





"I expect to pass through the world but once. Any good, therefore, that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow creature, let me do it now."



Class History

Ladies and Gentlemen, step up a little closer, I have here for you the Kinsman Class of 1953. This is the most spectacular, marvelous, energetic, ambitious, spontaneous, stupendously brilliant class that had ever been graduated from these "Hallowed Halls". We didn't gain any permanent members, but put our act into a minor spotlight by taking on the rest of the circus in a hot game of soccer.

We now moved from the main tent into the side shows to let our act mature. During this time, we acquired several new performers, Jim, Bob, Laddie, Patty K., and Ivan. The producer-director of our sixth ring show was again Mrs. Brooks. She put us right to work learning new acts.

During rings seven and eight, we put the final polish on our part in the side show and also got acquainted with our ring masters for the next four years. They were Mr. Boster, Manager, and his assistants, Mr. Banning, Mr. Jones, Mr. Francu, Miss Brown, Miss Fitts and Mrs. Hoffman, who turned out to be our production manager.

Ladies and Gentlemen, gather around closer yet, for I am about to begin unraveling the brightest spots of this yarn. I shall now reveal to you the main tent again, but this time ring nine I We must have thought our act was perfect, for we opened the show with the same "bang" as we'd used for ring one, only to crash once more and find how small and insignificant we still were. However, many of us made strides in perfecting our individual performances. We also added another trooper, Judy.

Ring ten I We acquired a new manager, Mr. Titus, after the sudden death of Mr. Boster. Also, our act began to shape-up and we began to fit into the show much better. Some of the rough edges had been clipped off and we were beginning to get a little polish.


That year we took on a new act, Sheldon. More and more our own stars were contributing to the big acts in the main ring. Ring Eleven! This time we were out to make money. By mingling with the crowd, we tried to sell everything we could lay our hands on, including the ring master's cap. All during our show life, we were practicing for the grand finale. In the final rehearsals, we were joined by Ronnie, Lillian, Kate and Sharlene. Ring twelve, the grand finale!!! We progressed through the eleven other rings to the ring in the center of the big tent. A change in the assistants brought Mrs. Garlock to replace Mr. Jones. The final act to join the production was Leroy. Now we began our last performance and what a success.

Our tumblers, Jack, Dave, Dick, Frank, Laddie, Gene and Jim performed many exciting fetes which kept the audience in suspense, while our acrobats, Roberta and Cornelia, kept this suspense at fever pitch.

The brain teaser, Frank, made everyone takenotice, while from the rest of the class we "honored society" with Cornelia, Jack, Roberta, Dave, Ronnie and Jim. The rest of the troupe, Betty, Janet, Barbara, Leroy, Judy, Sheldon, Irene, Bob, the two Pats, Reid, Ivan, Kate, Lillian and Sharlene, after performing in many capacities throughout the act, made the music in "Arizona" ring in the hearts of our audience. The final curtain fell on May 17, and we received curtain calls on May 19 and 21. The circus train pulled out for New York, May 24 and carried with it the entire cast, happy with memories of a twelve ring circus that had given the public the best value possible for their admission fee.

From everyone's viewpoint the Klippers finished one of the most successful seasons in the school's history. We finished runners-up and second only to Bloomfield, who were victorious, 5-4 in the finals.

The Klippers started their highly successful season with a rousing 11-1 victory over Lordstown. They continued to roll with consecutive victories over Farmington, Bazetta and Fowler, In the last game of the season with Hartford, Banning had a no-hitter with two out in the 7th; then, Hartford got a hit over second that spoiled his game. Bazetta was expected to be the tough one and it was, for them; we won, 4-2.

League 3, which is our league, was to meet League 2's representative, Vernon. We had scrimmaged Vernon in a pre-season contest and had little trouble defeating them, but that wasn't a true test as the semi-finals proved. We barely beat Vernon in the 7th, scoring 3 runs in the top of the inning to win, 6-3. Bloomfield was our foe in the finals. The game was a very tight affair—the lead changing hands several times. Going into the last inning the score was tied, but Bloomfield made the best of their part of the inning as Smida hit the first pitch for a home run to win, 5-4.







Klippers Cage Season

The basketball team had a most successful season, winning 14 games and losing 6. Coach John Francu's squad was in a tie for the League III championship when they lost to Fowler. However, the defeat near the end of the season by Bazetta left Kinsman in second place.

Never-the-less, the Klippers were seeded in the T.I.A. Tournament, the first two rounds of which were held in Kinsman with the quarter final, semi-final, and finals held in Howland.

After a tough game with Johnston in the second round, Kinsman came out the victor, 63–50. Their quarter-final opponent was Mineral Ridge. After leading 32–22 at the half, the Klippers found themselves behind 41–37 at the end of the third quarter. They tied Ridge in the closing minutes of play. But excitement made the necessary winning basket an impossibility and the final whistle blew on a 48–48 tie. In the three minutes overtime, Kinsman was on the short end of a 57–54 score.


Bazetta again was our opponent for an important game-the consolation game. The Klippers trailed 35-22 at halftime and were still behind 57-51 in the fourth quarter, but they finally came to life and scored 9 straight points to win 60-57. This victory gained them a berth in the N.E.O. "B" Sectional Tournament at South High Field House in Youngstown against Warren St. Mary's.

After battling for four quarters, the Klippers ended in a tie 55-55. This time they were victorious 61-59. Now we meet Canfield. (Press Deadline).

During the season, the starting line-up was chosen from Jack Banning, Chuck Carmichael, Dick Meredith, Gene Pearce, Jim Porter, and David Mathews.

Cappy, acting as Cupid, brings the two hearts together, and the story ends happily.












Junior-Senior Prom
