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CONDUCTORS

William Bewley (1st year, bass) started conducting at 15 years of age at the Cannon Music Festival where he studied conducting with Dr. James Anderson. In high school, He studied conducting with John Gordon Ross and bass with Paul Sharpe before attending East Carolina University where he received a bachelors degree in music performance studying bass under Leonid Finkelshteyn and conducting under Dr. Jorge Richter. In addition to his bachelors degree, William received an advance performance certificate in bass performance from East Carolina and his M.M. in orchestral conducting from Southern Illinois University. During his time at Southern Illinois University, William studied under Monteux alumnus Edward Benyas, and held the positions of associate conductor and chief of orchestra staff. When he's not in rehearsal, William enjoys walking his dog Jesse, riding his motorcycle and watching The Office.

Daniel Feng (2nd year, piano) is a prolific pianist and conductor, he is currently the Music Director of International Chamber Orchestra of America (ICOA). Their highlighted concert, New World, New Music, features Feng's commission of Bruce Adolphe integrated new work Dvorshock, as well as violinist Kevin Lin, co-leader of the London Philharmonic. As guest conductor, Feng recently conducted Copland's Appalachian Spring with the Martha Graham Dance Company's Graham 2 at their Christmas concert. Feng's concert appearances include Carnegie Hall, David Geffen Hall at Lincoln Center, Young Artist Showcase at WQXR. Feng focuses his efforts towards the greater integration of classical music into our daily lives, and he's dedicated to reinventing the public's relationship with classical music.

Tonatiuh Garcia (3rd year, viola) is equally skilled as a solo, chamber, orchestral violist, and conductor. He has been a member of the Xalapa Symphony Orchestra since August 2002. As an orchestral violist, Tonatiuh has performed with the Youth Chamber Orchestra of Veracruz, National Symphony in Mexico, Philharmonic Orchestra of Acapulco, Academy Orchestra from Gran Theater of Liceu (Barcelona), and National Youth Catalonia Orchestra.

Tonatiuh earned his Bachelor of Music degree from University of Veracruz. He holds a Master of Music degree in Conducting from Texas Tech University where he studied with David Becker, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from TTU, where he studied under Renee Skerik, Katrin Meidell, and Kimberly Sparr. Tonatiuh received postgraduate degrees from Liceu Conservatory of Barcelona, before pursuing his Master of Musicology at University of Granada concentrating in Cultural Politics and Management at the Autonomous Metropolitan University in Mexico.

Shane Gillen (1st year, bassoon) is a bassoonist and conductor from Tampa, Florida. Shane graduated from Carnegie Mellon University in 2018 with a BFA in Bassoon Performance and currently attends the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University as a master's student in bassoon. As a conductor, Shane worked extensively with the Carnegie Mellon University Repertoire Orchestra in addition to pursuing his own

personal projects under the study of Daniel Nesta Curtis. As a bassoonist, Shane has attended the Aspen Music Festival as well as played in the AIMS in Graz Orchestra (Austria). His primary bassoon teachers are Benjamin Kamins and Nancy Goeres.

Eric Goldberg (2nd year, percussion; 1st year, conductor) is a classical percussionist and aspiring conductor and educator that enjoys performing in a wide array of settings and creating opportunities to collaborate with others. As an orchestral musician, he has performed as principal percussionist of the Britten-Pears Orchestra in the United Kingdom for multiple seasons and has also appeared at the Miami, Edinburgh, and Lucerne summer festivals. Possessing a special passion for modern and contemporary performance, he has appeared at international solo competitions at TROMP Percussion Eindhoven and Northwestern University, and enjoys programming concerts featuring composers such as George Crumb, Paul Lansky, Elliot Carter, lannis Xenakis, and David Lang. As a conductor, he has studied at several workshops and has had the chance to conduct the Chamber Orchestra of New York and the Lviv Philharmonic in Ukraine. This year, he founded a Chicago-based ensemble called the Millennial Chamber Players which gave its debut concert in May after a successful crowdfunding campaign. He began conducting studies with Maureen Hynes at Manhattan School of Music (MSM) and continued with Mark Shapiro at the Juilliard Evening Division. He received his Bachelor of Music in percussion performance from MSM where he studied with Christopher Lamb, Duncan Patton, She-e Wu, and Kyle Zerna. He will begin graduate studies in music education at the VanderCook College of Music in the fall. Apart from music, Eric's passions include the other performing arts, fitness, mental health awareness, LGBTQ equality, and dogs.

Milan Milisavljevic (1st year, viola) is currently Principal Viola with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. He is considered one of the leading violists of the young generation. The Strad magazine described his playing as "very imaginative, with a fine, cultured tone", with Milan's recording of A. Khachaturian's Solo Viola Sonata hailed as "definitive". Milan has studied with James Dunham at Rice University, as well as with Atar Arad, Nobuko Imai, Paul Neubauer and Jutta Puchhammer. He has appeared as soloist with the Munich Chamber Orchestra, the Aspen Sinfonia, the Belgrade Philharmonic and others. As a chamber musician, he has collaborated with members of the Guarneri, Mendelssohn, St. Petersburg and Brentano String Quartets. Milan is also a member of the viola faculty at the Mannes School of Music in New York.

Joseph Morag (2nd year, violin) was acclaimed by the New York Times for his "gorgeous tone," and "physically expressive cues," and has performed extensively as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral violinist. Joseph has studied conducting under Joshua Gersen at the New York Youth Symphony's Apprentice Conducting Program, Victor Yampolsky at the Wintergreen Music Festival, and Michael Jinbo at the Monteux Winter Workshop. As a violinist, Joseph has appeared as soloist and concertmaster with the Vancouver Symphony, Columbia University Orchestra, Empire Chamber Orchestra, New York Youth Symphony, and National Orchestral Institute Festival Orchestra. Currently, Joseph plays with the Chelsea Symphony, Montclair Orchestra, and Symphoria.

Hannah Reitz (2nd year, violin) enjoys a varied career as a performer, teacher, and conductor. In demand as an educator, she has worked for years as a string coach. adjudicator and conductor with various young string symphonies including Minnesota All-State Orchestra, St. Olaf Music Camp Orchestra, the Lincoln Youth Symphony, UNH Youth Symphony, and Seacoast Youth Symphony Orchestra. Currently Hannah is a Lecturer at the University of New Hampshire where she teaches violin and viola. Assistant Director of the UNH Youth Symphony Orchestra, and private studio teacher. Hannah graduated with departmental distinction from St. Olaf College in 2010 (B.M. Violin Performance) where she served as a multi-year concertmaster of the acclaimed St. Olaf Orchestra. In May 2013 she graduated with honors from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (M.M. Violin Performance), and in May she also graduated summa cum laude from the University of New Hampshire with an M.A. in conducting. Hannah has been a conductor and violinist at the Pierre Monteux School, a member of the AIMS in Graz Festival Orchestra, National Repertory Orchestra, Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, and has performed with Charleston Symphony and Symphony New Hampshire.

Kyle Ritenauer (8th year, percussion) is happy to be back for his 8th Summer at the Pierre Monteux School. This season Kyle has appeared as guest conductor with the Norwalk Symphony Orchestra leading 5 full production performances of Tchaikovsky's ballet The Nutcracker. He also led two performances with Carnegie Hall's Ensemble Connect featuring Charles Ives' Symphony no. 3 'The Camp Meeting'. Most notably, Kyle stepped in with 3 minutes notice to conduct the full production ballet of Stravinky's Le Sacre du Printemps with the Juilliard Orchestra in performance at Lincoln Center. In June, Kyle made his debut in Beijing, China at the Super Cello Festival leading two performances consisting of cello concerti performed by some of the lead cellists in our field. As a cover conductor Kyle has worked with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, and Symphony New Hampshire. Kyle just completed his first at the Juilliard School and is a student of Maestro David Robertson.

Kin (Desmond) Siu (1st year, violin) is a Hong Kong-American conductor and violinist. He holds the position of Music Director and Music Coordinator for the nonprofit organization Arizona Pro Arte. A Master of Music graduate of Northern Arizona University, Desmond served as Assistant Director of the NAU Orchestras while working as guest Music Director with the Opera Orchestra and Chamber Orchestra. Desmond's past positions include Assistant Conductor positions for the organization Orchestra Northern Arizona, the Skidmore Orchestra, and Music Director of the Skidmore Chamber Orchestra. As a violinist, Desmond currently plays with the Flagstaff Symphony Orchestra and Prescott's new orchestra, Arizona Philharmonic.

Benjamin Stayner (2nd year, cello; 1st year, conductor) is a conductor, cellist, composer, and pianist from Western NY. He has conducted the Hartt Orchestra and the Foot in the Door Ensemble, as well as the String Orchestra of Brooklyn in a masterclass with Tito Muñoz. In 2014, he won a TANYS Award for Outstanding Musical Direction of *Fiddler on the Roof* with Theatre in the Mist. As a strong advocate for new music, he has commissioned many new works for himself, as well as his cello and double bass duet, Duo716. He conducted the premiere of his piece, *Wake Up!* for solo percussionist and chamber ensemble, this last March with the Foot in the Door

Ensemble. He also music directs musical theatre productions throughout the year. Benjamin recently finished undergraduate studies in music theory and composition at The Hartt School. He will continue on to Ithaca College this fall to pursue a Master's degree in conducting, while serving as a graduate assistant for the Opera and Musical Theatre department.

Emma Strub (2nd year, viola; 1st year, conductor) first attended the Monteux School in 2016 as a violist. She received her undergraduate degree in viola performance from the University of Memphis, and her masters in viola performance from Rutgers University. While Strub was completing her viola degrees, she took conducting lessons and created informal orchestras for herself to conduct. In 2018 she attended the Conductor's Retreat at Medomak, where she studied with Ken Kiesler. Strub now lives in Austin, Texas, where she is a prolific freelancer.

Martin Vaillancourt (1st year, violin) is a violinist and conductor currently pursuing an undergraduate degree in music history at McGill University. Martin studies violin with concert master of the Orchestre Symphonique de Montreal, Richard Roberts, and conducting with Maestro Alexis Hauser. In addition to the Pierre Monteux School, he has participated in a number of conducting festivals such as the Vienna Summer Music Festival, Beyond the Baton with Diane Wittry, and will partake in the International Conducting Workshop Festival with Larry Rachleff later this summer. Martin has played in many Montreal based orchestras such as the Orchestre Philharmonique et Choeur des Melomanes and L'Orchestre Symphinique de Sherbrooke. Martin loves to act and sing and is music director of one of McGill's top a capella groups Effusion.

Matthew Woodard (2nd year, violin; 1st year, conductor) is a composer-performer whose varied interests have sparked a diverse creative output. Matthew began his musical career as a violinist, and appeared as soloist most recently with The Orchestra Now of Bard College, with whom he performed Ligeti's Violin Concerto. As a composer, Matthew's works have been performed at Bard College, the New England Conservatory, the Rivers School, Rice University, and Yale University, as well as on the radio and television program From the Top. Recent collaborations include new music for dance with the Yale Undergraduate Theater/Dance Studies Department at the Yale University Art Gallery to commemorate its former director Jock Reynolds. Matthew also frequently collaborates musically with the Yale School of Drama, and has performed in two Yale Cabaret productions. Matthew has attended many summer festivals, and in August 2018 traveled to Switzerland to attend the Lucerne Festival Academy. Matthew earned his Master of Music degree from the Yale School of Music in May. On graduating he was awarded the Broadus Earle Prize for excellence in violin, and an Alumni Association Prize for contributing positively to the general life of the school. Matthew holds Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Music degrees from Bard College and Conservatory, where he also studied French Literature.

Xuecong (Sunny) Xia (1st year, violin) currently serves as assistant conductor at the Cleveland Institute of Music Orchestra and Opera Theater while pursuing a Master of Music degree in Orchestral Conducting and Violin Performance. Additionally, Xuecong makes regular appearances at the New Music Series directed by Dr. Keith Fitch at CIM. Xuecong has worked with many prominent conductors around the globe,

including Kenneth Kiesler, JoAnn Falletta, Romolo Gessi, Markand Thakar, Peter Stark, Brett Mitchell, and Jørgen Fuglebæk. As an accomplished violinist, Xuecong has served as concertmaster of the Cleveland Institute of Music Orchestra and performed as a soloist with orchestras in China and Australia

Spencer Zembrodt (1st year, percussion) is a conductor, composer, and percussionist. He was Assistant Conductor of the Shippensburg Symphony Festival from 2014-18, working alongside his teacher, Robert Trevino. He has conducted the Orchard Park Symphony Orchestra in Orchard Park, New York, and the Seven Hills Sinfonietta in Cincinnati, Ohio. He earned a Master of Music in Orchestral Conducting from the State University of New York at Fredonia, where he was Assistant Conductor of Orchestras and studied with Dr. David Rudge (a Monteux alumnus). Mr. Zembrodt's compositions are represented by Washington Street Publishing. He currently resides in Florence, Kentucky and works as a freelancer.

CONDUCTING ASSOCIATE

Tiffany Lu (2012-2015, violin; 3rd year Conducting Associate) has just completed her Doctorate of Musical Arts in Orchestral Conducting at the University of Maryland. She returns this summer for her third year as Conducting Associate at the Pierre Monteux School and Music Festival. Tiffany will soon enter her fourth season as Music Director of the Wilmington Community Orchestra in Wilmington, DE and her fifth year as assistant conductor of the Capital City Symphony in Washington, D.C. Tiffany is passionate about teaching in all contexts, from orchestral rehearsal to private conducting and violin instruction as well as classroom conducting. This fall she will join the core faculty at the Music School of Delaware as conducting instructor, violinist, and librarian. She will also work with the Prince Georges' Philharmonic as assistant conductor.

From 2015-2019, Tiffany was music director of the Maryland University Repertoire Orchestra, and assistant conductor of the University of Maryland Symphony Orchestra as well as the Maryland Opera Studio, where she presented Weill's *Zaubernacht* in spring 2019. Tiffany has been cover conductor with Symphony NH, Georgetown University, Cornell University, and Princeton Symphony; she has also served as producer on recordings with the Virginia Symphony Orchestra and the Smithsonian Chamber Players. Previous positions also include cover conductor and principal librarian at the 2016 and 2017 National Orchestral Institute, and conductor of the Young Artists' orchestra at the DC Youth Orchestra Program.

Tiffany has performed in master classes led by Jeffery Meyer, Mark Stringer, Carl St. Clair, Alan Gilbert, Larry Rachleff, David Effron, Lior Shambadal, Mark Shapiro, Marin Alsop, and Victor Yampolsky. She regularly performs as a section violinist with Annapolis Symphony and The Florida Orchestra, and enjoys teaching, writing, and cooking.

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INSTRUMENTALISTS

FLUTE

Daniel Prevost (1st year) is a freelance flutist currently active in the Northern Virginia and Washington D.C. metropolitan area. Daniel graduated in 2016 from George Mason University with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education, studying under the tutelage of Mrs. Julianna Nickel. Most Recently, Daniel has studied with Mrs. Alice Weinreb of the National Symphony Orchestra and Dr. Troy Paulontonio of the United States Army Field Band. Daniel regularly performs with the Washington Sinfonietta and was featured as a quarterfinalist in the National Flute Association's Young Artists competition in 2018.

John Ray (1st year) is a flutist currently in his junior year at the Hartt School in pursuit of a Bachelor's of music under the study of professor Janet Arms. He has been awarded prizes in competitions including the 2015 New Jersey Flute Society's annual concerto competition, where he received second place, and was also awarded the 2015 Cynthia Platt Scholarship from the Baroque Orchestra of New Jersey and proceeded to open one of their concerts as a soloist. He was also a second-place winner of the 2018 Great Composers Competition Rising Talents of Americas competition. John has performed in masterclasses for many world-class flutists including Emmanuel Pahud, Jeffrey Khaner, Elizabeth Rowe, Carol Wincenc, Keith Underwood, Tara O'connor, Bart Feller, Cynthia Meyers, and more. He recently took up the chinese Dizi and will be offering lessons for the 2019-2020 school year at the Hartt School Community Division.
