real year of high school brought along lots of new class-mates. These consisted of Laura McMillen, Rhys Ford, Edgar Papp, and Clair Knepper. We kept the same president and the same advisor. Miss Fitts became our new home-room teacher. The band renewed its claim as a top band at Kent and went on to Columbus to spend a weekend and become top in the state, Solo players consisted of Marvel, Lucille, Keith, Wendell, Maryelen, Joan, and Barbara. It was our first year in the high school operetta, which was "Belle of Barcelona." Everyone in the class took part in the chorus of Spanish students. One thing mustn't be forgotten, we were initiated properly by the upperclassmen. Marvel and Barbara did very well on the softball team as did Elsie and Carol. In boys' sports, Dick and Rhys played on the baseball team, Dick and Keith were on the varsity basketball team, and Rhys was on the reserves. Edgar, Henry, and Wendell were substitutes. Carol and Marvel proved that they could be capable cheerleaders as well as softball players.

No longer greenies, but Sophomores, we welcomed Beverly Reed to our class. Rhys was made the new president, Mr. Banning, still the advisor. Once again Marvel and Barbara were catcher and pitcher for the girls' softball team, which won every game. Carol and Mae played as substitutes. Dick was catcher, Keith first base, and Rhys center field and pitcher for the boys' baseball team. They won 60% of their games that year. Basketball was not so good as all games were lost, but the team worked hard. Rhys, Dick and Keith were on the Varsity, Edgar and Henry on the Reserves. The latter team won 6 of their games. Marvel and Carol resumed their job of being excellent cheerleaders. Keith, Clair, and Rhys, the last a blackface, received parts in the operet-

ta "An Old Kentucky Garden". At the tournament basket-ball games the Sophomores had a check-room which netted them a nice little income. The band journeyed to Kent again and won first, then went to Springfield for the weekend, and there kept their title, or rather added to it, because



they received a "one-plus", the first rating of that kind ever given. Marvel, french-horn; Barbara, drum; Wendell, drum; Lucille, saxophone; Joan, drum; Beverly, baritone; and Clair, tenor saxophone; played the lead parts at state. Mrs. Hoffman, our home-room teacher, was glad to get rid of us.

The following year Bill Burr joined the class about Christmas time. Mr. Jones was the home-room teacher, Mr. Banning, class advisor, and Keith president. Clair Knepper became associate editor of the Telenews, our school paper, but he really ran it that year. Wendell was artist; Elsie, typist; Maryelen, music editor; and Keith, sports editor. The junior play was given in November. "The Skeleton Walks" was as spooky as it sounds, and Joyce and Clair with the leads and their supporting cast of Carol, Rhys,

Marvel, Keith, Joan, Barbara, and Mae played their parts exceptionally well, (Elsie and Beverly were prompters, and Dick and Maryelen gave readings and songs, and Beverly with a baritone solo made interesting listening between acts.) The high school chorus went Christmas caroling that year at the suggestion of the juniors. The girls' softball team was the runner-up in the county and Marvel, Barbara, Carol, and Joan were four of the girls who helped get this honor for the school. The boys team under Coach Francu also won all their regular games but lost in the semi-finals. Rhys. Dick, and Edgar were on this winning team. The basketball team won four league games. Henry, Rhys, and Dick were on the varsity. Edgar was on the reserves. Marvel once more did a good job as one of the cheerleaders for the varsity and reserves. We were also busy learning how to handle money, especially Elsie who was treasurer, for we sold pencils with the basketball schedule on them, salt water taffy, and had concessions at all the ball games. We spent some money for class rings and the Junior - Senior Banquet. Keith gave the welcome to the Seniors, and Beverly played a baritone solo with Maryelen at the piano, Maryelen and Clair sang a duet, accompanied by Lucille, and Joyce and Mae played piano duets. Two members of the class received quite an honor that year, Keith and Maryelen were elected to the National Honor Society. The dances in Mrs. Milne's last operetta at Kinsman were taken over by us that year. We portrayed brooms, bakers, trains, etc. The band under Mr. Sulek again went to Kent, and again won first rating. This entitled them to another trip to Springfield which was made by bus and there they received another "one" rating. The commencement leaders were Rhys Ford and Joyce Jewell. Baccalaureate leaders were Keith Bower and Beverly Reed. Of course, we played in the commencement orchestra and sang in the baccalaureate chorus thus sending our old friends, the seniors, out into the world.

During the summer before we went back to school as seniors, we were saddened by the news that our superintendent, Mr. Boster, had died.



Coming back to school that year for the last time, we took particular note of everything that happened so that we would always have some good memories of our school days. Clair again headnewspaper staff and renamed it the "Etcetera". Elsie. Maryelen, Keith, Wendell, Joan, Beverly, and Mae, were on the staff. Mae was the editor of the Spotlight and the whole class ably assisted her. The boys won all their baseball games but two with Dick catching, Rhys pitching, and Edgar and Henry playing a wonderful game. The girls were runners-up in the county in softball. Barbara was pitcher, Marvel catcher, Elsie scorekeeper as she was the year before, and Carol held down a position too. The class

sponsored the "Saddle-Mates" and other shows. About this time, Maryelen Shaffer was one of the top 98 in the state in the Ohio History, Ohio Government, and Citizenship test and went to Athens to Ohio University where she placed second in the state. Mr. Banning was our homeroom teacher as well as being class advisor, Keith was president, Marvel vice-president, Elsie treasurer, and Joan secretary. Mr. Titus was our new superintendent. The boys had a good basketball season with Henry, Dick, Keith, Rhys, and Edgar playing on the team. Marvel who had been a cheerleader every year during her high school years was one that year, and a very good one too. Of course, we put on a wonderful operetta directed by Mrs. Price, and had a good band also. There was a beautiful bacculareate, classnite, and commencement. And afterwards, and exciting trip to New

We look back over the years with a happy heart at all the good times we had in school and hope that we added to the school's fame in some small ways. But, as we have always done in the past, we are looking to the future with courage and knowledge that if we heed our lessons taught in school we shall be successful in this new world we have entered.



To their surprise they find the house in the possession of a suave and mysterious physician, Dr. Fersig by name, his sinister housekeeper, and her deaf-mute son.



As I left Provincetown I hoped to find all of the Class of '51 in as good positions the next time I visited them.



JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET



The basketball team well deserves the honor of being rated as one of the best teams in the county. Their record of 17 wins and 2 loses clearly shows the reason for such a rating.


