ANDRÉ JOLIVET: VIOLIN CONCERTO

One of France's premiere 20th-century composers, André Jolivet studied music with Edgard Varèse and Paul Le Flem. With Olivier Messiaen and others, he formed the group known as La jeune France, which was dedicated to the promotion of modern music with national leanings. There is free use of polytonality and asymmetric rhythms in Jolivet's compositions. His popular Concerto for Flute and Strings (1949) has been previously performed at the Monteux School. Other American favorites include his Hopi Snake Dance for Two Pianos, which premiered at the Tanglewood Festival in August 1948. Jolivet's Violin Concerto (1972), also influenced by Hopi philosophy, bears the following inscription at the beginning of the score:

L'essence de l'homme est sonore, le son engendre la lumière et l'esprit s'y manifeste. [Cosmogonie Hopi] The essence of man is sonorous; sound engenders light, wherein the spirit reveals itself.

DEVY ERLIH, Violin

Born in Paris, Devy Erlih pursued musical studies at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Paris and was awarded a first prize in violin at a very young age. Following a debut recital in Paris in 1946, he quickly established a brilliant career which has taken him throughout Europe, Africa, Australia, Japan and the United States. His recordings have received many awards, and in 1982, he was named professor at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Paris. Erlih is a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor and an Officer of the National Order of Merit. He is married to Christine Jolivet, who is also here today to celebrate this performance of Jolivet's Violin Concerto, in honor of the 20th anniversary of her father's death.

IGOR STRAVINSKY: PETROUCHKA

Petrouchka is a ballet of "burlesque scenes in four tableaux." It received its premiere in Paris at the Théâtre du Châtelet on June 13, 1911, in a production by Serge Diaghilev's Ballets Russes. Pierre Monteux conducted the premiere performance.

The action of the ballet takes place in Admiralty Square in St. Petersburg, around 1830. In the midst of the Shrovetide festivities, an old Magician of oriental appearance exhibits before an astonished crowd the animated puppets Petrouchka, the Ballerina and the Moor, who perform a wild dance.

The Magician's magic has endowed the puppets with human feelings and passions. Petrouchka has been given more than the others, and therefore suffers more than the Ballerina and the Moor. He resents bitterly the Magician's cruelty, his bondage, his exclusion from ordinary life, his ugliness, and his ridiculous appearance. He seeks comfort by pursuing the love of the Ballerina, and is on the verge of believing in his success when the lovely one shuns him, feeling only terror at his bizarre behavior.

The Moor's life is completely different. He is brutish and wicked, but his splendid appearance fascinates the Ballerina, who tries to seduce him using all her charms and finally succeeds. Just at the moment of the love scene, Petrouchka appears, enraged with jealousy, but the Moor quickly throws him out the door.

The Shrovetide fair is at its height. Coachmen and grooms dance with wet-nurses, a bear-tamer appears with his bear, and a merchant playing the accordion, accompanied by two gypsy dancers, amuses himself by throwing handfuls of bank notes to the crowd. Finally, a band of mummers sweeps everyone up in a diabolical dance. All at once, cries are heard from the Magician's little theatre. The rivalry between the Moor and Petrouchka has finally taken a tragic turn. The animated puppets dash from the theatre, and the Moor knocks Petrouchka down with a blow of his sabre. The wretched Petrouchka dies in the snow, surrounded by the holiday crowd. The Magician, fetched by a policeman, hastens to reassure everyone, and in his hands Petrouchka becomes a puppet again. The Magician invites the crowd to verify that the puppet's head is wooden and the body filled with bran. The crowd disperses, leaving the Magician alone. To his great terror, the Magician catches sight of Petrouchka's ghost above the little theatre, menacing and mocking him.

Lisa Pribanic has performed extensively throughout the United States and Europe, and has appeared as soloist with orchestras in France, Maryland and Montana. Lisa Pribanic was raised in Montana and studied in Seattle, Chicago and Baltimore with teachers including Stephen Kates, Lucien Laporte and Alan Harris. She also studied for three years at the Kneisel Hall for Chamber Music in Blue Hill. She has served on the faculties of the Levine School of Music. Mt. Vernon College, and Essex Community College.
