A Brief History.....

Pierre Monteux became an American citizen in 1941, and from that year until his death in 1964, he made his permanent residence in Hancock, Maine. Here, during the summers, he maintained a school for orchestral conducting as he had in Paris and Les Baux in southern France. The promising young musicians whom he attracted were not only aspiring conductors but also instrumentalists eager to serve as an orchestra and gain experience in orchestral playing.

At the time of the Maestro's death, the Pierre Monteux Memorial Foundation, with Mme. Monteux as its president, was incorporated as a non-profit organization. Continuation of the school, which had meant so much to Monteux, was deemed the most fitting memorial to him. Mme. Monteux donated considerable acreage and buildings from her estate for continued use by the school, and land for a small memorial park. Chenoweth Hall created the symbolic sculpture of granite and lucite that is the focus of the park. Residents of Hancock donated a flag pole.

Maestro Charles Bruck, who had begun his career as Associate Conductor of the Paris Symphony Orchestra under Monteux, was chosen Music Director of the school. Bruck has conducted many of the world's leading orchestras, the premieres of more than 700 contemporary works, and among his many honors is that of Officier of the French Legion of Honor. Monteux and Bruck had enjoyed a close friendship through the years, and perhaps no other Monteux disciple had such a deep understanding of Monteux's high teaching standards and aims for the school.

Pierre Monteux once said: "Conducting is not enough. I must create something. I am not a composer, so I will create fine young musicians." A measure of his success is the number of well-known conductors today who give generous credit to the Monteux School for their early training. The increasing number of recent students who have been singled out for coveted awards and positions with major orchestras here and abroad confirms the fact that Maestro Bruck has been faithful to Monteux and the traditions of the school.
