



In Memoriam MICHAEL JINBO, 1957-2022

'Do not mourn for me for long.' These words are for Michael.

Who among us—few, I suppose—can say that we have had the sort of influence Michael has

had—and will continue to have—on so many? I certainly cannot, and I was a teacher, like him.

Imagine yourself in rehearsal in the Hall. He calls out the student conductor's name. The student walks to the podium. The lesson begins. But In truth, it has probably begun before. Except for the first student of the summer, the rest have witnessed the trial. 'Stop!' he says. And so the lesson begins. They (you) all know what is coming. 'Why did you do that?'

They (you) either know, or they (you) don't. And they (you) are either honest, or they (you) are not. In any case, it is the 'Joe Louis theory of education.' As was said of the opponent who stepped into the ring with the great boxer, 'Nowhere to run, nowhere to hide.' This is the open secret that Michael learned from Charles Bruck, that I suppose Bruck learned from Monteux, and that he passed on to his students (to you). No way to hide, no need to hide, and don't try.

The podium is an existential space. There is the question from the Maestro, and there are three possible answers: 'I know'—and then the explanation. Or 'I don't know'—which made Socrates the wisest man in Athens. Or fake it and BS. But the last happens only once.

In a society awash in merely personal preference, Michael stood for that objective hermeneutic, that faithful interpretation of the musical text, which he learned from Charles Bruck, and which Bruck learned from Monteux. This is and will remain the historic legacy of the Monteux School and Music Festival.

And so, Michael had—and has—an impact of a very rare and precious, deeply personal and 'existential' sort that very few of us will be blessed to have in this life of ours. What more can you ask than this?

And yet for me, at least, and for the very same forty years of devotion to the School that I shared with Michael, this is neither the whole story, nor even its most important part. Let's be honest. You and I mourn Michael now, but soon we will think of him only seldom. And then we will all die, as Michael did on Monday. April 18. And then, what is left? So far as concerns us and our weak memories, nothing.

But there is something more. There is the inscription onto the ongoing character of things of what that standing on the podium and of what took place there means. This is somehow not lost. How this is the case we do not know; but that it is, we do. There is a permanence amid the flux, and what is honest and good remains.

Mourn for Michael, but not for long.


MEI-ANN CHEN AT THE NEW WORLD SYMPHONY

This concert included high school students from around Dade County sitting next to New World Symphony musicians on stage at the New World Center, a new performing arts center designed by Frank Gehry. The Sideby-Side Concert is an annual event started by Monteux **Executive Director Marc Thayer** when he was a member of the NWS in 1997. Ms. Chen has been Music Director of the MacArthur Award-winning Chicago Sinfonietta since 2011. In 2021 she was named Chief Conductor of Austria's Grosses Orchester Graz at Styriarte.
