### CONDUCTORS

Alex Amsel (2<sup>nd</sup> year, bassoon), an Argentinian-born conductor, currently serves as the Assistant Conductor and Choir Master for the Peabody Conservatory Opera while completing his studies under the tutelage of Marin Alsop at the Peabody Conservatory, and has previously served as Faculty Conductor for the Philadelphia International Music Festival. He is the winner of the Miami Music Festival Conducting Competition and appeared at the New World Center with the Miami Music Festival Orchestra. As a bassoonist, Amsel has appeared with the Tanglewood Music Center Orchestra and held positions with the Boston Philharmonic, Austin Symphony Orchestra, and Breckenridge Music Festival. When not studying music, Amsel is a Golden Retriever and wine aficionado.

Antoine T. Clark (4<sup>th</sup> year, clarinet) is the Artistic and Music Director of the McConnell Arts Center Chamber Orchestra in Worthington, Ohio. He was a winner in the 2017 International Conductor's Workshop and Competition (Atlanta, Georgia) and during summer 2017, he served as Assistant Conductor with the Gateways Music Festival at the Eastman School of Music, assisting Michael Morgan and conducting a series of festival performances. Clark has also served as Music Director of the Wayne State College Orchestra in Wayne, Nebraska; Assistant Conductor of the Ohio State University Orchestra; and Artistic and Music Director of the Capital City Chamber Players (Columbus, Ohio). He is currently Lecturer of Music at Ohio Northern University, where he is Music Director of the university's Wind Orchestra, and Adjunct Instructor of Woodwinds at Kenyon College. He has been accepted into the Chicago Sinfonietta's Project Inclusion Conducting Fellowship program.

Ryan D. Farris (3<sup>rd</sup> year, cello) is a conductor, composer, cellist, and multi-instrumentalist originally from Boulder, Colorado. He received his BM in cello performance and composition from the University of Colorado, where he studied conducting with Gary Lewis and Nicholas Carthy. Ryan was a composer fellow at the 2015 CU New Opera Workshop, and a visiting artist at the University of Texas, Austin in 2017 as a string-quartet arranger. Ryan is currently living in Seattle, pursuing his master's in cello performance at the University of Washington, studying with Sæunn Thorsteinsdóttir. Ryan currently serves as principal cellist of both the UW Symphony and Seattle Philharmonic Strings. Ryan also plays viola da gamba and baroque cello with the UW Baroque Ensemble, timpani and percussion in the UW Campus Philharmonia, and freelances as a traditional Irish fiddle and pennywhistle player. Ryan enjoys skiing, mountain-climbing, playing with dogs, and a refreshing pint of Guinness.

**Daniel Feng** (1<sup>st</sup> year, piano) is a native of Hong Kong. A prolific pianist and conductor, he founded and is now Music Director of the International Chamber Orchestra of America (ICOA). ICOA's recent concert, New World, New Music, features Feng's commission of Bruce Adolphe's virtual reality integrated new work Dvorshock, and also violinist Kevin Lin, co-leader of the London Philharmonic. Feng is a graduate of Xinghai Conservatory, Juilliard Pre-College, and Mannes School of Music. His teachers include Pavlina Dokovska, Michael Adelson, Michael Charry and Maurice Peress. Feng focuses his efforts towards the greater integration of classical music into our daily lives.

Tonatiuh Garcia (2<sup>nd</sup> year, viola) is equally skilled as a solo, chamber, orchestral violist, and conductor. He has been a member of the Xalapa Symphony Orchestra since August 2002. Tonatiuh received postgraduate degrees from Liceu Conservatory of Barcelona, before pursuing his Master of Musicology at University of Granada concentrating in Cultural Politics and Management at the Autonomous Metropolitan University in Mexico.

**Yoona Jeong** (1<sup>st</sup> year, violin) will be pursuing a Doctorate Degree in Orchestral Conducting at University of Texas at Austin this August. Yoona graduated with honors from Pusan Arts High School as a violin performance major. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Musicology at Seoul National University where she graduated summa cum laude and received the chancellor's award. In 2014, she matriculated at the University of Southern California and earned a Master's degree in Choral Music at the Thornton School of Music. He also holds a Bachelor of Music in Theory from the State University of New York at Potsdam, where he studied conducting with Christopher Lanz and Timothy Topolewski. He works during the year as a freelance music director and conductor for musical theatre in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

**David S. Platt** (2<sup>nd</sup> year, violin/viola) hails from Cleveland, Ohio, where he maintains an active performing and teaching career. David has conducted a variety of orchestras from around the world, including Italy, Greece, Sweden, Bulgaria, and throughout the United States. As a dedicated educator, he conducts the Baldwin Wallace Youth

Orchestras and works with the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra and Akron Youth Orchestras. Notably, David is a Visiting Assistant Professor at Oberlin College & Conservatory, where he teaches courses in undergraduate conducting. Formerly the Assistant Conductor of the Austin Symphony Orchestra, he presently serves as Assistant Conductor of the Firelands Symphony Orchestra (Ohio) to Carl Topilow, and was named a Semi-Finalist for the 2016-2017 New World Symphony Conducting Fellowship in Miami. Aside from music, David enjoys Italian language and culture, kayaking and hiking, traveling, and philosophy.

Hannah Reitz (1st year, violin) enjoys a varied career as a performer, teacher, and conductor. She has worked for years as a string coach, educator, and conductor with various young string symphonies including Minnesota All-State Orchestra, St. Olaf Music Camp Orchestra, the Lincoln Youth Symphony, UNH Youth Symphony, and Seacoast Youth Symphony Orchestra. Currently, Hannah is Assistant Director of the UNH Youth Symphony Orchestra, Resident Artist of Violin/Viola at the University of New Hampshire, a UNH SYMS instructor, and Music Director of the Seacoast Youth Symphony Orchestra. Kyle has worked in the role of cover conductor for the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra. Allion Salvador (3<sup>rd</sup> year, violin; 2<sup>nd</sup> year, conductor) serves as concertmaster of the Seattle Philharmonic, Seattle Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra, Sammamish Symphony, and assistant concertmaster of the Yakima Symphony. He has worked with the Aspen Festival and Opera Orchestras, Tacoma Symphony, Seattle Collaborative Orchestra, Pacific Northwest Ballet, City Opera Ballet, and many more. At the start of a promising conducting career, Mr. Salvador holds assistant conductor positions at the Seattle Philharmonic, Sammamish Symphony, and Seattle Collaborative Orchestra. He is the founder and music director of the Seattle Philharmonic Strings, a chamber orchestra promoting potent music in free community concerts. Mr. Salvador has studied violin with Ron Patterson and David Halen, and conducting with Ludovic Morlot and Adam Stern.

**Duo Shen** (3<sup>rd</sup> year) earned his BM and MM in violin performance at the University of Delaware with Xiang Gao. He is pursuing his DMA at the University of Maryland under

As a violinist, Shen was second prizewinner of 2011 Delaware National String Competition and won the University of Delaware concerto competition in his freshman year. This June, Mr. Shen led the University of Delaware Symphony Orchestra as guest conductor and violinist on tour throughout China, sharing the stage with "6wire", Chen Zimbalista, and James Anderson.

Dr. **Shen Yiwen** (4<sup>th</sup> year, piano) currently serves as Assistant Conductor of the Prince George's Philharmonic.
