I trust that you can take the whole bunch there are some of the pieces I would not want to sell separately. I find since I originally made you price of \$20.00 on the Beaver Banner Bow in my first offer that it is really worth a great deal more than that, as I could probably get \$35.00 to \$40.00 for it from the Museums who are looking for such rare pieces, however, I do not like to make an offer on some thing and then raise it, I probably am foolish for letting it as well as the other pieces go but I made you the offer once and therefore give you an option on them.

I have removed the bone spear head from the Beaver Banner Bow and tacked it between two cardboards onto the board for the reason that if it had been left in the Bow it would have run chances of being broken while in transit, it was broken at one time before I got hold of it but not badly and is in the same condition as when I got it several years ago, the buckskin thong that held it in place I wrapped around the end of the bow so that it will be an easy matter to replace it and secure it by wrapping.
