CONDUCTORS

Yeo-Ryeong Ahn (1st year, piano) was born in 1992 in Korea, began her musical studies in orchestral conducting at the Preparatory Division of the Korea National University of Arts, and obtained her bachelor's degree in conducting at the Korea National University of Arts, where she studied under the tutelage of Chi-Yong Chung in 2014. At KNUA, she regularly conducted symphonic and operatic works with the KNUA Repertory Orchestra and contemporary pieces by the composition class with student ensembles. Yeo-Ryeong Ahn has participated in masterclasses with Jorma Panula, Markand Thakar, and Paavo Järvi.

Alex Amsel (1st year, bassoon) is an Argentian born bassoonist and conductor. His previous positions include Assistant Conductor at both the Miami Music Festival and Hot Springs Music Festival, and Resident Faculty Conductor at the Philadelphia International Music Festival. Amsel studied bassoon at the University of Texas Austin and the New England Conservatory, and has studied conducting with Larry Rachleff, David Effron, Cristian Macelaru, and Stefa Sanders. Amsel will continue his conducting studies at Peabody Conservatory this fall with Marin Alsop.

Gregory Cardi (1st year, violin) started the violin at the age of 6, and made his solo debut with orchestra by age 10. An alumni of the Walnut Hill School, Mr. Cardi received his Bachelors of Music from the Colburn Conservatory under the tutelage of Robert Lipsett, where he was crowned ping pong champion. He recently finished his Masters at the Juilliard School studying with Catherine Cho and Metropolitan Opera Concertmaster David Chan. Currently a fellow at the New World Symphony, he has conducted several performances in Miami Beach. A lifelong dream to conduct, Mr. Cardi is incredibly excited to learn at the Monteux School this summer.

Antoine T. Clark (3rd year, clarinet) is a clarinetist and is attending the Pierre Monteux School and Festival for a third year as a conductor. In 2013, he founded the McConnell Arts Center Chamber Orchestra in Worthington, Ohio, for which he serves as Artistic and Music Director. Earlier this year, he was named a winner in the International Conductor's Workshop and Competition held in Atlanta, Georgia. In May, he was selected by the Jacksonville Symphony to audition for their Assistant Conductor position. Later this summer, he will assume the position of Assistant Conductor with the Gateways Music Festival at the Eastman School of Music.

Hayden Denesha (1st year, viola), a native of Buffalo, New York, USA, currently serves as a Youth Orchestra Conductor for the South Carolina Philharmonic Youth Orchestras as well as Graduate Assistant Conductor to the University of South Carolina Symphony Orchestra. He has most recently served as Assistant Conductor of Orchestras and Opera at the State University of New York (SUNY) College at Fredonia. Currently, Mr. Denesha is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree with Donald Portnoy at the University of South Carolina. Equally at home as a performer on viola, Mr. Denesha currently holds section positions in the South Carolina Philharmonic and Aiken Symphony Orchestras respectively. Mr. Denesha holds Bachelors of Music Degrees in

Music Education and Viola Performance as well as a Master of Music Degree in Orchestral Conducting from SUNY College at Fredonia.

lan Michael Elmore (2nd year, bass) graduated from the University of Louisville this spring with an undergraduate degree in double bass performance. Ian has studied double bass with Sidney King, and conducting with Kimcherie Lloyd. In past summers, Ian has attended the Sewanee Summer Music Festival and Hot Springs Music Festival as a bassist, playing under the batons of JoAnn Falletta, Peter Bay, Cristian Macelaru, Alastair Willis, Kenneth Kiesler, and Larry Livingston. While at the University of Louisville he performed as a bassist with the Wind Ensemble and the University Symphony Orchestra. He also appeared with the University Symphony Orchestra as a student conductor. In addition, Elmore is the music director and founder of the Alunos Chamber Orchestra, a forty-piece student orchestra. This orchestra has performed the works of Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Copland, Haydn and Schubert, while also performing new works of University of Louisville student composers. Ian intends to continue studying the double bass, as well as orchestral conducting.

Ryan D. Farris (2nd year, cello) is a conductor, composer, arranger, and cellist from Nederland, Colorado. He received bachelor of music degrees in cello performance and composition from the University of Colorado, Boulder, where he also studied conducting with Gary Lewis and Nicholas Carthy. During his undergrad, Ryan conducted six world premieres, a concert of fully-staged opera scenes, recitals featuring Schönberg's Pierrot Lunaire and Copland's Appalachian Spring, and even his own orchestration of Debussy's La cathédrale engloutie. He was awarded a composer fellowship at the 2015 CU New Opera Workshop, and was recently a visiting artist of the University of Texas, Austin. This spring, Ryan received a scholarship to study with famed Icelandic cellist Sæunn Þorsteinsdóttir at the University of Washington. He is looking forward to moving to Seattle this fall to begin his Master's degree.

Juan Tucan Franco (1st year, violin) has performed in the most important stages of México as well as in other countries such as; The United States, Portugal, Ecuador, Argentina, Colombia, Peru, Italy, Austria, Germany, France and Belgium. During his young career, he has had the privilege of conducting for Ballet as well as for Opera on several occasions.

Franco has been guest conductor at some of Mexico's leading orchestras, including the Aguascalientes Symphony Orchestra (OSA), Puebla's conservatory Symphony Orchestra, Northern Lights Festival Chamber Orchestra, Jalisco Philharmonic, Coahuila Symphony Orchestra, Xalapa Symphony Orchestra, Zapopan Symphony Orchestra (OSZ), Nayarit Symphony Orchestra, BUAP Symphony Orchestra, Colombia's National Army Symphony Band, Nayarit Chamber Orchestra, the Aramara ensemble and the principal youth orchestras of México.

Nowadays, he is the artistic conductor of the Guadalajara Youth Symphony Orchestra (OSIJUG) and of the "Camerata del Nayar."

Tonatiuh Garcia (1st year, viola) is equally skilled as a solo, chamber, orchestral violist, and conductor. He has been a member of the Xalapa Symphony Orchestra since August 2002. As an orchestral violist, Tonatiuh has performed with the Youth Chamber Orchestra of Veracruz, National Symphony in Mexico, Philharmonic Orchestra of Acapulco, Academy Orchestra from Gran Theater of Liceu (Barcelona), and National Youth Catalonia Orchestra.

Tonatiuh earned his Bachelor of Music degree from University of Veracruz School of Music. He holds a Master of Music degree in Conducting from the Texas Tech University (TTU) where he studied with David Becker, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the TTU, where he studied under Renee Skerik, Katrin Meidell, and Kimberly Sparr.

Tonatiuh also received postgraduate degrees from Liceu Conservatory of Barcelona, Spain before pursuing his Master of Musicology degree at the University of Granada, Spain and a Specialty in Cultural Politics and Cultural Management at the Autonomous Metropolitan University in Mexico.

Jacob Joyce (1st year, violin), age 24, is a conductor and violinist from Ann Arbor, MI. In August, Jacob begins his new appointment as the Conducting Fellow for the Fort Worth Symphony. Jacob has previously held positions as Associate Conductor of the Yale Symphony Orchestra, Music Director of the Berkeley College Orchestra, Music Director of Opera Theatre of Yale College, and cover conductor for the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston. Jacob graduated from Yale College with a B.A. in Music and Economics in 2014, and he received an M.M. in Violin Performance from the Yale School of Music in 2015. Jacob then studied orchestral conducting with Hugh Wolff at the New England Conservatory. Past conducting teachers also include Toshiyuki Shimada and Kenneth Kiesler. Jacob has attended the Aspen Conducting Academy, where he studied with Robert Spano and Larry Rachleff, and was awarded the Robert Spano Conducting Prize.

John Norine, Jr. (9th year, cello) is a graduate of the University of North Texas with a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Orchestral Conducting, where he studied under Anshel Brusilow and Clay Couturiaux. He also earned a Bachelor's of Music in Theory from the State University of New York at Potsdam. He works during the year as a music director for Music Theatre of Denton, a non-profit theatre organization serving the greater Dallas/Fort Worth area.

Kyle Ritenauer (6th year, percussion) enjoys a many-faceted career as a conductor, percussionist, and teaching artist in New York City. As a conductor Kyle has worked with orchestras such as the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, and he has recently founded the Harlem-based ensemble, Uptown Philharmonic. As a passionate advocate for today's music, Kyle has premiered over 50 works by living composers including the premiere of Richard Danielpour's ballet Cassandra's Curse. As a percussionist, Kyle has served as Principal Percussionist of the Hudson Valley Philharmonic since 2011, and has performed with ensembles such as the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Louisiana Philharmonic. Kyle also performs frequently on Broadway on shows such as Pippin, and A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder.

Allion Salvador (2nd year, violin; 1st year, conductor) serves as concertmaster of the Seattle Philharmonic, Seattle Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra, Sammamish Symphony, and assistant concertmaster of the Yakima Symphony. He has worked with the Aspen Festival and Opera Orchestras, Tacoma Symphony, Seattle Collaborative Orchestra, Pacific Northwest Ballet, City Opera Ballet, and many more. At the start of a promising conducting career, Mr. Salvador holds assistant conductor positions at the Seattle Philharmonic, Sammamish Symphony, and Seattle Collaborative Orchestra. He is the founder and music director of the Seattle Philharmonic Strings, a chamber orchestra promoting potent music in free community concerts. Mr. Salvador has studied

violin with Ron Patterson and David Halen, and conducting with Ludovic Morlot and Adam Stern.

Shen Yiwen (3rd year, piano) is a Chinese composer, conductor, and pianist. His music has been performed at prestigious venues in six continents and hailed as "a jaunty, vibrantly scored canvas" and "with a lucid, economical lyricism" by the New York Times. He has had works commissioned and premiered by the National Ballet of China, the Albany, American, Beijing, Minnesota Symphony Orchestras, and made his Carnegie Hall debut with a song cycle commissioned by the Carnegie Hall. Currently, Yiwen is studying orchestral conducting as a master's student at University of Maryland. FLUTE

Sophia Ennocenti (1st year) graduated this past May 2017 with a master's degree in flute performance from Rutgers University under the tutelage of Mr. Bart Feller. A native of Rochester, NY, she began her private flute studies at the age of 13, attending Eastman School of Music's prestigious pre-college program.
