


A doctor, who administered to the house call in the 19th century on horseback or horse and buggy, and worked well into the 20th century by learning to make use of the horseless carriage.

PROLOGUE

H. F. Eames, Doctor

Horace Franklin Eames for a period of near 50 years contributed so much to Egg Harbor, northern Door County, and the county as a whole. Yet, not a whole lot remains, even some of the stories are tainted a bit from lost memory. Oh, the extensive condominium layout to the east of the Village is called Eames Farm Condominiums, but few know why; and then there is the building once called 'LaVista' which stands on the north side of the Cupola House, but what is its significance?

H. F. Eames, it appears he wished to be called, since seldom in this book will you read his calling as Horace Franklin. Early in his Door County exposure he used Franklin or Frank, but it didn't take long until it was just H. F.

H. F. Eames was born on May 30, 1859 in Masham, Quebec, Canada to Horace W. and Asenah Eames who were farmers who had moved to Quebec about 1857 to engage in the lumber business. H. F. arrived in Door County in 1876 at age 17 with his parents and again returned to farming.

H. F.'s education was in Canada, but as was found doing research it appears that he attended the Oshkosh Normal School, in Oshkosh, Wisconsin after his arrival in Door County and before 1881. At that time Oshkosh Normal would have been one of the state's one, or two, year teacher training institutes. The sole research for this project has been the use of the Door County Library's Door County Newspaper Archive website. The first reference of H. F. Eames livelihood in Door County in the newspaper archives was in 1881, teaching school in Egg Harbor and Clay Banks in southern Door County on the Lake Michigan side of the county, far from being a successful doctor in Egg Harbor. The story from teacher to doctor and his other ventures is very intriguing.

It should be noted that I used the Door County Library's website with a great deal of success on compiling a book in 2016 on "Horseshoe Bay, Before the Farm". The writing has already been done by the reporters and newspaper editors of the time, it's just a matter of compiling the news into a weekly diary of life at the time being researched. It again proved to be a successful approach as I was able to follow the life of H. F. Eames from teacher to doctor with his many sideline activities that made for one of the real pioneer contributors in the development of medicine, agriculture, transportation, education, communication and politics in Door County; a real pioneer community activist he was.

Doctor Eames and his wife Emma had seven children who made things interesting in and around Egg Harbor. Two of the daughters liked shopping in Marinette and Menominee, so how did they get to there from Egg Harbor in the late 1800s, early 1900s? There were a good number of trips by boat during the sailing season and by ice transportation in the winter. It was a time of afternoon buggy rides to Fish Creek or Baileys Harbor, and sleigh rides behind a favorite horse to visit friends in Jacksonport.

Dr. Eames' diary will give a picture of family life at the time as the children grew and attended the area school, or not in the area. It wasn't until 1918 that there was a district high school; before then, if an Eames went to high school they had to board in Sturgeon Bay. The almost weekly news releases involving the Eames name helped describe occupational, social and recreational activities of the time. People involved with people was a way of life. Of interest is the amount of time and effort the Doctor put into his agricultural and other endeavors. Starting with the book's first entry dated September 22, 1881, the formation of the Door County Teachers Association, if there was an association to join, rest assured he'd join and usually end up holding a leadership position. H. F.'s first endeavor was that of a teacher.

Sept. 22, 1881- DC Advocate – DOOR CO. TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

The teachers of the county have met a long felt need by organizing a county teachers' association. A five days' meeting was held in the court room last week, during which much good was done.

Among those present were Miss Matilda Arlt, of Bailey's Harbor; Ella Bacchus, of Horn's Pier; Lizzie Hanson, Jennie Dreutzer, Hattie Squier of Sturgeon Bay and Messrs. L. L. Bacchus, of Manitowoc County; H. F. Eames, from the Oshkosh Normal School; C. M. Smith, W. L. Damkoehler, E.G. Munn and James Keogh, Jr., of this village.

The Door County Teachers' Association will hold its first annual meeting in the high school building, Sturgeon Bay, Wis., on Saturday, October 8. The program for the day will be as follows:

A. M.—Reading, E. G. Munn; Geography, Grammar, W. L. Damkoehler.

P. M.—Paper on, "Hygiene of the School-room," Thos. Walsh; Phonics, Hattie M. Squier; U.S. History, H. F. Eames.

Nov. 3, 1881 - DC Advocate - EDUCATIONAL - CONDUCTED BY C. M. SMITH, PRESIDENT OF THE DOOR COUNTY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION. Second Regular Meeting of the DOOR CO. Teachers' Association.

It being impossible for the teachers in the northern portion of the county to meet with us here, arrangements have been made to hold the next meeting in the school house in Dist. No. 1, town of Bailey's Harbor, on Saturday, Nov. 19. It is proposed to organize a branch meeting in that portion of the county, for the benefit of those who can not attend here.

The program for the 19th will consist of exercises in State Geography, by H. F. Eames, of Egg Harbor; Arithmetic, classification of numbers and factoring, by Miss Ula D. Noble, of Bailey's Harbor; Civil Government, executive department of state and U.S., by L. L. Bacchus, of Bailey's Harbor; and Grammar, formation of

plurals, by J. W. Kinsel, of Fish Creek. C. M. SMITH, President.

Nov. 24, 1881 - DC Advocate - EDUCATIONAL - CONDUCTED BY C. M. SMITH, PRESIDENT OF THE DOOR COUNTY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION. Third Regular Meeting of the Door County Teachers' Association.

The meeting of the Teachers' Association, held at Bailey's Harbor on Saturday, the 19th inst., proved to be very interesting and instructive, even surpassing anticipations of all. Among those present were Misses U. D. Noble, Matilda Arlt, Clara V. Higgins, Messrs. C. M. Smith, J. W. Kinsel, H. F. Eames and L. L. Bacchus.

(Exercises were presented)

The 4th Exercise—Geography of Wisconsin—was presented by Mr. Eames, in which map drawing was discussed, and illustrations given.

Jan. 19, 1882 - DC Advocate – Fifth Regular Meeting of the Door County Teachers' Association.

At a regular meeting of the Door County Teachers' Association, held at Sturgeon Bay, Saturday, January 14, 1882, the following persons were present: Misses A. M. Uecke, L. M. Prescott, May Doucet, Hattie M. Squier. Messrs. T. J. Walsh, Jerry Madden, E. Cayo, H. F. Eames, J. W. Kinsel, H. T. Scudder, Jas. McNeel, Henry Bassford, M. S. Shaler and C. M. Smith.

After reading of minutes, Mr. Jerry Madden read a paper upon "The History of United States from Hayes Nomination until the Present Time." Discussion of various points of historical and political interest followed. Mr. Madden was requested to present his paper to the president for printing in the Educational Column of the THE ADVOCATE

The subject, "Minds", was presented by Miss May Doucet and the same discussed. The meeting then took a recess until 1:30 P.M., at which time Mr. H. T. Sudder enter-

tained the association with a paper upon "What Should be Taught in Our Public Schools?", supplementing the reading with remarks upon the same question. This gave rise to an argument upon the object of our public schools, and the way to attain the end desired. Mr. J. W. Kinsel then presented an exercise in Penmanship, the teachers present taking the place of pupils.

Agreeable to the will of the association, the next meeting will be held at Fish Creek, Saturday, Jan. 28 at the usual hour, 10 o'clock A.M. A second meeting was appointed for Sturgeon Bay, February 4. For various reasons, it was decided to hold the latter meeting in the afternoon and evening, the afternoon session to begin at one o'clock.

Feb. 23, 1882 - DC Advocate – The only schools in the town of Egg Harbor in session this winter were taught by Frank Eames and Miss Vida Weborg. Both are now closed, and Mr. Eames is taking a week or two of rest before going to Valpariso, Ind., where he contemplates attending school.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

The teachers' institute began Tuesday morning with an enrollment of thirty-one members, which has been increased today (Wednesday) to thirty-four. It is expected that at least forty will be in attendance before the close of the week. This is a much larger number than has ever before congregated in this county for a similar purpose, and furnishes a percentage of the entire number of teachers which is surpassed by few counties in the state. Clay Banks has one of the neatest country school houses in this county. The building referred to has just been finished by contractor James Tuft; is brick veneered, with green window blinds, and a job done up in honor, from peak in roof to last course of stone in foundation. H. F. Eames, is the lucky teacher to first start the young ideas to shoot correctly, in the model school house.

Dec. 21, 1882 - DC Advocate – CLAY BANKS

A Good Templars lodge was organized in this town last Saturday evening at the house of Julius Warren. Twenty members signed the charter, and the following officers were chosen for the ensuing term: Hugh McMullen, W.C.T.; Mrs. D. D. Spalsbury, W.V.T.; H. F. Eames, W.R.S.; Miss Nellie Darling, W.F.S.; D. D. Spalsbury, W.T.; Mrs. Albert Tufts, W.C.; O. Millard, W.M.; Miss Bertha Tyler, W.D.M.; Mrs. Jas. Tufts, W.I.G.; Walter McMullen, W.O.G.; Julius Warren, P.W.C; Mrs. Hugh McMullen, R.H.S.; Mrs. Julius Warren, L.H.S.; Miss Nettie Spalsbury, W.A.S.

About fifty visiting members of the order from Sturgeon Bay and vicinity assisted in instituting the lodge, which starts off under the most favorable auspices. It has been christened "Maplewood Lodge."

Jan. 25, 1883 - DC Advocate - Teachers Meeting. First Meeting of Door County Teachers' Association of Dist. No. 2, Held at Sturgeon Bay, Jan. 20, 1883.

Meeting called to order, at 10:35 A.M, by Vice-President Walsh. Teachers present: Messrs. Smith, Walsh, Eames, Rathbun, Lorge and Kreuger, Misses Jenkins, Prescott, Tomblason, Burnet, Bell, Doucet, and Mrs. Coffrin.

The secretary, Miss Feldmann, being absent, Miss Bell appointed secretary pro-tem.

Introductory remarks by Vice-President Walsh, giving reasons for not holding the first annual meeting earlier followed by President Smith on the non-attendance of teachers at these meetings.

Exercises opened by Mr. Eames. Subject: Fundamental Operations in Arithmetic; followed an exercise in U.S. History, conducted by Miss Burnet.

Motion to adjourn till 1:30 P.M., carried.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Teachers not present in the morning, Miss Feldmann and Messrs. Cayo and Immler, Number of visitors, seven.

The first exercise, Geography of Door County, by O. M. Smith, followed by a discussion of the same.

The conductor of the exercise in Grammar, Mr. Damkoenler, being absent; by motion, Miss Squier, was requested to conduct the exercise. Motion to change the order of exercises, in order to give Miss Squier time to prepare, carried.

Civil Government conducted by Mr. Walsh, Mr. Cayo occupying the chair. By motion, an intermission of ten minutes taken.

Exercise in Grammar and Analysis, followed by discussion of the same.

Motion carried that four, be appointed to discuss the functions of the meetings, at the next meeting: Messrs. Smith, and Rathbun, Misses Squier and Doucet.

Motion to adjourn, till Feb. 10, 1883, carried. Adjourned.

March 1, 1883 - DC Advocate – CLAY BANKS

The school in the second district, presided over by H. F. Eames, closed last Friday, and in the evening the teacher and pupils gave an exhibition, which was attended by a large number of people, the building being crowded.

The following scholars are entitled to special mention on account of their high standing in the respective examinations at the end of the term, namely: Eugene Madden, Bertha Tyler, Mary Hoslett, Eugene Campbell, Ruth Hickaby, Isa Horn, Fricheof Berg, and Ev. Warren.

The spring term will open in two weeks, but up to the present time the district officers have not been able to agree on a teacher. Mr. Eames has returned to Egg Harbor, where he will take up certain studies preparatory to attending the college at Valpariso, Ind., next summer.

May 14, 1887 - DC Advocate – After taking a course of lectures in a medical college, H.F. Eames has been awarded a diploma to pursue the healing art, and he is now located in the village of Waucedah, Menominee County, Mich. Dr. Eames was a former resident of Sevastopol and is well known to many of our residents.

June 15, 1888 - The Independent - VOSEVILLE.

Mrs. H. F. Eames returned a few days ago from Stephenson, Mich., where she had been visiting her son, Dr. Frank Eames.

Sept. 28, 1888 - The Independent – EGG HARBOR.

May 24, 1889 - The Independent – EGG HARBOR.

Dr. H. F. Eames has concluded to remain a citizen of Egg Harbor and has purchased the house recently occupied by Levi Baraboo. He has also purchased a fine horse and buggy with which he can make quick time when called by a patient.

EGG HARBOR, April 7. - You were in error concerning Dr. Eames, as he does not intend to leave Egg Harbor. He says he has a good practice, has been very successful, and has no reason to be dissatisfied. We do not want him to leave us, so don't try to send him down to Tennessee or you will make trouble in the family.

Dr. H. F. Eames informs your reporter that he does not intend to leave Egg Harbor for some time and we are all glad that he will remain with us.

May 2, 1890 - The Independent – EGG HARBOR.

A daughter of Fred Leverage fell from a straw stack and cut her right leg severely on a hay knife but at present is doing well under the care of Dr. Eames.

May 16, 1890 - The Independent – GIBRALTAR.

Dr. Eames of Egg Harbor passed through this place on Thursday evening on his way to Liberty Grove to visit Mrs. Carl Seiler, Sr., who had contracted a severe cold. The doctor returned on the following day and informed us that his patient was doing well.

June 13, 1890 – The Independent – EGG HARBOR.

Considerable excitement was occasioned on Saturday by the appearance in our village of a large black bear. The animal came from the water near Thorp & Son's pier, walked up the bank and crossing the road passed through the field into the adjacent woods, taking a southeasterly course. Truman A. Thorp was quite indisposed but upon hearing of the bear he hustled out of bed and seizing his Winchester started on the war-path. Dr. Eames was in the store waiting for his mail, but immediately lost his interest in literature when he heard the alarm, and ran home to obtain his gun, stripping as he went for a race, but was disappointed by finding upon his arrival at the house that somebody else had already obtained the rifle and was in hot pursuit. This would have discouraged some persons but did not trouble the doctor much, for he seized his case of instruments and took the trail in order to assist at the post mortem. Levi Baraboo shouldered his trusty double-barreled shotgun, rammed down a charge of bird-shot, put in a handful of powder, and started for the scene forgetting to take any caps with him. Charles LaRouche followed in Levi's wake, rolling up his sleeves preparatory to a have fencing bout with Bruin, and Antoine

LaPlant, our worthy butcher, joined the procession with a beef tongue in his hand, his design being to try the effect of "moral 'suasion" on the bear. About the only person who did not take part in the pursuit was our assistant P.M., Mr. Steele, who was obliged by official duties to remain at his post. He says he hopes that the next bear will come on some other day than Saturday and when the southern and northern mails have not arrived at the same time and the store is not full of customers. There were about twenty children in the road when the bear crossed it and of course there was a scattering, but the animal did not seem to care just then for that kind of provender and paid no attention to the little ones. Your reporter left before the return of the pursuing party and has not yet learned which came out ahead, the dog or the wolf.

Bears are becoming altogether too numerous in this vicinity, and it might be well to organize a grand hunting expedition for the purpose of cleaning them out. M.E.L.

Kimber. The Dr. was getting ready to go to Milwaukee in the interest of his own health, being affected with what is apparently dropsy of the lungs.

June 20, 1891 - DC Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

Dr. Eames spent some little time here last week attending to business matters. He is located at Rapid River, Mich.

Aug. 8, 1891 - DC Advocate – SEVAS-TOPOL.

James Gillespie, Jr., and Miss Lila Eames are to be married today (Saturday), and a grand reception takes place at the home of the groom in the evening of that day. The bride is a sister of Frank Eames, whose home is near Voseville.

Oct. 3, 1891 - DC Advocate – DIED IN MENOMINEE.

Mrs. Asenath Eames, of Sevastopol, died at Menominee last Saturday under peculiarly distressing circumstances. She left for that city Tuesday of last week on the Moore to visit her two daughters, Mrs. James Major and Mrs. Ira Collins, who are residents of Menominee.

Arriving there toward evening the woman was unable to find where her relatives lived, and after wandering aimlessly about the streets for several hours was finally directed to the home of the Methodist minister by a policeman.

Here Mrs. Eames was hospitably received and entertained by the good clergyman's family but on the following morning it was found that the poor woman's mind had become deranged and that she was quite incapable of helping herself.

Her relatives had in the meantime been found and informed of the circumstances. Being taken to the home of one of her daughters subsequently everything was done to restore the patient to the normal condition of health and mind again but all efforts proved unavailing, and after remaining in a semi-unconscious condition nearly

all the time, life went out on Saturday.

Mrs. Eames was the wife of Wm . Eames, and at the time of her death was a few weeks less than forty-nine years age. She was the mother of Fred and Dr. Eames and of Mesdames: Major Collins, Walter Kimber and James Gillespie, Jr. She was also a sister of Mrs. Michael Hogan, of this city.

The remains were brought here Sunday and conveyed to the home of Mrs. Kimber. The funeral took place from the Congregational church Monday morning, Rev. Geo . H . Anderson officiating.

April 23, 1898 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Miss Annie Carlson, of Fish Creek, is employed as domestic in the household of Dr. Eames.

May 28, 1898 – The Advocate - Health Officer.

July 8, 1898 – The Advocate - The Sterminger Suicide.

Last week's ADVOCATE had only a brief announcement of the suicide of Mrs. Ernest Sterminger, since which time additional particulars regarding the tragedy have been forthcoming.

The direct cause of the suicide was doubtless domestic infelicity and misery. On June 27th the woman had had some trouble with her husband, who it is alleged, charged her with infidelity to her marriage vows. She left the house and was not seen again until her dead body was found in the hay loft of the barn two days afterward. She called at the home of Aug. Anschutz, Sr., and solicited the loan of twenty-five cents. She said that she desired to obtain some medicine with the money. The small amount was given her and on Wednesday she proceeded to Egg Harbor, where she invested in a pound of paris green. This amounted to twenty-three cents. The balance was invested in candy.

While in the barn Thursday Sterminger was struck by the queer antics of the dog. On making an investigation to ascertain the cause he found the dead body of his wife lying on the hay in one of the mows. He lost no time in giving the alarm, and Mr. Anschutz rapidly drove to the village of Jacksonport and informed Justice Joseph Johnson, Jr., of the facts. The latter forthwith impanelled a

coroner's jury preparatory to holding an inquest. The panel was composed of Aug. Anschutz, Sr., John Anschutz, Chas. Wagner, Rudolph Lautenbach, John Miller and Gustav Lautenbach. After viewing the remains and having them properly arranged and a watch placed over them, an adjournment was taken until 8 o'clock Friday morning to permit the summoning of material witnesses, among them being Dr. Frank Eames, at whose drug store the paris green had been purchased. A post mortem examination was made by the Dr. soon after the inquest was resumed and fully half a pound of deadly poison found in the stomach. A verdict was returned in accordance with the facts, and her remains consigned to her friends. Deceased was 51 years old and came to Jacksonport with her husband a number of years ago from Germany. There were no children. The remains were interned in the town cemetery on Saturday.

August 27, 1898 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Capt. Wilson's dog that was rescued from the Pride is now the property of Dr. H. F. Eames, the captain making him a present of the brute. The doctor has named him "Hobson" and he is destined to become a general favorite. (*related happening*).....A terrific cyclone swept the peninsula last Monday night. It was by far the most destructive storm that ever visited this section. Previous to the outburst the heavens presented an awe inspiring appearance, the clouds hanging like a pall, and at six o'clock the storm burst with all its fury. Two lives were lost at Egg Harbor. Two little hookers, the Norma, of Green Bay, and the Pride, of Milwaukee, were lying at anchor near shore at Egg Harbor with all sail down and made snug. Both capsized, bottom side up, in an instant and two sailors found a watery grave. They were Mr. Wilson, son of Capt. J. Wilson, of the Pride, aged 24 years, and Louis Tillman, son of C. Tillman, a Green Bay farmer, aged 21 years...A Newfoundland dog was rescued from the cabin of the Pride, still

alive, although he had been closed in from Monday until Wednesday. It seems incredible that the animal should survive. (*it was Hobson*)

Oct. 8, 1898 – The Advocate - Four of the six men and boys charged with rioting in the town of Egg Harbor were bound over to the circuit court by Justice Dehos on Wednesday evening. These are Geo. Thos. Jr. and Wm. Carmody and Geo. Papeneau, The two acquitted were John and Frank Carmody.

Nearly three days were consumed in the preliminary examination. The complaint was sworn out by Jerry LeMere, the proprietor of the saloon at Egg Harbor.

It appears from the testimony of disinterested witnesses who were in the saloon at the time that the six named above marched into the place and without any loss of time began kicking up a disturbance. Geo. Carmody made for the bartender, Emil LeMere, and began thumping him about the head with what is supposed to have been a cobble stone. The young man cried out for help to his father, saying that they were trying to kill him. LeMere senior tried to go to the assistance of his son, but was seized by Papeneau and others and in the scuffle that ensued had his shirt torn. Meanwhile George Carmody continued to maul Emil, and when the intruders were finally driven out of the room the young man was found to have been so badly cut about the head that Dr. Eames was called upon to dress the wound. Emil was too ill to come to the city to testify, the doctor having prohibited his leaving his room, and the examination was conducted without his testimony.

Jan. 28, 1899 – The Advocate – JACKSONPORT.

Steve Schneider is on the sick list. The trouble appears to be with the lungs. Dr. Eames is the attending physician, and it is hoped that a permanent cure will be effected in good time.

Walter Lee was quite badly hurt a few days ago while driving a fractious team. Dr. 13

Eames attended to his injuries and at this writing he is resting a little easier, all his friends and acquaintances will be pleased to hear.

Oct. 28, 1899 – The Advocate – August Colomb, of Egg Harbor, called in to see us while in the city Wednesday. He reports that his wife is very ill with an affliction of the liver and gall, and she was low at one time that her life hung in the balance for some hours. Dr. Eames has the case in charge and he hopes to pull the patient through in good time.

Feb. 17, 1900 – The Advocate – FISH CREEK.

Thor Anderson is lying at home in the southwestern part of this town disabled from the effects of a serious runaway accident which happened him two weeks ago Wednesday. In returning from the county seat on the evening of that day his team ran away, the accident happening in coming down the hill near Ole Haltung's. Mr. Anderson was so badly affected that he became unconscious and was therefore unable to take care of himself. When he finally revived, which was several hours afterward, he managed to crawl to the nearest habitation, where he apprised the people of his condition. It was found that one of the horses was so seriously injured that it had to be killed to put it beyond further suffering. It was also found that both of Mr. Anderson's feet were badly frost-bitten. Likewise one of the hands. Dr. Eames was summoned, and he hopes to be able to save the limbs, although it be necessary to amputate one of the toes. Take it altogether, the accident was a pretty serious thing for Mr. Anderson. The horse was valued at \$40. The rig was also more or less damaged.

EGG HARBOR - One day last week the horse team of John T. Carmody got frightened at a passing stage and ran away. Their course was in a northerly direction, and when they reached the foot of the hill opp-

osite L. D. Mowry's place the brutes ran into a barbed wire fence, cutting themselves quite badly. Mr. Carmody, who was thrown from the wagon, received some bad cuts and bruises about the head and face but Dr. Eames fixed him up so that no serious results will follow. That was a bad place for a runaway, and no mistake.

March 10, 1900 – DC Democrat – JACKSONPORT.

On Friday forenoon of last week Burt LeClair met with an accident that well nigh cost him his life. He was an employee of the Leist, Schneider Co's saw mill and having finished for the time being the work he was at, he was called to assist one of the other employees of the mill. Instead of passing around the slab-saw, as he should have done, he attempted to crawl under it. In so doing his coat was caught by the revolving saw and before he could be extricated the saw had cut a gash of about ten inches in length in his right side just glancing one of the ribs. Drs. Eames and Simon attended him and he is now doing as well as can be expected. His was a most wonderful escape from death and we hope it will serve as a warning to those boys who spend so much time in play at the mill.

June 23, 1900 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Geo. Grovogel is quiet ill with inflammation of the bowels. He is being attended by Dr. Eames. At this writing he is somewhat better than he has been.

July 21, 1900 – DC Democrat – FISH CREEK.

The cruel hand of death entered the home of Mrs. E. J. Kinsey, July 10, and took there from the youngest son, Ingham. He would have been 21 years of age, had he lived till the 22nd of August. Death was caused by diphtheria with which he was taken one week ago last Sunday and was improving nicely, so his relatives and Dr. Welcker, the attending physician, supposed. He was taken worse Monday morning about one o'clock. Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor, was called at once, but he did not give them any hope as he said blood poisoning had set in such form that recovery was impossible. Another physician was at once summoned from Sturgeon Bay. He arrived about twenty minutes before death put an end to the young man's sufferings. This is one of the saddest deaths that has occurred here for years. The entire community is in sympathy with the family and would do all they could to render assistance, but the disease being of such contagious nature made it impossible

for kind friends to offer even words of consolation and sympathy to the heart broken mother, and sorrowing brothers and sisters. But may they receive comfort, greater than earthly friends can offer, in this severe trial. It can be said of the young man; he had no enemies, was beloved by all who knew him and will be greatly missed among the circle of young people of this village. He was quietly laid to rest Tuesday afternoon in the cemetery at Blossomburg by the side of his father and brother, the former having died about ten or twelve years ago and the latter about six years ago.

August 4, 1900 – DC Democrat – JACKSONPORT.

Mr. Fitzsimmons, father of Nicholas Fitzsimmons, dislocated his shoulder by falling from a rig. His horse became frightened and started off at a good clatter. Before the runaway could be stopped Mr. Fitzsimmons was thrown from the outfit in such a manner as to dislocate his shoulder as aforementioned. Dr. F. Eames, of Egg Harbor, was called to attend him and he is now doing as well as can be expected.

Nov. 10, 1900 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

The Republicans owe much to Dr. Eames for the splendid showing that Egg Harbor has made in the last campaign. He was indefatigable in his efforts to get out the voters and to see to it that their ballots were cast right. As soon as the result for the head of the ticket was known the Dr. dispatched a messenger to Fish Creek on a wheel and the news was wired to Chairman Overbeck at the county seat, and Egg Harbor was among the first of the towns to report, although it is about six miles from a telephone station. Such enterprise is highly commendable and duly appreciated by the public.

Dec. 29, 1900 – DC Democrat – JACKSONPORT.

Mrs. Moses Sawyer has been and is still very sick. Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor, is the

attending physician. Rev. Fr. Van de Castele was summoned to her bedside. Although seriously ill, Dr. Eames has hopes of her recovery.

Dec. 29, 1900 – The Advocate - Some generously disposed person having donated \$50 for a traveling library to be utilized by the people of Jacksonport, another one is about to double this sum to secure similar advantages for the towns of Egg Harbor and Washington. Mrs. M. A. Allen, wife of the late Prof. W. F. Allen, of Madison, is the lady who has manifested a desire to donate the latter amount on condition that one of the libraries be sent to the island. Dr. Eames and B.L. Andersen have been designated as the proper parties to take charge of the matter in their respective towns.

Feb. 9, 1901 – DC Democrat – STURGEON BAY. Mrs. Walter Kimber Dead.

Mrs. Walter Kimber, of this city, lies cold in death, the sad news of her sudden taking away, which occurred Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, being a shock to her many friends. The direct cause of death was child birth, after a severe illness of a day and a half duration. The infant also died at birth.

Mrs. Kimber suffered much, and as death seemed inevitable her husband set out Wednesday morning for Egg Harbor for her brother Dr. Eames and only a few hours after she breathed her last.

Mrs. Kimber's maiden name was Ella Eames. She was born in Canada on April 11, 1865, and was therefore aged 36 years, nine months and twenty-six days.

She leaves a husband and four young children to mourn the death of a loving wife and kind mother.

The funeral takes place this (Friday) afternoon at 2 o'clock, from the Congregational church.

Mrs. Fred Londo and sons Frank, of Wausaukee, Joe, Andrew, and Louis and daughter Mrs. Joe Burgo, of Wells, Mich. were here to attend the funeral of their daughter and sister, Mrs. Frank LeMere.

Mrs. Londo arrived but one hour too late to see her daughter alive, the rest coming a day or two later.

On Wednesday afternoon of last week at 4 o'clock Mrs. Frank LeMere passed away. She was taken ill with confinement on Saturday and being of a frail nature, with a complication of the grippe and pleurisy in the side, could not withhold. The child being born dead a young husband is left to mourn a double loss. They were married but a year and a day at the time death

plucked its victim. Dr. Eames was the attending physician. The remains were interred in the Catholic burying ground, Father Van de Castele performing the ceremonies. The child and mother were buried together. A large concourse of friends following to the last resting place with deep sympathy for the mourners.

July 13, 1901 – DC Democrat – Hunting License.

The amended game laws makes it necessary for a hunter to be provided with, a license this year in order to legally hunt any

kind of game, even rabbits. The law went into effect July 1st. The license fee is \$1.00. Up to date, licenses have been issued to the following: H. C Scofield, Wilson Warner, Truman Thorp, Earl Thorp and Dr. H. F Eames.

August 24, 1901 – The Advocate - Mrs. Volney Garrett spent a week or so in visiting her daughter, Mrs. Dr. Eames, in Egg Harbor. Mr. Garrett is the owner of one of the most intelligent dogs to be found on the island or elsewhere. He is a Collie, and capable of doing almost everything except to speak. When ordered to hunt up and bring in the cows he responds with promptness and rarely ever fails to carry out the wishes of his master. Mr. Garrett obtained the brute from some party on the west shore while still quite young, and its cost was about \$6. But the owner would not part with his pet for ten times that sum if he could not obtain another as good.

Mrs. Joseph Wilson, better known to the people of this town as Grandma Wilson, was taken from among us Saturday morning with what Dr. Eames pronounced hemorrh-

age of the stomach. She was eighty-six years, seven months and twenty-seven days old, and was born near Elgin, Scotland, April 3, 1815. Her maiden name was Margaret Hossaok.

Dec. 14, 1901 – DC Democrat – JACK-SONPORT.

Dr. Eames spent Monday here vaccinating. Smallpox surrounds us, but a case is not known of in the town.

Jan. 11, 1902 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

Frank Wenk fell from the loft in the barn last week and shattered the ankle bone of his left foot. The accident will keep him indoors for the balance of the winter, if not longer. Dr. Eames has the case.

Jan. 18, 1902 – DC Democrat – FISH CREEK.

Mrs. Lord, our dressmaker, has been incapacitated from work for the past two weeks by a troublesome felon. Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor recently lanced it and it is very probable that it will soon cease to trouble her. By the way, Mrs. Lord is giving it the best of satisfaction in the dressmaking line and the result is an increasing amount of patronage.

Jan. 25, 1902 – The Advocate - A meeting of the chairmen and health officers of the northern part of the county convened at Valmy on Tuesday at the request of Dr. B. A. Norden, medical inspector for this county. The meeting was held at the office of Dr. H. R. Simon, and the following towns were represented: Sturgeon Bay (city)—Mayor Jos. Harris, Dr. H. A. Norden; Sevastopol—Dr. H. R. Simon, Nic. Moeller, Wm. Walker; Baileys Harbor - Roger Eatough, Dr. Voigt; Jacksonport - Matt. Jonas, Wilder Brooks; Egg Harbor – Dr.

H. F. Eames, Frank Wellever; Gibraltar - J. A. Smith, Josiah Judd, John Brown.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the situation in regard to the spreading of the

smallpox and other contagious diseases in the country districts. It was decided to take active and vigorous measures to stamp out the smallpox epidemic that is getting a foothold in some of the towns. A rigid and strict quarantine will be established and enforced, and more modern methods of fumigation adopted, formaldehyde being decided upon as a substitute for sulphur. It is confidently anticipated that if the people will lend their aid to the efforts of the officials by reporting all suspicious cases the disease can soon be wiped out.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved; That in order to check the further spread of the prevailing epidemic of smallpox the following measures are advised:

First: Vigorous prosecution for all persons who fail to report cases of eruptive diseases, whether smallpox or other diseases that resemble it.

Second: The arrest of persons leaving a quarantined house and entering any other house thereby exposing its inmates to the disease.

Third: The prosecution of persons who enter a house that is quarantined.

Fourth: The arrest and prosecution of persons who resist the application of necessary precautions.

Fifth: The most thorough disinfection of premises and of persons who have been infected.

Sixth: The vaccination of all persons exposed to the disease.

Seventh : The most widespread application of vaccination to all persons of whatever age, as this is the most effective method of stamping out this dreaded disease.

For all of these measures we pledge ourselves to use our utmost endeavors to promote. Dr. H. A. NORDEN, DR. H. R. SIMON, Dr. H. F. EAMES, FRANK WELLS, ROGER EATOUGH, Committee.

May 21, 1902 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

A little son arrived at the home of Dr. Eames on the 20th, and his advent has created profound joy in the household.

August 9, 1902 – DC Democrat – JACKSONPORT.

Roseoe, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Bagnal had the misfortune of breaking his arm in two places one day this week. He was employed in making a play house when a plank overbalanced the affair causing the whole to fall upon his arm breaking as aforesaid. They took him to Egg Harbor to consult Dr. Eames and he not being at home they at once went to Dr. Silbree who set the limb and placed it in a Plaster of Paris cast. The little fellow is getting along nicely and feeling as well as can be expected.

Sept. 27, 1902 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

Negotiations are pending looking to the ultimate purchase of the Fred Hanson property by Dr. Eames. If the deal is closed it will not include the pier and banking ground. Mr. Hanson desires to re-engage in the creamery business supplemented by farming, his success in the latter avocation the past season having stimulated this branch of industry.

Oct. 25, 1902 – The Advocate - While in the city Monday Gus. Peterson sold his farm of 120 acres in the northern part Egg Harbor to Dr. H. F. Eames of the same place. Consideration, \$2,000, and the purchaser regards it as a bargain. The deal was brought about by Abner Calhoun.

Nov. 8, 1902 – DC Democrat - SISTER BAY.

Dr. H. F. Eames, of Egg Harbor, was seen here this week, being here on pro-

fessional business.

Nov. 22, 1902 – The Advocate - Thos. F. Carmody who was in the city Wednesday, announces that he has sold out his portable sawmill to parties in Michigan and returned to his old home to live. He this week contracted for a new outfit which will be set up at Egg Harbor in due time and used in the manufacture of lath, shingles, etc. The mill will be stationed near the Eames pier.

Jan. 24, 1903 – DC Democrat – FISH CREEK.

It is a longtime since so much sickness prevailed in this town than is at present. Many are suffering from touches of pneumonia. Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor is kept busy attending patients here in consequence.

Jan. 24, 1903 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

May, the 5-year-old daughter of Charles Ellis, was shockingly burned last Sunday evening while the family was at the home of Denis Burlow, a nearby neighbor. May with an older sister and one or two children of the neighbors, were playing about the room when her dress accidentally took fire from the stove and before the flames could be smothered the left side from the ankle to the armpit had been badly burned. Dr. Eames was hurriedly summoned, and he hopes to get the little one through, although that part of the body may be scarred forever.

Feb. 21, 1903 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Dr. Eames has purchased a fine big Clyde mare to be used on his farm.

Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor, made a professional call to Sister Bay last Saturday.

March 14, 1903 – The Advocate – SISTER BAY.

Andy, the eldest son of Chas. Maguette, had the ill fortune to break the right leg between the knee and foot on Friday night 19

of last week. He was assisting his father in the flouring department of the mill here and attempted to kick the belt off a revolving pulley when in some manner unknown the limb was caught and the bone fractured. Dr. Eames was summoned from Egg Harbor and on his arrival the broken parts were mended in a professional and satisfactory manner. Andy is about 16 years old, and his many friends all hope for his early and permanent recovery.

It will be interesting to learn what the test of the roots is on the different farms which raised them.

Dec. 12 – 1903 – The Advocate - Dr. Frank Eames, of Egg Harbor, spent a few hours here last Tuesday on business and otherwise, during which he extended this office a very pleasant call.

Jan. 16, 1904 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Dr. H. F. Eames, the owner of the local dock property is receiving large quantities of wood this season, which is stored upon his premises near the dock. According to the gentleman's estimate the supply of wood from these parts is being exhausted and will not again equal this year's output.

The third series of teachers' meetings was held at Baileys Harbor, Saturday, Jan. 16th. Owing to the inclemency of the weather, and the poor condition of the roads, many of the teachers did not attend. Those who attended were Garth Rudolph, Roy Stephenson, J. A. Eichinger, Martyn Bacon, Martha Sanger, Nelly Nelson, Mary Shram, Lucy Toft, Mary Manny, Anna Snyder, Gladys Eames and Vera Thorp.

Jan. 23, 1904 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

A rather serious accident befell Luther Card, a young man residing on his father's farm about one mile north of this burg, The young man was driving a team with a load of wood over a very rough road and at one place the incline proved so great that the load was capsized. Young Card, the driver, who was on the load was thrown against some hard material which injured him quite severely. His face was bruised and his upper or Superior Maxillary was broken with two teeth missing. He was put under the care of our local physician, Dr. H. F. Eames, who attended to the broken parts and the young

man is recovering satisfactorily.

Among those who availed themselves of the chance last Friday to see the sugar beet factory were: Theo. Peterson, Louis Larson, Julius Fischer, John Bertschinger, Dr. Eames. and James Wilson. There were a great number of farmers from Jacksonport who took the excursion boat from this place.

Dec. 17, 1904 – The Advocate - The annual meeting of the Door County Medical Association was held at the office of Dr. H. R. Simon on December 8th. Meeting called to order by President Simon at 8:15 p. m., and the following members reported present: Drs. G. F. Hilton, L. E. Gotham, Wm. Netter and H. E. Simon, of the city; H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor; and G. R. Egland of Ephraim.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

As no paper had been prepared to be read at this meeting it was voted that the chair appoint two members, each of whom is to prepare such paper for the next meeting. These are to also notify the secretary of the subject chosen, and the latter, is in turn to communicate this fact to the members.

The date for the next meeting was fixed for May 18, 1905, to be held in this city at such time of day as is most convenient for the members, place to be decided upon later.

Dr. Thos. C. Proctor of the city was admitted as a regular member of the society. The membership fee was fixed at \$1 per annum. The secretary was instructed to issue certificates to all members in good standing. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, H. R. Simon; vice president, G. F. Hilton; secretary and treasurer, G. R. Egland; trustees, Drs. Egland, Eames and Gotham; delegates to the state convention, Drs. Hilton and Netter.

President Simon appointed Drs. Netter and Eames to each prepare and read papers for and at the next meeting of the society.

Jan. 28, 1905 – The Advocate - The Menominee Sugar Co. has just made its announcements of the best results obtained in the growing of sugar beets. We find that Justin Chadoir of Union heads the list, having \$170.76 from 2-1/2 acres of beets; Dr. Eames of Egg Harbor is 2nd with 5 acres which brought him \$333.47, and Chas. O. Franklin of this city 2-1/2 acres, \$160.87. The Smith Bros., Green Bay, with 5 acres, were 22

paid, \$533.87. The company has likewise distributed 50,000 pounds of granulated sugar among those of its patrons who made the best record in the growing of beets.

April 8, 1905 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Medos LeMere had the misfortune to fracture the small bone of one of his legs while on his way home from town Sunday evening. Owing to the intense darkness, he stumbled and fell while crossing the bridge at Mowry's farm, and a fractured bone was the result, as there are no people living in that vicinity Mr. LeMere could call no assistance and was forced to cover the remainder of the distance by crawling on his hands and knees. Needless to say he suffered terrible agony and pain and did not reach home until the small hours Monday Morning. Dr. Eames was summoned and the limb set. The patient is doing well.

April 15, 1905 – The Advocate - Telephone Stations Established.

The W. T. Co. has established an exchange at Chas. Ruchert's, Ellison Bay; at A. Wiltse's, Matt Boeser's and Henry J. Pleck's, Sister Bay; at Jas. Hanson's, Ephraim; at C. A. Lundberg's and Levi Vorous & Son, Fish Creek; at the residence of Truman A. Thorp, Egg Harbor, a station has also been established in the store for the convenience of the general public for the day service. Dr. Eames will also have service in his residence. At Baileys Harbor the station is located in the hotel of Ed. Westfall. Other parties at the Harbor are also making preparations to install instruments. At Jacksonport the call station will be at L. H. Erskine.

A switch has just been put in at Andrew Weborg's, Gills Rock, for the convenience of the people on Washington Island. In case they desire to communicate with points south of where the switch is located prompt connection will be made by Mr. Weborg's family. A good deal of traffic is carried on between the mainland and the island by means of the

submarine cable, for which there is no charge. The traffic on all other business is from 15 to 20 cents for two minutes talk. The charge from the island to Marinette and Menominee is 20 cents.

The company will endeavor to give the best service possible, and it is expected that the volume of business will increase steadily.

June 17, 1905 – DC Democrat - Meeting of Telephone Directors.

Monday afternoon the directors of the Door County Telephone Co. met at the office of the secretary in this city, and transacted such business as came before them. The directors present were Messrs. J. A. Smith, of Ephraim; Roger Eatough and Wm. Brann, of Baileys Harbor; L. E. Evenson, of Ellison Bay; and Jos. LeMere, of Jacksonport, president of the company and Henry Graass, secretary. The only director who was not in attendance at the meeting being Dr. Eames of Egg Harbor, who was unable to be present.

The telephones that had been installed on trial having been found satisfactory, were accepted. There being twenty subscribers north of the city desiring phones, it was decided to install them as soon as possible. There are also about thirty business places in this city desiring telephones from the company and they will be supplied as fast as it is possible to do so.

The secretary of the company was instructed by the directors to apply for a franchise from the council to put up poles and wires in the city, the franchise which will be asked for being printed in another part of today's paper.

The business of the company having increased to such an extent, and the demand for telephones being so numerous, it was decided by the directors to establish a central office in this city and put in a 100 phone switch board.

The proposition of extending the line south and connecting it with the Independent Co's. line at Green Bay was discussed, but no action will be taken at present.

If the city grants the franchise asked for by the council the company will immediately let the contract for placing the poles and stringing the wires. The line in the northern part of the county will be improved at an early date and everything put in first class condition.

Sept. 16, 1905 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

Dr. Eames made a professional call at Jacksonport last week.

Gladys Eames went to Sturgeon Bay last Saturday where she will attend high school.

Oct. 21, 1905 – The Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

The schooner M. Dall was delayed several days in taking on cargo at Eames' pier last week by the heavy westerly winds, and she did not get away until Friday.

Oct. 28, 1905 – The Advocate - The Big Blow of Thursday Night Does Great Damage in County. Losses at Egg Harbor.

The old Thorp pier was totally wrecked.

The warehouse was also destroyed. It was the property of Dr. Eames. The new pier was also damaged to the extent of having the north roadway washed out and the stone filling carried away from the edges at both the north and west sides and piled in the middle of the structure.

The losses may be summed up thus: Dr. Eames, including cargo on Una, \$450; John Bertschinger, \$200; Jerry LeMere, \$600; Jos. Worachek, \$350.

Oct. 28, 1905 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

The schooner Forward, of Menominee, loaded cordwood at Eames dock last Monday.

Jan. 27, 1906 – The Advocate - Will Sue Ball Club.

Each member of the local ball team and officials this week received a communication from the firm of Kaftan & Reynolds, Green Bay attorneys, notifying them that they had been retained by Carl Bernschein of Jacksonport to prosecute an action against the Sturgeon Bay baseball team for the death of his daughter, which it is alleged was caused by the negligence of the team while playing at Kewaunee last summer in not furnishing proper safeguards for the protection of the patrons of the game, claiming that the young lady came to her death by

reason of an accident while attending said game. The communication is submitted to the members "to ascertain whether they will entertain or make any proposition for a settlement", if not, it will be considered that they are willing to stand suit.

Miss Annie Bernschein, the young lady referred to, died at her home in Jacksonport on Thursday night of last week. The accident referred to occurred at Kewaunee as stated. She was run into and knocked down while one of the players was running to catch a fly ball in the right field, but was not prevented from leaving the grounds unassisted.

A post-mortem examination was held on the remains of Miss Bernschein on Saturday, Drs. Norden, Eames and Hilton conducting the same. They found that deceased had died from acute kidney trouble.

The members of the club do not seem to be much concerned over the matter, being rather inclined to treat the affair as of little consequence. They are at a loss to know how they can be held responsible for accidents that happen on grounds away from home. The outcome will nevertheless be watched with interest.

An Enthusiastic Meeting in the Town Hall at Baileys Harbor Last Saturday on the Discussion of an Electric Railway. All Northern Towns Represented.

The mass meeting held in the townhall at Baileys Harbor Saturday afternoon of last week, for the purpose of discussing the proposed electric railway from Sturgeon Bay to the northern end of the peninsula, was largely attended and was a most enthusiastic one.

Dr. Eames, of Egg Harbor, took the floor and presented forcible arguments in favor of

having the road built. He stated how the development of the county had been retarded due to the fact that the farmers had no opportunity to get their produce to market, in many instances it costing more to market their produce than they received for it. That for years the residents of the peninsula had been patiently waiting for the transportation conditions to be bettered. Mr. Eames spoke of the many ways in which the road would develop the county and that the burden on each taxpayer would be but a small item compared to the benefit derived.

Upon closing of the remarks made by Dr. Eames, the chairman of the meeting called all those who constituted the committee to formulate a plan in regard to securing aid, etc , upon the platform, where the matter was taken under consideration, discussed, and the views of each member freely expressed, and the proposition which was presented to Mr. Becker, drawn up and signed by each member of the committee. It was then read to those assembled in the hall, and met with their hearty approval. Mr. Becker was not in a position to state whether or not the proposition would be entirely satisfactory, but would submit his answer at an early date.

Dr. Eames again addressed the assemblage, stating that from a taxpayers standpoint he considered the position a very favorable one that the 3-1/2 per cent on the bonds was a very low rate, and represented but an increase of 7-10 per cent for taxes, or in other words if a man paid \$20.00 in taxes, he would only have to pay \$20.14.

As the hour was getting late and the object of the meeting had been accomplished, upon motion, the meeting adjourned. The first real step toward securing an electric railway from Sturgeon Bay to the northern end of the Door County peninsula has been taken, and it was a long step. (*Mr. Becker represented the railroad*)

Paul Barabas Severely Cuts Frank Carmody in Brawl at Egg Harbor.

Frank Carmody has laid at the point of death since Friday night as a result of wounds received at the hands of Paul Barabas, who wielded a jack knife with deadly effect.

From what can be learned of the affair there was a dance at a public hall on the night in question, and during the evening the two men had come together on several occasions, Carmody, it alleged, being the aggressor. The nagging and cat-calling finally culminated in a fight, in which Barabas drew a jackknife and plunged it into his assailant time and again. One of the cuts penetrated the face, a couple the neck, and it is said that five times was the blade plunged into the back of the victim before the two were separated.

The injured man was immediately taken into the hotel and Dr. Eames hastily summoned, while threats of lynching was noised about, all that appeared to be lacking apparently being a leader. Dr. Eames counselled strongly against any acts of violence, reminding the incensed crowd that it would make bad matters worse, and his advice-cooled the hot heads.

Carmody was and has since been cared for by the doctor and though his life hung in the balance for several days the indications are now that he will recover. The most serious wounds were those in the region of the kidneys.

The assailant, who is a Polander, went to his home during the excitement and was there arrested by Constable Dell LeRoy on Sunday and brought to this city, where he now languishes in the county jail awaiting the outcome of his victim's injuries before any formal charge is made against him. The probabilities are that this will be assault with intent to do great bodily injury. His case will be tried before Judge Dehoa as soon as

Carmody is able to appear as a witness. Barabas in extenuation of his violent attack claims he acted solely in self-defense.

He had stopped to put the dog on a trail when the gun in the hands of Albert was discharged in some unaccountable manner and the charge of shot entered Mr. Kellogg's right foot on the right hand side just below and in front of the ankle, tearing a hole as big around as a dollar clean through the foot and coming out at the bottom of the heel.

The injured man was only a short distance from the hotel to which he was removed and a telephone message was sent here for Dr. Wagener, who hurried to the scene in an automobile. Dr. H. F. Eames was also summoned from Egg Harbor. Mr. Kellogg was temporarily attended to, the wound being dressed and shot removed, after which he was brought to this city by Richard Noelck, his wife accompanying him in the auto. On their arrival here the wounds were carefully dressed and all the leaden pellets that could be found removed, the injury being bandaged for the removal of the injured man to Chicago, for which city he left on the morning train Tuesday.

Owing to the severity of the injury Dr. Wagener is of the opinion that an amputation of the foot above the ankle will be made. Even though the foot could be spared it would be of less use than an artificial one, as the ankle would be useless. Besides this it would take months to heal, attendant by numerous dangers from infections.



Y., where he purchased 5,000 cherry trees.

In referring to Dr. Eames' visit to Dansville, The Breeze, of that place, says "The doctor owns land in what is called the cherry belt in his state, a strip of land about 100 miles in length, adapted to raising cherries. Orchards in that section have been known to produce as high as \$800 per acre, and frequently cherry orchards pay for the land at the end of the third or fourth year."

Egg Harbor will undoubtedly within a few years be one of the leading cherry producing sections in the county, as practically all the advantages are to be found there that exist within the "cherry belt" around the county seat.

Dr. Eames returned Friday from Dansville N.Y. where he purchased some 5,000 cherry trees to be shipped at once for planting in this locality.

The gentlemen present were Dr. H. F. Eames, John Bertschinger and John Carmody of Egg Harbor, Robt. E. Lee and Math. Peffer of Jacksonport, and Jos. A. LeMere of this city, who holds large interests at Jacksonport and Roger Eatough who resides in this city but has business interests at Baileys Harbor.

The discussion pertained to the proposed route of the road, the gentlemen being greatly interested as they represent both the eastern and western side of the peninsula. They realize that the road is going to result in greatly developing the territory thru which it passes, and the towns which it comes proximity to. Naturally all concerned are anxious to have the road built as close to their towns as possible.

Many good suggestions were offered, and while it will be impossible for the road to be built to the shores of each side of the peninsula it is believed that a route can be selected that will serve the interests of the majority of the people.

Feb. 12, 1914 – SB Advocate - TALK ON RAILROAD PROPOSITION.

Business Men of City and Northern Part of County Come to a Satisfactory Understanding.

A get-together meeting on the railroad proposition was held at the assembly room of the library Tuesday evening.

There was in attendance a number of business and professional men, members of the commercial club, and several visitors from the northern part of the county, who came here expressly for the purpose to discuss the question in a heart-to-heart manner.

Among the visitors were Dr. G. R. Egeland and H. R. Holand of Ephraim; Hubert Woerfel, Fish Creek; William Brann, and Roger Eatough, Baileys Harbor; Matt Roesser, Sister Bay; Joseph LeMere, Jacksonport; Dr. H. F. Eames, James F. Wilson and John F. Bertschinger, Egg Harbor; Fr. Pfeiffer and H. R. Isherwood of the Community Development Club of Sawyer.

There was some very plain and wholesome talk on the subject by the representatives of the northern towns, who urged the business men of the city to give the proposition their moral as well as financial support.

Mr. Holand submitted figures on the estimated cost of the construction of the line to Sister Bay, which he had obtained from experts on the subject, and these showed that a rough estimate placed the figures at a

small amount over \$400,000, which included all the expenses of promotion, building, grading, stations, and equipment from the cars and engines to the tools for the section hands. He also gave figures to show why it was more than reasonable to suppose that the line would pay good dividends on the investment from the very beginning, and as an evidence of what he stated being reasonable to expect cited the fact that Ephraim had accommodated 4,000 people during the past summer season, and that Fish Creek had done likewise, which with Egg Harbor and other summer resorts as yet not fully developed would bring the amount of transients that had spent a week or more in the county over 10,000 persons. His statements were conservative estimates on the probable gross revenues.

The talk culminated in a motion being made and carried to have the president appoint a committee of business men to solicit stock subscriptions in the city and vicinity. President Weitlich announced that the committee would be composed of prominent business men, the names to be announced later.

Feb. 13, 1914 – DC Democrat – The March term of circuit court convened in this city Tuesday morning Judge Henry Graass presiding.

Of the eight cases on the calendar under issue of fact for the jury, but one will be tried, that being Une H. Greene vs. H. F. Eames, the plaintiff suing for alleged damages for the loss of fruit trees planted and under care of the defendant at Egg Harbor.

Feb. 20, 1914 – DC Democrat – EGG HARBOR.

The social at the Eames home on Wednesday of last week was well attended. Ten dollars was realized.

March 6, 1914 – DC Democrat - Une H. Greene vs. H. F. Eames.

Mr. Greene endeavors in this case to recover alleged damages from Dr. Eames of

Egg Harbor for the loss of several hundred cherry trees which had been planted and cared for under supervision of the defendant.

March 19, 1914 – SB Advocate - The next suit on the calendar called for trial was that of Une H. Greene vs. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor. The plaintiff in this suit is a woman and her place of residence, Chicago. The complainant asks for damages from the defendant on the ground that she had contracted with him for the planting, care, and cultivation of a certain number of fruit trees in the town of Egg Harbor, and that owing to want of proper attention, improper planting and general neglect the trees had died.

This the defendant in the action denied, maintaining among other things that the trees were not hardy and this caused them to die a natural death which could not have been avoided. He contended that the trees had been as carefully attended as had his own orchard, and that his contract had been earned out with the complainant to the letter.

The case went to trial Saturday morning, during which several witnesses were examined. At noon, Judge Graass adjourned court until 9 o'clock Monday morning and the same afternoon went to Green Bay on some important business matter.

All those jurymen who could do so immediately left for their homes to remain over Sunday.

At 9 o'clock Monday morning the court convened and proceeded with the Greene-Eames case.

Dr. H. F. Eames Loses Case.

Numerous witnesses were examined in this suit the testimony not being completed, until Tuesday afternoon, the case going to the jury at 5:50 the same evening. The jurors wrestled with the problem until 10:30 when they brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$1.00 damages.

Following are the questions - which were submitted to the jury: Question No. 1 was answered by the court, by consent of the counsel, in the affirmative

which admitted the existence of a contract between the parties to the action, as well as the fact that each was to furnish the trees for planting 7-2/5 acres, and that H. F. Eames was to plant, prune, spray, hoe, cultivate and have ground in good tilth and free of weeds and care, for said, 14-4/5ths acres of planted trees with skill and care and in a first-class manner, and give the orchard every requisite attention.

2d Question: Did the defendant fail and neglect to properly plant and care for said trees as agreed to in his contract? Answer—Yes.

3d question: If you answer the second question. Yes, then answer this 3d question: Was the death of the trees the natural and proximate consequence of such failure to properly care for them? Answer—Yes.

4th question: If you answer the 3d question Yes, then answer the 4th question, what are the plaintiff's damages by reason of the death of the trees? Answer—\$1.00.

The defendant contended that he had properly taken care of the trees in question according to the contract, but that the trees purchased by the plaintiff were of an inferior quality and the season an unfavorable one, which accounted for the loss of the trees. That those he had furnished had done much better than those furnished by the plaintiff.

The contention of the plaintiff evidently had more weight with the jury, although they did not place the damage at a very high figure considering the number of trees alleged to have been destroyed. T. A. Sanderson represented the plaintiff in the action and W. E. Wagener the defendant.

F. Eames, Dr. G. R. Egeland, H. R. Holand and D. W. Larkin and County Supt. Tufts.

The matter of change of boundaries of school district No's. 2, 3 and 4, in the town of Washington was then brought before the meeting. Upon careful consideration it was decided to call a special meeting of the board of education at Washington Island on Saturday, October 31.

The board members had the good fortune of having excellent weather on the trip enabling them to make a trip on the island thru the Districts in which proposed changes of boundaries had been suggested. It is the unanimous opinion of the board that their visit to the island will mean an improvement to school conditions.

The five members of the County Board of Education met at the court house Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of organizing and becoming familiar with their duties and to transact such business as came before them.

The meeting was called to order in the court room by Dr. H. F. Eames, the senior member of the board, who placed H. R. Holand in nomination for temporary chairman, the motion being carried.

The first business of the board was to elect one of their members president, which was done by ballot. Dr. G. R. Egeland was elected, receiving three of the five votes, Dr. Eames receiving the other two.

Lots were drawn as the law provides, to determine how long each member was to

serve, this being done by writing the names of the members on separate slips of paper and the numbers from one to five on other slips. These were placed in separate hats. The result was as follows:

1 year - H. F. Eames, Egg Harbor; 2 years - D. W. Larkin, Sturgeon Bay town; 3 years - G. R. Egeland, Ephraim; 4 years - Charles Butler, Forestville; 5 years - H. R. Holand, Ephraim.

June 26, 1914 - DC Democrat - CYCLONE UNROOFS BARNS. Terrific Wind Sweeps Thru Portion of County Early Tuesday Morning Leaving Score of Barns in Ruins. Damage Heavy Through State. Loss In County About \$20,000, One Cow is Killed, Much Valuable Timber Uprooted, Standing Grain Escapes Damage.

The damage to crops is remarkably small, the wind evidently having swept over and above ground and grain and other crops are uninjured.

This is also true of the fruit trees, which suffered but little from the storm. John Pallister probably the heaviest loser in this respect. A number of fine cherry and apple trees were uprooted and carried completely out of his orchard. Dr. Eames of Egg Harbor also suffered quite a loss in his orchard.

*July 3, 1914 - DC Democrat - Arguments for a new trial in the case of Une Greene of Chicago vs. Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor were heard before Circuit Judge Graass at Green Bay on June 24th. The grounds on which the motion was brought was that damages awarded by the jury in circuit court were inadequate. The case arose over fruit trees under care of defendant. Mallory and willing villagers willingly aided in making all arrangements following the distressing accident. Much credit is due Frank Eames, who brought up the body by diving, the body having thus been recovered immediately after the accident.

Body Is Recovered.

.....By this time Frank Eames and Wm. Manney, who were on the Eames dock, had been attracted to the scene. The first named hastily removed a part of his clothing and dove to the bottom, bringing up the body the first time. It was in about seven feet of water. The body had been in the water only about five minutes. After the body was removed from the water several men from the crowd which had gathered endeavored by such means as they knew to start respiration until Dr. H. F. Eames arrived, he having been some distance away when notified. The doctor did all in his power, but in vain.

Dr. H. F. Eames and R. B. Mallory will be the speakers of the evening. This will be the first of a series of such meetings which have been planned and it will be to the interest of all to make it a success.

TO BOOST EGG HARBOR,
EGG HARBOR ADVANCEMENT
ASSOCIATION IS ORGANIZED.

Dr. Eames Is Elected President.

Will Promote Interests of Egg Harbor.

The mass meeting held at Carmody's hall Saturday was the means of organizing an association having for its object the advancement of the village along such as these live organizations usually work.

The meeting was addressed by Mr. R. B. Mallory who had urged the calling of the meeting. In his remarks he urged working for a greater Egg Harbor and urged the matter of organizing an advancement association with the object of making Egg Harbor more prominent as a summer resort town. Mr. Mallory said we had as beautiful place as there is along the entire peninsula, that the fishing was good, and that there is an excellent sand beach for bathing. He said it was time that Egg Harbor was awakening to the fact that here is to be found a great shore property. The budget for the county superintendent of schools for 1915-16 was made up and will be submitted to the county board, which convenes on Tuesday of next week. The budget totals \$2,050, being \$100 less than the one for 1913-14, it being as follows:

There was a raise of \$200 in the superintendent's salary, and a reduction of \$200 in office help, making a saving to the county of \$100 The remainder of the budget was the same as last year.

This budget cannot be changed by the county board who are obliged by law to allow whatever is asked for by the county board of education.

The County Board of Education held a meeting at the office of County Supt. Tufts at the court house Monday, it being an adjourned meeting called for the previous Saturday.

Dr. H. F. Eames, the member of the board from Egg Harbor, was elected president to succeed Dr. G. R. Egeland who has resigned from the board due to taking up his residence in this city. H. R. Holand of Ephraim was chosen secretary.

The principal business before the board was consideration of the proposition to change the boundaries of school districts No's. 2, 3 and 4, Washington Island. It was decided to annex part of district No. 3 to district No.4, and part of district No. 2 to district No. 3, making the township lines the school district boundaries.

H. R. Holand was delegated to appear before the county board in behalf of the County Board of Education to request that body to consider placing the management of the Door-Kewaunee training school, as far as Door County is concerned, in the power of the County Board of Education. At present the affairs of the training school are handled by a joint committee from Kewaunee and

Door County.

The next meeting of the board will be held next Monday in school Dist. No. 1, Brussels, to consider consolidating that district with some other district.

WILL REBUILD TELEPHONE LINE.

Door County Telephone Company Plan on Commencing Work in the Spring Will Spend Several Thousand Dollars.

The stockholders of the Door County Telephone company met at Egg Harbor on Saturday, this being the annual gathering of the organization.

It was one of the most important meetings held in the history of the company and considerable business of importance was transacted.

Among this was the election of officers for the ensuing year, of which the following was chosen:

Dr. H. F. Eames, president; Edward Evanson, vice president; C. S. Smith, secretary; Roger Eatough, treasurer.

Following is the board of directors: Ed. Evanson, Adolph Anderson, Jos. Eichinger, Wm. Brann, Roger Eatough.

The report of the officers showed that the

company was in excellent financial condition, having done a fine business during the past year. Stock dividends of 100 per cent were declared.

It is the intention of the company to rebuild their lines during the ensuing summer, and a start will be made as early in the spring as the work can be done. The system will be metallic throughout, and it is planned to establish exchanges in all the villages in the northern part of the county with tolls in between the villages and city. Additional lines will be laid through Sevastopol and Egg Harbor to increase the patronage to the company's lines and when all the work outlined has been accomplished it will it is estimated cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

The company will likewise have one of the finest rural lines in the county, if not in the entire state.

Feb. 19, 1915 – DC Democrat - Door County Telephone Company Will Rebuild Their Entire System - Officers Are Elected.

At a meeting held in Egg Harbor Saturday afternoon by the members of the Door County Telephone Company plans were made for re-building of their entire system. All of these will be rebuilt and made into metallic lines to meet the demands of the state railroad commission. Work of rebuilding the line will be commenced as soon as the weather permits in the spring, and the reconstruction work will cost several thousand dollars. When the work is completed and the metallic lines replace the present system the service will be greatly improved and as good as can be found anywhere with the larger companies. The officers of the company state that they are assured a substantial increase in business as soon as the improvement in the service is made, a number of applications for phones having already been placed.

The appointment was made by Superintendent Millard Tufts and is of a temporary nature, but it will undoubtedly be confirmed by the Committee on Common Schools at their first meeting. Members of the committee are Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor, Nic Nelson of Clay Banks and James Langemak of Washington Island, and they have individually informed Supt. Tufts that his appointment would be satisfactory to them.

The committee had considerable difficulty in securing a suitable and qualified person to accept the position. Miss Martha Evans, at present teaching in the Algoma city schools, was offered the appointment but was unable to accept and later another appointment was made with the same result.

Nov. 4, 1915 – SB Advocate – EGG HARBOR.

The first formal vote gave Eames and Jess each six, and Smith seven. The second formal vote gave Eames seven and Jess and Smith each six. Matt Peiffer, who had placed Dr. Eames' name in nomination, withdrew it for the purpose of breaking the deadlock. The next vote resulted in Jess receiving ten and Smith nine.

Boat excursions will be run from Washington Island and intermediate points and hundreds of people will come in automobiles. Many of the schools have chartered auto trucks.

Speaker of the Day.

District Attorney T. A. Sanderson will be speaker of the day. Dr. H. F. Eames, president of the county committee on education, will give a practical talk on Agriculture Club work. Both talks will be given in the morning and in the assembly room of the high school where the entire morning program will be carried out. Two numbers will be given by the children of the Hainesville school who have an especially interesting and novel "stunt" in demonstrating games that can be played in school by children of all ages. The morning program will be interspersed with songs and other musical numbers.

Last before dinner will come the County Contest at which a candidate and an alternate will be selected to represent Door County in the state fair spelling contest. The spelling contest includes spelling, writing and arithmetic and the winner will be entitled, also, to the honor of being the brightest and smartest pupil in Door County.

After dinner, between 1 o'clock and 1:30 field day activities will begin and the band will play until all events are over. Following the contests a ball game will be played between the Sturgeon Bay high school team and the Kewaunee high school team. Admis-

sion to everything will be absolutely free.
May 31, 1916 – DC News – School Convention A Success. Upward of Thirteen Hundred Students Present, Many Taking Part In The Exercises.

Hundreds of school children and many grown-ups from all parts of the county poured into the city from early Saturday morning until noon and assisted in making the annual field meet a big success.

All the towns in the county were represented and practically every school, the number present being estimated at about 800. The exercises which were held in the high school in the morning and the field events which were held in the afternoon were good and greatly enjoyed by all.

This is the second year that this meet has taken place and it is the intention of County Supt. Tufts to make it an annual event which will be looked forward to by the schools of the county.

The program for the day did not begin until about ten o'clock in the morning. The exercises took place in the large high school assembly room which was filled to capacity, a number being unable to gain entrance. The first number on the program was an address by President H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor who is head of the Door County Education Commission. His remarks were well directed and a fitting opening for the big day.

The spelling contest took place at noon, the representatives of the several towns writing the examination during the noon hour. The contest was held according to the state rulings, which not only made the contest one in Spelling but also Arithmetic and Writing. The papers were corrected as quickly as possible and the winner was announced at 2:30. Miss Mabel Bergsland of the Hainesville school, Nasewaupée, was winner of the contest and will represent this county at the state match at the state fair in September.

The weather was ideal for outdoor sports and promptly at 1:30 the events began to take place.

The contests that took place were num-

erous and as a general rule there were many

entrants in each and every event. Several of the races were exciting and close and the spectators numbering in the vicinity of 1,000 greatly enjoyed the meet.

There are actual photographs of Increase Claffin, the first settler; Sturgeon Bay in the '70s; Cedar Street, Sturgeon Bay, in 1876; cutting timber from the canal site in 1870; and including Door County in the 20th century. Photo-

graphs of all the old prominent residents appear.

For some reason the history of Door County has never been written and published in book form, yet certainly no where could be found more interesting narrative.

The Republican County committee met at the court house on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of effecting an organization, and elected Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor, chairman, and Wm. A. MacEacham of the Fourth ward secretary.

While the representation was rather small, the enthusiasm was great. The meeting, was called to order by H. J. Sanderson after which Dr. Eames was elected chairman and Mr. MacEacham secretary.

There were only seven members pres-

July 5, 1917 – DC News - AT JEFFERSON BARRACKS.

Anyone doubting that soldier life is otherwise than it should be ought to make a visit to Jefferson Barracks. Although this is but a receiving station, a taste of army life is possible.

First, the applicants are given a rather severe physical examination. This takes about an hour. The lucky ones are vaccinated and inoculated against smallpox and typhoid. Chief causes of failure to pass this examination are flat feet and weak heart. Finally before leaving the examining barracks, finger prints are taken of each soldier. This is for means of identification. It has been customary to take photographs also but this has been discontinued because of the present rush.

The soldier is measured for clothes the same day that he is examined and gets his uniform the following day. The sergeant in charge of taking the measurements is an expert along his line, having been doing that same work for nearly twenty years. As each man steps up the sergeant calls off the size of the article required and this is taken down by his assistants. Seldom does an exchange have to be made.

The new soldier is well provided for in the way of clothes. He receives two uniforms, two woolen shirts, one pair of puttees, two pairs of shoes, service hat, four suits of underwear, six pair of socks, besides a toilet kit that contains many necessities of soldier life such as razor, towels, housewife, etc.

On reporting again at the receiving barracks the recruits are assigned to their companies. At the companies they are put in squads and given bunks in a squad room

or tent. A sergeant or corporal is put in charge or two or more squads. The first day of drill is a trying one for both recruits and non. coms, to charge. As the days go by, however, the once raw Johnnies are gradually brought into shape and at the end of ten days or two weeks are ready for the first gun drills.

Many amusements are provided for the soldiers. A screen is located at one end of the parade grounds and every evening the soldiers can enjoy high class movies. The Y. M.C. A. and K.C's have large field quarters at the barracks. Each has its nightly entertainments which consists of vaudeville stunts and solos, etc., by players from town. Both organizations provide free writing material, magazines and even free stamps for those who need them.

The people of St. Louis are very considerate toward the man in uniform and nearly all the amusement parks and even some of the show houses have their free nights for soldiers.

Many laughable incidents are "pulled off" every day. One of the officers passed a recruit on the street not long ago without getting the accustomed salute. He, of course, turned and asked, "Here boy, how long have you been here?"

"Oh nearly four days, captain. How long have you been here?"

Another recruit after having a few days gun drill was put on guard duty at the guard house. Near midnight he heard some one approaching.

"Halt, who's there." he inquired.

"Officer of the Day" was the answer,

"Say, if you're Officer of the Day, what in h— are you doing around here this time of the night."

It is clearly seen that with drilling in the morning, hikes, lectures and fatigue duty in the afternoon plenty of amusements every evening, that the soldier has little time for lonesomeness.— **Frank Eames.**

OLD SETTLER ATTACKED BY INFURIATED ANIMAL – WIFE DRIVES BEAST OFF WITH PITCHFORK. TRAMPLED TO DEATH BY A BULL.

Fred Harder, of Egg Harbor, Meets Horrible Death Friday—Bull Owned by Dr. H. F. Eames.

Last Friday evening the people in the vicinity of Egg Harbor were shocked to hear of the death of Fred Harder, aged 76 years, a prominent farmer of that community, death following his being trampled upon and gored by an angry bull.

According to information received here, the bull was the property of Dr. H. F. Eames, and headed the fine herd of stock which he has on his farm. The animal had broken out of the pasture provided by the doctor and gotten into the orchard of Mr. Harder. He went out just about supper time to chase the animal out, and when he attempted to do so, the bull, which has heretofore appeared to be rather unruly, started for him. Mr. Harder was unable to dodge him, and the angered animal caught him with his head, and tossed the man into the air. Mrs. Harder, it is said, witnessed the awful scene, and rushing for a pitchfork, went out to help her husband. Before she reached the scene, however, the animal had tossed Mr. Harder into the air three times, and also trampled on him and gored him to a small extent. She was successful in driving off the enraged animal and with the assistance of her son and other help brought her husband to the house. Medical aid was summoned, but all efforts were of no avail, life becoming extinct about 7 o'clock. Undertaker McKercher was taken out that evening by R. A. Noelck, and the body prepared for burial.

Fred Harder, Elderly Egg Harbor Resident, Gored to Death by Bull Last Friday Evening.

Fred Harder, an aged resident of the town of Egg Harbor, met a tragic death Friday evening when he was attacked by a bull and gored to death. The sad accident happened

on his place, and his wife witnessed the terrible accident from the porch of their home, only a short distance away,

The animal which killed Mr. Harder was the property of Dr. H. F. Eames. Mr. and Mrs. Harder were seated on the porch of their residence when several cows, headed by the animal broke thru the fence into the Harder garden. As soon as the owner noticed the trespassers he hastened to frighten them away.

As he advanced in that direction, the bull turned and attacked him. Mr. Harder, being an elderly man, walking with the assistance of a cane, was not agile enough to escape the quick and furious charge of the enraged animal, which tossed him into the air three times, each time catching him with his horns as the body descended.

As soon as Mrs. Harder noticed her husband's sad plight she went to his aid frightening away the enraged animal and carried the prostrate form of her husband to the house. Then she ran for assistance to the home of her son William, some distance away, who came to the Harder home immediately. His father was still conscious but by the time a physician reached the Harder home, the injured man had lapsed into unconsciousness and passed away shortly after.

Fred Harder was 76 years of age, born in Germany and a resident of this county for upward of 40 years. He leaves his wife and three children to mourn his sad death. The children are: Mrs. Fred Voeks, city; Mrs. Wm. Miller, Kenosha; and William Harder of Egg Harbor.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon and was largely attended. Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Blunk of Milwaukee numbered among those from outside in attendance.

SCHOOL IS DEDICATED.
INTERESTING PROGRAM AT GIB-
RALTAR HIGH SCHOOL.

First High School in Northern Door
County Completed and Is a Credit
to the Town of Gibraltar.

Sunday, September 22, was a day which will be added to the historic pages of the town of Gibraltar, the handsome new high school building being dedicated on that date, the first high school to be erected in the northern part of Door county.

Upwards of one thousand people attended the program, which was participated in by some of the leading men of the state and county. The address of dedication was given by Geo. H. Drewry, state inspector of rural schools. Other addresses were delivered by Rudolph Soukup, principal of the Sturgeon Bay High School; Dr. H. F. Eames, chairman of the committee on common schools; Attorney T. A. Sanderson of Sturgeon Bay; Prof. C. M. Moss, of the University of Illinois; H. R. Holand of Ephraim acted as chairman of the meeting, and also made an address covering the history of the building of the school from start to finish.

Mr. Holand closed his speech with the following poem which he composed for the occasion:

From a far away land
Came a resolute band
Of pioneers sturdy and true.
They were men undismayed
Who boldly essayed
To conquer this wilderness new.

With their axes they drove
Through the wild forest grove.
Leaving slashings of stump, stone
and brush.

And with unceasing toil
They dug in the soil
Till it blossomed and bore with a
rush.

Then they built fair homes.
Built schools and church domes,
And highways of smoothest expanse.
Now Gibraltar of yore
Is a forest no more,
But a garden of pleasantest lands.

On the people of the county alone rests the value and completeness of the history of Door County's part in the Great World War. Every effort is being put forth by the committee having the matter in charge to make it as accurate as possible. This is a herculean task and can only be accomplished by the aid of those who have relatives in the service. It is certain that when the history is published there will be no one who has taken a part want to have their name omitted.

It is an easy matter for the committee to secure the names of those who have been inducted, but this is not all that is required. When they arrived in camp they were assigned to some company regiment and division. The committee wants to know with what units they were identified. They want to know what battles the men engage in, whether they were wounded, where and when. Those that were killed in action or died by disease should have some relative who can furnish the necessary information.

To aid in this important work Chairman Scofield of the Council of Defense has issued the following appeal to the local councils.

You are, no doubt, aware by this time of the existence of a Wisconsin War History Commission whose mission it is to gather and compile Wisconsin's part in the great War.

Bert, the 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Honold of Jacksonport died Sunday from wounds received by him after the accidental discharge of a .22 calibre rifle on Saturday. Just how the accident, occurred will never be known, for the boy was found laying unconscious in one of the buildings near his home by his brother.

It is stated that the members of the Honold family are of the opinion that the wound was inflicted when Bert tried to pull the rifle down from an opening in the ceiling where it was kept. He was discovered by his brother a little after the wound was inflicted, laying in a pool of blood.

The brother called the members of the family and Dr. Eames of Egg Harbor was sent for. When the doctor arrived he found that the boy was exceedingly weak from loss of blood and that on account of his condition it would be impossible to remove him to a hospital or to remove the bullet. The lad was given every attention but it was soon apparent that he could not survive.

He had his team at Egg Harbor being shod and one of the animals broke its leg and had to be shot. He purchased another one from Dr. Eames and now has the above accident.

A program was held by the present teachers last spring and the following necessities and other articles have been secured thru the money raised: pencil sharpener, dictionary holder, cedar dusters and mop, one dozen rulers, 2 letter trays, 4 paper files, one ream of commercial paper, electric bell, 2 pieces of statuary - "Child at Study" and "The Stalking Lion," a large picture of General Pershing and last but not least, a piano.

The ladies of the village have donated their club money for the purpose of drilling a well. This work is now being done by Herman Fischer and son.

Another Door County native has made a national name for himself. He is William Johnson, product of a one-room school near Jacksonport. Mr. Johnson has risen to the position of full time writer for the Country Gentleman magazine and writes the following account of his life, telling how he received his education “Abraham Lincoln” style, borrowing books:

In line with the best traditions of American biography, I was born in a log house and educated in a one-room school. This all occurred in the vicinity of Jacksonport, Wisconsin, at a time when the citizens of that corner of the Badger state were whittling a wilderness of cut-over land into farms. When I quit school at thirteen the home farm, like most of the others there, was just a patchy area of small fields freckled with boulders and stumps. I learned to grub out the stumps and to build fences with the rocks hauled off the fields; also how to guide a plow among these obstructions, how to cradle and hand-bind grain, build water-tight stacks, doctor sick stock, butcher hogs, tinker up broken tools with baling wire, and do the hundred and one other jobs of pioneer farming.

In the fullness of time our community grew into the modern things into big fields and riding machinery, immense red barns and porched houses, pure-bred herds, co-operative associations, big commercial cherry orchards, automobiles, telephones,

hard roads - all those factors which sweeten and enrich country life.

I might have been there yet, proprietor of a dairy herd or cherry orchard, if I had not broken a bone in my hand while attempting to reason with an unreasonable horse. That took me to Dr. H. F. Eames, a fine country-minded gentleman who introduced me to books. I carried his library home by armfuls and read it after the day's work was done or on sundry rainy, days that allowed some leisure time.

Such a course bore its natural fruit. You get yourself just so full of a thing and it is bound to break out in your actions. So I began to write for farm papers and was astonished and uplifted to find that the articles were not only published but paid for.



Nov. 21, 1924 – DC Advocate - 2 CANNING PLANTS PLANNED IN NORTH. Sister Bay, Egg Harbor Sites Picked.

Rumors that the Door County Fruit Growers Union and Canning company were to erect new branch plants north on the peninsula for use next season to relieve the congestion of the local plant were confirmed by officials of the Union this week. A crew of men went north to Sister Bay to start work on a cold pack branch to be located there.

Efforts are being made to secure the Eames dock at Egg Harbor. The three-story plant will be built there in all probability and the machinery will be installed in the spring. Only a short time is required for the work. Financing the Egg Harbor project is the most important task at the present time, although it is expected that not much difficulty will be met in the work.

Dec. 18, 1924 – DC News - Work on the cold storage plant at Sister Bay that will be operated under the supervision of the Door County Fruit Growers Union, is practically in readiness at the present time. Chas. Augustine and a crew of men the latter part of the week finished the job of remodeling the elevator which has been leased from the Liberty Grove Produce company.

The machinery and a couple of pitters have been installed and everything is practically in readiness for operation, although it will not be used until next July.

An ice house is now being built for the storage of the cooling material that is to be used at the plant, it being necessary to put up a large supply of ice for this purpose.

The canning factory which is to be located on the Eames dock at Egg Harbor will be gotten in readiness the first thing in the spring and will be ready for use by the time that the cherry harvesting is at hand. This work will also be under the supervision of Mr. Augustine. Some of the material will be built here during the winter months and transported to its destination and there assembled.

This plant is to be equipped with five

pitters and between this and the cold storage plant at Sister Bay it is expected that the surplus crop of cherries will be taken care of handily during the next season.

This will require an expenditure of in the neighborhood of \$25,000, the greater portion of the stock having been subscribed by the people in the northern part of the county who are interested in the fruit growing industry.

These plants will give employment to a large number of people in the northern part of the county during the cherry season.

William Tiedke was killed on Monday when he fell from a load of hay on Ed Jorns farm, the accident taking place about 10 o'clock in the morning.

William was working for his cousin Henry Tiedke and went to the Jorns' place after a load of hay. The wagon had been loaded and backed out into the yard, where a binding pole was put on top. William fastened the pole in front and going to the rear of the load got hold of the pole to pull it down tight. When he put his weight on it the pole broke

and he was precipitated to the ground, striking on his head with great force.

Dr. Eames was immediately summoned from Egg Harbor arriving within half an hour after the accident. He did what he could for the young man, but he seemed to sink into a comma. He was conscious following the accident but gradually sank into a comma from which it was impossible to arouse him. Dr. Eames stated that, he was bleeding internally and that a clot of blood on the brain was causing the trouble.

Late in the afternoon Dr. Huff was sum-

moned in consultation in hopes of being able to save the life of the young man. He arrived at the home about 6 o'clock the same evening and confirmed the diagnosis of Dr. Eames. Preparations were made for removing the injured man to the hospital at Sturgeon Bay where it was thought an operation might save his life.

He was worldingly made as comfortable as possible in a light auto truck and a start was made about 8 o'clock for the county seat.

The party had driven only about a quarter of a mile from the house when it was observed that William was dying. He passed away without a struggle. The body was returned home and Undertaker Hahn was summoned.

Pickers Coming End of Week.

Factory Begins Tuesday.

The cherries are expected to be ready for picking the latter part of this week or first of next. This is what we are told by the orchardists.

The growers are looking for the biggest harvest of cherries in the history of the county, which means that there will be over a million dollar crop, which was the yield in 1924. Last year was an "off" year, the crop only being about 50 percent of the previous year, which was a record breaker up to that time.

The largest camp is of course at the Martin Orchard, which will have in the neighborhood of 1,000 pickers. Many of these will be local persons and some 700 will be taken care of at the orchard. Then there is the Reynolds orchard, which will have a camp of 300. This company cans its own crop.

Other large camps are the Cherry Harvesters at the fair grounds, the Gordon Orchards, the Kinnaird orchard, Hahn's, Goff's, the Peninsula Fruit orchard, the Bingham orchard, the Ellison Bay orchard, Cady's, Eames, Schroeder and numerous other orchards north of the bay. There are also several good sized orchards on the south side, the Jacobs brothers, Ed and Nic, having the largest acreage, with many ten and fifteen acre tracts.

Egg Harbor Doctor Has
Collection Of Old Books

One of the oldest collection of books in the county can be found at the home of Dr. H. F. Eames. The volumes are on medicine and date back to over 100 years ago.

Dr. Eames spends many of his leisure hours scanning the books and getting the early version of the eminent men of medicine and their opinions of the diseases which are known today. One of the publications entitled "Memoirs of the Royal Academy of Surgery" was published in 1764. It contains accounts of the first attempts in the use of the knife to cure sick persons.

Many of the books bear autographs of the eminent men of medicine among them, Benjamin Bush. The volumes were bought by Dr. Eames from Dr. J. G. Hendricks, who practiced at Baileys Harbor many years ago and was a cousin of Thomas A. Hendricks, one

time vice-president of the United States.

Another, aged book in the volumes is a medical dictionary, which Dr. Eames said, is 150 years old. A glance through the pages of some of the publications which were printed over a hundred years ago reveals that the cause of yellow fever was then a mystery, although physicians knew it was more prevalent in low marshy places. One of the books contains an account of the first successful attempt to curb with alcohol the deadly poison in the system caused by the bite of a rattle snake. The first trials to analyze the cause of hydrophobia, then called the bite of a mad dog, can also be found in the volumes.

Dr. Eames has been country physician for Egg Harbor and its vicinity since pioneer days. Besides attending to his medical practice he manages a large estate, and is the owner of large orchards and a high producing herd of dairy cows. He graduated from Illinois University in 1889 and came directly to Egg Harbor.

In his university days he was a member of the football team, although the game was played differently than according to the rules of today. Dr. Eames is now 67 years old.

CHERRY TREES INCREASE ORCHARD AREA.

About 50,000 cherry trees will be planted

in Door County this year reports the Door County Fruit Growers Union which this week received three carloads of the stock for distribution and expects two more carloads next week. About 20,000 trees came in last fall while about 30,000 are being received this spring.

The planting for 1927 is the largest in many years, state the Union officials. The trees come from nurseries in New York state, Kansas, and Iowa.

Among the largest plantings of cherry trees this year are following: Dr. Eames, Egg Harbor, 3,000 trees; John Boler, Sawyer, 1,700; Chris Trodahl, Sawyer, 1,000; Cady Land Company, Egg Harbor, 1,000; William Kinnaird, Sevastopol, 1,500; and the Wisconsin Fruit Farm, formerly the Zahn place in Sevastopol, 1,600. The balance of the stock is scattered.

Since the cherry trees are planted twenty feet apart and in rows twenty feet apart, there are 108 to the acre. With this as a basis, the 50,000 trees to be planted this spring will cover approximately 465 acres. With the present acreage of cherries in the county nearly 5,000, the 1927 planting will bring the average well over 5,000.



What is probably one of the largest individually owned farms in Door County is that belonging to Dr. H. F. Eames. His holdings consist of 500 acres, being nearly all in a solid block. Besides his large orchard the doctor has a herd of 35 blooded Holstein cows together with a goodly number of young cattle and a couple sires for his herd. For the year 1926 the herd of cows produced 224,754 pounds of milk. The milk is shipped to the Van Camp canning plant. The fruit industry on the Eames farm is on a much larger scale than the dairy business and to aid in cultivation and taking care of the crops two tractors, two teams of horses, and two large trucks are used.

BIG FRUIT SECTION

The bulk of the planting cherries and apples in Egg Harbor is carried on by the Murphy Farms with 240 acres of cherries and 110 acres of apples. Dr. H. F. Schroeder, however, has 130 acres of cherries and 20 acres of apples, and Dr. H. F. Eames has 90 acres of cherries, 50 acres of apples, and 10 acres of plums. C. R. Cady has 60 acres of

cherries and 40 acres apples, while Peter Krowel has 10 acres of cherries. All in all, Egg Harbor has jumped well into the lead as one of the county's principal fruit sections.

We passed through the Fort Valley peach belt. They fail to give as good care on the average to their orchards as we do to our own in Door County. In general there are but few districts as well farmed as in Door County. There is a lack of industrious application to the job.

A large crowd attended the annual Gibraltar Community fair held here last Saturday afternoon and evening. The exhibition of apples was the largest and best ever seen here, including thirty varieties from twenty-eight adult exhibitors and forty-two varieties from student exhibitors. Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor was the judge.

Oct. 31, 1929 – DC News - A crew of approximately twenty men and women were employed several weeks during this fall to pick and sort the apple crop from the Dr. H. F. Eames' orchards at Egg Harbor. When a representative of The News visited the packing establishment a week ago he was informed that the crop this year will be the largest ever harvested by the Eames orchards. It was twenty-three years ago last spring that Dr. Eames made a start on his apple orchard, a small start at that time, but in 1912, after having been firmly convinced of the practicability of raising apples on a commercial basis, 100 acres were planted, and this year's crop is really the first genuine harvest from the trees planted that year. Since 1912 the orchard has been increased from time to time until it now comprises slightly more than 200 acres, including both apples and cherries, and Dr. Eames believes that within five years his annual production will be double that of this year.

The pack this year is the best ever attempted by the Eames orchards and every effort was exerted to set a record for other apple producing sections to shoot at "We have a standing offer of \$1.00 for every worm found in our pack," explained the doctor, and when questioned as to whether or not the offer was jokingly made, he said, "No sir, if you think you can make any money at it you're welcome to take the contract right now. I never joke about financial matters."

Dr. Eames has made a thorough study of the apple raising industry, from the proper ground on which to plant the different varieties, including a study of the varieties

which prove best adapted to the climate of Door County, on up through the care of an orchard and problems bearing on the marketing and sale of the fruit. "Any attempt to rush the growth of an orchard," said the doctor, "is sure to meet with disaster. That is only one of the impossibilities in producing good fruit it also holds true relative to the longevity of trees. The thermal belt comprised of Door County is suitable for the growth of McIntosh, Northwestern Greening and Northern Spy apples, although other varieties are grown very successfully. We are attempting to specialize on these three varieties. Of course we grow other varieties and it will be some time before we can discontinue them. We are experimenting with varieties of early and late apples in an endeavor to lengthen the season and provide a longer period of labor for employees. It is not yet proven conclusively that the Northern Spy is thoroughly adapted to climatic conditions here, but we believe there is no question that such will be the case and we are going to give the Spy a thorough trial.

"The future of Door County in the matter of raising apples is already made. For each disadvantage, we can point to any number of advantages. Of course one of the disadvantages is the shortness of the growing season, which accounts for the trees not maturing to a large size, but there is a freedom from early spring frosts here which affects at least forty per cent of the apple crop in the Missouri valley. There is very little damage in Door County from early frosts. Remoteness from market is also a disadvantage here, and discriminating freight rates have no little bearing on the price the grower receives. However, the practical absence of San Jose scale and the almost total absence of borer are two great advantages which we have here that other apple growing sections are obliged to contend with and our advantages offset the disadvantages many fold."

The packing shed at the Eames orchard is 32x96 feet, especially constructed for the purpose and is a model of convenience. A new grader was installed to handle this

year's crop and it is claimed to be one of the best on the market. The grader was designed by H. W. Ullsperger and Chas. Augustine of Sturgeon Bay. Two large trucks are engaged in hauling the pack to this city for marketing through the Fruit Growers' Union.

Dr. Eames has practiced medicine at Egg Harbor for the past thirty-five years and his heart is wrapped up in the future of Door County. In recent years his health has been very poor, but he always manages to supervise his orchard with the help of his two sons and a daughter and maintains a large dairy herd in addition to his other interests. He contends that a great deal of the success he has met with his orchard is due to the mulching he is able to procure from manure, and he claims that dairying and fruit growing go hand in hand.

The 1929 Door County apple crop, the harvest of which was completed last week, is the largest in the history of this peninsula, reports show, exceeding the former bumper yield of 1927 by at least 25,000 bushels. The bulk of the crop was marketed through the Door County Fruit Growers Union which handled approximately 155,000 bushels, but a large amount was handled independently by D. E. Bingham and L. E. Birmingham of Sevastopol and by Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor.

Wealthies, McIntosh and Delicious were the principal eating varieties shipped, while Northwestern Greenings held the lead among the cooking apples. The crop of Talman Sweets was exceptionally good, although the acreage is not large as compared with the four leaders.

Few of the apples were packed in fancy boxes this season, since the market for bushel packs was good. Most of the 280 cars shipped by the Union went to Chicago and Milwaukee, although some went to Detroit, New York City, Minneapolis, Duluth and Iowa.

The body of the older brother was not rescued until about a half hour later. In the meantime the Baileys Harbor coast guard crew made a record run of thirteen miles in fifteen minutes by motor car and shortly afterward the Sturgeon Bay coast guard crew arrived. Apple orchards will be the means of bringing Door County to the forefront in the state of Wisconsin, stated H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor on Monday. The doctor, who is one of the leading fruit growers of the

county, appeared at The News office and reaching in his pocket said to the editor, "here stick your teeth into this Stark's Delicious and tell me whether or not you ever had a better apple." It was one, of those beautiful red Delicious apples, about the size of a man's fist or larger," and the doctor stated he had disposed of over 2,000 bushels of them this fall. "They are the best apples that are to be found in any country," said the doctor, and it is possible for employees of The News office to vouch for their flavor and excellence.

Dr. Eames said he set out about 40 acres of apple trees last spring and will again set out additional acreage next spring. These trees will not come into bearing on any appreciable scale for ten years, at least, it was stated by the doctor, but he has every faith in the future of the apple industry and he feels that apples are of much more importance to the people of Door County than the cherry.

Every apple orchardist in Door County raised splendid apples during the present year and they were the means of bringing in a large amount of ready money.

In addition, to the Delicious apples which Dr. Eames sold this year he sold several thousand bushels of other varieties; including McIntosh, Talman Sweets, Snows, etc.

"An apple tree which is taken care of will produce for 125 years," said Dr. Eames, "whereas a cherry tree has outlived its usefulness in about 25 years. It takes an apple tree somewhat longer to mature but in the end there is a great deal of difference in favor of the apple, and I believe Door County growers will do well to watch their apple orchards and extend their operations in this line."

Nov. 11, 1932 – DC Advocate - BANK OF STURGEON BAY REORGANIZED. Had to Close Because of Withdrawals. OPEN THURSDAY ON WAIVER PLAN 80 Per Cent of Deposits Represented in Agreements Signed This Week.

Forced to take advantage of a holiday declared by Mayor James G. Martin, because of the large amount of withdrawals in the past year and especially since the close of the Merchants Exchange bank in September, the Bank of Sturgeon Bay called in the state banking department last Friday, but since that time has effected a reorganization that made possible opening the institution yesterday under the waiver agreement plan.

Almost 1,500 of the more than 4,000 depositors of the \$3,307,000 bank attended a meeting held at the high school auditorium Monday afternoon when the plan was explained and the signing of the waiver agreements was urged by a number of speakers.

The waiver agreement plan important specifies that 60 per cent of a depositor's account will be paid by the bank gradually over a period of 48 months, the first payment in six months, the second six months later, and the balance every four months until the completion of the allotted time.

The other 40 per cent will be held in trust, secured by certain securities of the institution. As the trustees realize returns on these assets, dividends will be prorated to the depositors. The trustees are H. C. Scofield and Dr. H. F. Eames, representing the depositors, and Henry Fetzer representing the bank.

In the meantime, the reorganized bank is open for new business.

Nov. 18, 1932 – DC Advocate - APPLE HARVEST IN COUNTY OVER; CROP NOT LARGE.

The apple harvest in Door County is over, and a survey of the yield shows the crop was about medium in volume, as it was nationwide this year.

Many thousands of bushels, however, were trucked out of the county daily during the season, bringing the low prices of from 25 cents to \$1.25 a bushel, depending on size, quality and variety. Leading shippers were M. W. Miller of the S. Miller Fruit Co. of

Marshfield, who had a branch office here; a group of local growers, using the Union apple warehouse under the direction of L. E. Birmingham; D. E. Bingham, who has a large independent business; Dr. H. F. Eames of Egg Harbor, who marketed a large amount for himself and others of his vicinity; and M. B. Goff, who converted his large barn into a modern storage shed to facilitate handling his crop.

The Miller company was by far the largest buyer of apples this season and plans to return next year. The concern paid out in cash more than \$25,000 for 32,000 bushels of apples, it is reported.

Receipts of cherries at the factory Saturday amounted to 535,367, the largest this season for one day, but about 150,000 pounds were left over from Friday's run, making a total of around 685,000 pounds necessary to can before the plant closed for the Sunday holiday, according to the records of Frank Eames, weighmaster.

Literally hundreds upon hundreds of people now living in the northern part of Door County, or scattered to the four corners of the globe, owe their existence to the efficient ministrations of kindly Doctor Eames when they first saw the light of day.

However, not alone as a country doctor was he a truly great man. He was especially interested in promoting the best interests of fruit growers and worked unceasingly to uphold the cooperative organization in its efforts to bring the industry to the highest state of perfection. As a director of the Fruit Growers Coop, his advice and counsel was always given the greatest consideration.

The News feels that it is impossible to pay just tribute to a truly great man such as was Doctor Eames. He was far-sighted and energetic, without ambition for personal aggrandizement, and was a true friend to everyone he knew.

Dr. H. F. Eames died at his home here Friday night after having been seriously ill two days from heart trouble. Services, directed by the Stephenson Funeral home, were held Tuesday afternoon from the Evangelical church with the pastor, the Rev. Arnold Weaver, officiating. Serving as pallbearers were the Drs. Huff, Leasum, Muehlhauser, Proctor, Sneeberger and Schroeder.

Dr. Eames was born in Maeham, Province of Quebec, Canada, in 1859, and came to this country at the age of 17, settling in Door County. After teaching school for five years, he attended the University of Illinois Medical college, graduating in 1889. He started his practice at Wacedah, Michigan, and at Crystal Falls, but returned to Door county in 1892. He married Miss Emma F. Baker at Wacedah April 7, 1887, and the couple celebrated their golden wedding this past spring.

Dr. Eames was one of the early cherry growers and at the time of his death, he was operating 200 acres of cherry orchards and 200 acres of apple orchards, besides owning a fine dairy herd. With all these duties demanding his attention, he also kept up a medical practice.

A typical pioneer doctor, Mr. Eames for many years had to make his calls under extreme difficulties, covering bad roads winter and summer often on foot or horseback. During his career, he had unusual ability especially in treating pneumonia and influenza.

Other interests of Dr. Eames included being president of the Door County Telephone company from 1915 until the time of his death, one of three trustees of the segregated fund of the Bank of Sturgeon Bay and a director of the Fruit Growers' Cooperative.




During the winter of 1993 Dr. Eames' beloved 'LaVista' was lifted from her foundation and moved down into the village.

Dr. Eames' home property on Cty. E as seen today.




At one time the Eames estate involved much of the land east of the village, up on and beyond the ridge. He also owned numerous properties within the village and some acreage in the outer rural areas.








Appendix D Plat Of Properties in Egg Harbor


