CONDUCTORS

Geoffrey Baker (2nd year viola; 1st year conducting) is the Artistic Director of Conway Fine Arts, an organization dedicated to creating opportunities for professional artists, reaching new audiences, and building community through music and art in western Massachusetts. He has produced and led the recent premieres of the Heirloom Music Festival and the Opus Amadeus chamber orchestra, 'Concerts in the Park' in Piedmont, California during the pandemic, and 'Music At Ethical,' a series at the Ethical Society building on Rittenhouse Square in Philadelphia. As a viola soloist, Geoffrey collaborated with conductor Daniel Kujala and the Bryn Athyn Orchestra in Max Bruch's Double Concerto. He has performed with the Pennsylvania Ballet, the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, the Reading Symphony, and the Graz opera festival in Austria. Geoffrey studied at the Peabody Conservatory, the Yale School of Music, Northern Illinois University, and the Eastman School with Jesse Levine, Joseph de Pasquale, Richard Young, and the Tokyo and Vermeer string quartets. Geoffrey attended the Monteux School in 2008 as a violist.

Zachary Banks (1st year, cello) has performed as a cellist with numerous regional symphonies and chamber music festivals in the Pacific Northwest and currently sits as principal cellist for the Oregon East Symphony. Outside of the concert hall, he has performed for many years in bluegrass folk bands, chamber music collectives, and has performed and recorded with various non-classical artists and recording studios. Some of his favorite performing memories have taken place at music festivals such as Northwest String Summit, MusicFest NW, and Folk Life.

Since 2018, Banks has been the music director and conductor for the Grande Ronde Symphony, and the assistant conductor and education director for the Oregon East Symphony where he leads their youth orchestra. During his graduate studies, Banks was the assistant conductor for the Portland State University Orchestra.

Banks received bachelor's and master's degrees in music for cello performance at Portland State University.

Leandro Cardoso (1st year, trumpet) is a Brazilian conductor currently based in Montreal, Canada, pursuing his doctoral degree in orchestral conducting at McGill University. He is the Beethoven Orchestra manager and assistant conductor for the McGill Symphony Orchestra. In the United States, Cardoso acted as Co-Director of the Kansas University Orchestra. He served as the assistant conductor of the KU Symphony Orchestra between 2019 and 2021 and was also cover conductor for the Philharmonia of Greater Kansas City. In addition, he is the Athos Chamber Orchestra's founder and principal conductor, an ensemble dedicated to premiering contemporary works by Brazilian composers.

Ryan D. Farris (4th year, cello) is a conductor, composer, and multi-instrumentalist originally from Nederland, Colorado. Ryan's conducting mentors include Michael Jinbo, David Rahbee, Gary Lewis, and Tiffany Lu. Ryan has a Master of Music in cello performance from the University of Washington, and a dual-Bachelor's in performance and composition from the University of Colorado. Recently, he has served as principal cello of the Seattle Philharmonic Strings, the University of Washington Symphony Orchestra, and the University of Colorado Opera Orchestra. He substitutes regularly with the Boulder Philharmonic and Fort Collins Symphony and is an avid chamber musician.

Misaki Hall (1st year, violin) is a second-year graduate student at the University of Louisville studying orchestral conducting with Professor Kimcherie Lloyd. She serves as assistant conductor and graduate teaching assistant for the University Symphony Orchestra, University Opera Theatre program, and the Louisville Youth Orchestra.

Misaki is an active instrumentalist in the Louisville community: she continues her violin studies with Dr. Geoffrey Herd at the University of Louisville, performs as a violinist in the Louisville-based quartet, Quartet Dioica, and plays in the Kentucky denim psych-rock band, Dinero Romero.

Prior to graduate school, Misaki earned her Bachelor of Music in violin performance from the University of Louisville, where she studied with Professor Brittany MacWilliams. Throughout her undergraduate career, she also studied oboe with Professor Jennifer Potochnic and played in woodwind quintets with Professor Matthew Karr. Outside of music, Misaki loves to eat ice cream, thrift shop, and play with her Shih-Tzu Poodle puppy, Kaiju.

Andrian Harabaru (1st year, cello), 31, began his musical journey in Moldova at the "Ciprian Porumbescu" Liceum studying cello performance under the diligent guidance of Prof. Bella Savich. He continued by pursuing a Bachelor's Degree from the National University of Music from Bucharest, Romania studying with Dr. Razvan Suma, received his Master's degree from Southeastern Louisiana University, USA with Prof. Daniel Cassin, and completed the Doctoral Degree in Musical Arts with a major in Cello Performance studying with Prof. Dennis Parker at Louisiana State University.

At LSU, Andrian had the opportunity to study conducting more in depth as a minor field in fulfillment of the requirements for his doctoral degree. His conducting professor was Carlos Riazuelo, who encouraged and nurtured his passion for the craft. Andrian was assistant conductor of the Civic Orchestra of Baton Rouge until Fall of 2021, when he enrolled in a Master's degree in Conducting at the University of Delaware studying with Dr. James Allen Anderson.

Alexander (Sasha) Kandybin (1st year, violin) has been studying violin since he was 7, and is currently attending Rice University pursuing a Master's in violin performance with Paul Kantor, including tutelage in conducting under Larry Rachleff and Donald Schleicher. He attended Manhattan School of Music Precollege in the studio of Grigory Kalinovsky and members of the Escher String Quartet. He studied conducting there with Jonathan Strasser. Sasha received his B.M. in violin performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he studied with William Preucil (then concertmaster of The Cleveland Orchestra), followed by Phil Setzer of the Emerson String Quartet and Jessica Lee of TCO. He is a winner of many competitions including the Junior division of the Cremona International Violin Competition and the New Jersey Youth Symphony concerto competition. He attended the Manchester Music Festival as a fellowship performer, and the National Arts Centre Young Artists Program several times working and performing extensively with Pinchas Zukerman, among others. Sasha also attended Music in the Mountains festival in Colorado as concertmaster of the junior orchestra at age 11, and participated in the Music@Menlo chamber music festival in 2016, where he played with members of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center.

Emmanuelle Lambert-Lemoine (2nd year, viola) is also a pianist and teacher. She has completed a Master's degree in Orchestra Conducting at the University of Ottawa with Dinuk Wijeratne, and is a Doctorate student in Viola Performance at the Université de Montréal with Juan Miguel Hernandez and Jutta Puchhammer-Sedillot. Other notable teachers include Jean-Philippe Tremblay, Jean-François Rivest, Michael Jinbo and Jorma Panula in conducting, David Marks in viola, and Stéphane Lemelin in piano. In parallel to her musical career, Emmanuelle completed a Master's degree in Performance Studies at the TISCH School of the Arts, NYU,

where she focused her research on music education and political theatre in the Americas. She is also a co-founder of ASTAWT (Action for Survivors of Torture and War Trauma), an organization that welcomes refugees to Ottawa.

Philip Larroque (2nd year, oboe; 1st year, conductor) teaches oboe, music theory, and musicianship at Tulane University and maintains a private piano and oboe studio in New Orleans. Larroque co-founded and co-directs the New Orleans Chamber Orchestra, presenting numerous premieres from a diverse array of composers as well as a concert series in prisons. He also coaches chamber music with the Greater New Orleans Youth Orchestras and is assistant conductor of the Tulane Orchestra. As an oboist, he regularly performs throughout the Gulf Coast region, including with the Acadiana, Rapides, and Lake Charles Symphonies and the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra.

Larroque attended the Louisiana School for Math, Science, and the Arts. He studied oboe with Jaren Atherholt at Tulane and with Jack Cozen Harel at the University of Akron. He completed additional studies on English horn with Robert Walters and in conducting with Maxim Samarov, Kenneth Kiesler, Donald Schleicher, Larry Rachleff, Mark Shapiro, and Markand Thakar.

Joseph Morag (4th year, violin; 3rd year conductor), acclaimed by the New York Times for his "gorgeous tone,"and "physically expressive cues," has performed extensively as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral violinist. He studied with Aaron Rosand under the prestigious Dolan Prize, awarded by Columbia University. Joseph has also studied conducting under Joshua Gersen at the New York Youth Symphony's Apprentice Conducting Program, Victor Yampolsky at the Wintergreen Music Festival, and Michael Jinbo at the Monteux Festival. In 2019, he was music director of the Columbia New Opera Workshop.

Kara Piatt (1st year, pianist) began her conducting studies during her undergraduate degree in Piano Performance at Northern Arizona University. Her voice and piano background led her to become an Assistant Conductor and Pianist with the NAU Lyric Opera Theatre and Director Dr. Daniel Keith O'Bryant in their rehearsals and performances. These experiences ignited a true passion for conducting and led Kara to pursue many educational opportunities across the country with various renowned conducting pedagogues. She most recently graduated from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music with her Master's Degree in Orchestral Conducting under the tutelage of Mark Gibson. There, her conducting engagements included serving as Assistant Conductor of the CCM Philharmonia, CCM Concert Orchestra, and the CCM Dance and Opera programs. Kara is incredibly excited to be continuing her studies at ASU for her Doctorate in Orchestral and Opera Conducting.

Allion Salvador (4th year, violin; 3rd year conductor) is the 1st prize winner of the 2021 Music International Grand Prix, concertmaster of Seattle Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra, associate concertmaster of Yakima Symphony, guest concertmaster at Seattle's Paramount Theater, and a member of the Spokane Symphony and the Missoula-based String Orchestra of the Rockies. He is a regular guest artist with the Yakima-based Sempre Chamber Music series and SMCO Secret Chamber Music, collaborating with artists including Nathan Chan, Maria Larionoff, Jorja Fleezanis, and Denise Dillenbeck. As a conductor, he is the founding music director of the Seattle Philharmonic Strings, a chamber orchestra bringing rarely played string repertoire to new communities. Mr. Salvador graduated with degrees in Violin Performance and Neurobiology from the University of Washington. He is currently completing graduate work with Peter Winograd and Lisa Kim at the Manhattan School of Music. His principal teachers include Hal Grossman and Ronald Patterson in violin, and Michael Jinbo, Adam Stern, and Ludovic

Morlot in conducting. Festival appearances include the Aspen Music Festival, Round Top Music Festival, and the Pierre Monteux School.

Kin (Desmond) Siu (3rd year, violin), a Hong Kong-American conductor and violinist, holds the position of Artistic Director and Principal Conductor with the organization Orchestra Northern Arizona, an orchestra based in Flagstaff, Arizona. A Master of Music graduate from Northern Arizona University (NAU), Desmond was invited as Visiting Guest Artist and Music Director for NAU Lyric Theater's 2022 production of Mark Adamo's Little Women. Desmond's past positions include acting Music Director for Arizona Pro Arte, Assistant Director of the NAU Orchestras, and Assistant Conductor of the Skidmore Orchestra. His private conducting teachers include Daniel O'Bryant and Anthony Holland. Desmond has also studied conducting with Neeme Järvi and Michael Jinbo. As a violinist, Desmond currently plays with the Flagstaff Symphony Orchestra, Arizona Philharmonic, and Verde Valley Sinfonietta. During his violin studies, Desmond had the opportunity to learn, work, play, and perform with many Grammy winning string quartets such as the Ying Quartet and the American String Quartet. His private violin teachers include Shelley Rich, Michael Emery, and former Vienna Philharmonic violinist, Eugeniy Chevkenov.

Frank (Jiawen) Song, (1st year, violin) originally from Ningbo, China, is a violinist, composer, conductor, and music educator looking forward to pursuing a career in orchestral conducting. Frank started to study violin at the age of four under the tutelage of Professor Dong Lili of Ningbo University College of Music and has played in student orchestras of all levels since ten. Since coming to Chicago, Frank is mentored by Barbara Schubert, music director of the University of Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and his major conducting teachers/mentors also include Kenneth Kiesler, Donald Portnoy and Victoria Bond. As a composer, Frank has been mentored by Augusta Read Thomas, Anthony Cheung, and Hans Thomalla and his works have been performed by Axiom Brass, Spektral Quartet, and musicians from Ensemble Dal Niente and Grossman Ensemble. As an avid Chamber musician, Frank also performs regularly with his due and trio ensembles on the campus of UChicago.

Eduardo de la Vega Garza (1st year, piano) is a Mexican-born pianist and conductor who recently completed his Master's degree at The Juilliard School, where he was a proud recipient of the Kovner Fellowship. Eduardo holds a Bachelor's Degree in Piano Performance from La Escuela Superior de Musica y Danza de Monterrey. Likewise, his keen interest in entrepreneurship has led him to earn a Bachelor's degree in Creation and Development of Businesses from the Technological Institute of Superior Studies of Monterrey.

Eduardo has attended conducting festivals and courses worldwide, including the European American Music Alliance for conductors and Saluzzo Opera Academy, studying with teachers such as Jeffrey Milarsky, Mark Shapiro, Pierre Vallet and Jorge Mester. Amongst the orchestras with which Eduardo has appeared are the Juilliard Lab Orchestra, Detache Chamber Orchestra and ITESM Symphony Orchestra. Simultaneously and since his orchestral debut as a pianist in 2016, Eduardo has performed with The Juilliard Orchestra, UANL Symphony Orchestra, ITESM Symphony Orchestra, and the ESMDM Symphony Orchestra.

Daren Weissfisch (4th year, oboe) has conducted professional and student ensembles in the United States, Mexico and Europe for over a decade. He is currently pursuing a doctoral degree in Orchestral Conducting at the University of Washington under the tutelage of Dr. David Alexander Rahbee. From 2013 to 2019 Daren was the Artistic Director and Conductor of the Orquesta Sinfónica Esperanza Azteca Sinaloa, which is an El Sistema based youth orchestra and choir in Culiacán, Sinaloa, Mexico. Daren has studied with notable conductors including Edward Cumming, Donald Schleicher, Ennio Nicotra, Lior Shambadal, Charles Olivieri-Munroe,

Gábor Hollerung, Carlos Spierer, Linus Lerner, Glen Adsit and Timothy Salzman. Daren considers Michael Jinbo to be one of his most important conducting mentors and will miss him dearly.

Wayland Whitney (4th year, viola) is a conductor and violist from northern California. He is passionate about education, and has taught publicly and privately since 2008. In 2009, he cofounded the Placer County Youth Orchestra in Roseville, CA, which he administered and conducted while pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Viola at UC Davis. In 2016, he became the conductor of the Music in the Mountains Youth Orchestra in Nevada City, CA. In 2018, he was appointed assistant conductor for Symphony D'Oro, a community orchestra in Rancho Cordova, CA. He also conceived and arranged music for a series of school outreach concerts for the Auburn Civic Symphony in Auburn, CA. Later that year, Whitney moved to West NY to study conducting and free improvisation with Dr. David Rudge at SUNY Fredonia, finishing his Master's degree in Conducting in spring of 2020. In 2021, Whitney resumed his position with the Music in the Mountains Youth Orchestra while also becoming Assistant Conductor for the Music in the Mountains Orchestra. He also became conductor of the Modesto Symphony Youth Orchestra and the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute Orchestra in Grass Valley, CA. As a violist, Whitney performs with numerous ensembles around northern California, including the Sacramento Philharmonic, the Modesto Opera, Stockton Symphony, InConcert Sierra, and Music in the Mountains.

FLUTE

Juan Hernandez (1st year) recently graduated from Lawrence University - Conservatory of Music with a Bachelor of Music in Flute Performance, where he studied with Erin Lesser. CLARINET
