THE THREE CATHOLIC BOARDS OF EDUCATION IN SAULT STE. MARIE SUBJECT: A REQUEST TO CLOSE ALL THREE OF OUR CATHOLIC SCHOOLS EITHER ON DECEMBER 18, 1970 OR ON JANUARY 22, 1971

OUR THINKING AND OUR INTENTIONS

Proposal C has become the law of Michigan. We have studied both the short range and the long range effect of this unbelievable amendment. Our first concern is to provide our own children with the best possible Catholic

education now and in the future. We are also conscious that other states are watching Michigan closely, and whatever we do will have an effect on both our

friends and our enemies across the entire land.

The easy solution for us would be to carry on until we collapse, one by one, leaving only the pastors and an assistant or two to pick up the pieces. We have decided it would be better for us and for the entire Church to do the more difficult thing, namely, to close all three schools and to use our present personnel to set up good alternate programs.

Why now? We have a healthy staff at hand, willing to use the released time law to the full, willing to train several ay people, to conduct various types of religious education program at all levels, to experiment with nightly enrichment programs. Pers and already on exceptionally good terms with almost all of the sudents presently in our schools and with many of the students in the public schools. All of our sisters are willing to give their best efforts for the remainder of the school year, and two have practically committed themselves for the following year, with more being interest d. Why now? Because we just can't hack it, on any level, in Sanit Se. Marie, without state aid. Let us look at the facts:

\*In two years, 133 envelope users have either died or moved away... \*In two years, we have 106 fewer children in our three schools...

\*The number of children in our parishes is declining proportionately...

\*Our present first graders were born in the bumper crop year of 1964, so what will happen to our numbers in each succeeding year?

\*This community has a public junior high, and without Loretto we would lose many children from our grade schools after the 6th grade ...

\*The number of children in our schools decreases each year, but the cost of operating them goes up each year. Without state aid, to continue any of our schools just doesn't make sense. Now we will look at our financial condition:

St. Mary's income is only a couple of thousand dollars more than St. Joseph's.

and we had to hire a para-professional for the library—etc... yes, coal also went up 4.00 per ton!

Plus whatever deficits we incur because of unforeseen events which will cost us more than we have budgeted. The parishes also pick up the tuition of those unable to pay. Our students earned the \$768 we needed for our share of financing the unsuccessful proposal C campaign.

State Aid should have brought us 16,000... Now it won't even bring us half of that!

Even with state aid, our budget was fiscally irresponsible. However, there was hope then that gradual increases in state aid would eventually make Catholic secondary education possible financially in Sault Ste. Marie. To continue now would be ridiculous.

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CONCLUSIONS: For the sake of Catholic education in other states, and to enable us to set up a responsible alternate program here with the personnel available, WE REQUEST THE CONCURRANCE OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD AND OF THE BISHOP IN OUR DECISION TO CLOSE ALL THREE OF OUR SCHOOLS EITHER ON DECEMBER 18, 1970 OR ON JANUARY 22, 1971. We have problems with the students earning necessary credit on shared time at Sault High. We face a debt of over half a million dollars on the Loretto property regardless of our decision, but there is still hope that it can be sold for a public junior high school. Until this is accomplished, and it might mean several attempts at the polls, we can use it for released time and other religious activities. Closing now will lose us some tuition money but we will also save some. Contracted people will have to be compensated. We want to make the more difficult choice...because of our enrollment forecasts and our financial condition, we think the wiser one...and we feel we are acting in the best interests of the Church.

We also asked the sisters for their ideas about alternate programs, what they would really like to do, and what they think we should do in Sault Ste. Marie.

Almost all of them think we should close our schools, given our financial and population condition, although most hate to see them go. The children must be our first concern.
