The Fellowing Report is the Description of the (o'al Program

This program is designed for our total Catholic p. vulation - from pre-schoolers through senior citizens. Religious education is for everyone. A truly living fisith is vital and we must strive to communicat this vitality of belief to all whatever their age or circumstance maybe.

- ANTS: 1. To teach people, sindis especially, dist our lives as we live them, teach more about our belief in God than mything we'll ever say.
 - 2. To tesen that Christ is the tore of our religion. He is the center of our lives, and therefore our war endeavor is to make His Signs (Secrements) in our Christian Community visible and understandable in the light of recent Wedlogical understerlings and insights.
 - 3. To commissive a crey respect and reverence for each.

There are presently approximately 1.400 students involved in this program, and numerous adults. The adult participation conters around parents whose children are involved in the program, but it is not strictly limited to them. The children spend approximataly one hour in class each west. They also spend a half howr coming and going on busees to our Center.

The heart of the program centers mainly on the use of the Michigan Released-Time Law allowing children two hours of released-time per work. We have scheduled those relessed-time classes in cooperation with the local area public school superintendent and his administration. The schedule includes time and classes for ten area public sumpols. One school is too for away and has too for Catholic students, and we have arranged for religion classes to be taught in homes in that area. The local public school there assists in having their buses drop the students at these homes after their daily classes are completed. Fre-school classes are held twice during the week and a couple of parishes offer these sessions during the Sunday Liturgy.

The high school program operates in the evening. (A schedule was attempted for reloured-bine alanced for those students on wall, but, it proved to be too complex a situnivier to headle.) Therefore, the high school religion classes are held on the following basis

Home discussions are held four nights of the week, students choosing one night, and once a week regular classroom type instructions are hold. In one rather remote area, we are having released-time high school insurutions during the day every other week at the request of two pastors where children ere involved. Another area, (Sugar Island) classes meet in house every other week.

The main activities for parents at the present mament (it changes almost weekly; we adopt as the situation presents itself) are perental sessions for preparation for the recoption of the sacrements. These sessions include the sacrements of Baptism, Euchszist, Panance, Confirmation, and Marriage. Sessions for parames whose children will be receiving Holy Communion, and Penance for the first time are held three different times each time they are presented, in order to offer maximum op extunity for parents to get to these sessions. Family First Communion is offered for the second graders predominantly, and Penance for the fourth graders. Our Lenten Area Program for adults, being conducted through all the parish liturgies during prepared homilies, deals with the Church Where It Is Today." It is concentrating on giving all an updating on the changes in the Church in the past ten years. At present the Pastoral Service area focuses mainly on visiting the sick in the hospital, the long term care ward of the hospital, the Provincial House, also for the olderly, and the Schior Citizen High Rise. Vicio to shut-ins are also gere of this program. We are attempting to get needed help in the visiting of shut-ins Aren existing parish organizations. Plans are also being studied to update the anointing of the sick on a regular basis.

a) Core staff (sisters) has definite rules as not at in job descriptions.

b) Core staff has relative autonomy in carrying out the program. They also have maximum knowledge of other creas of conscionation via wealthy core staff meetings.

c) Core staff has extensive preservice scholing stemming from experience as teachers. Inservice training for the program stand from initial involvement in the creation of the program, and from participation in writchops and staff meetings regularly. Also each division has wookly to ther propertion sousions.

d) Core staff numbers who are indicious receive a stipend equal to that of full time

The program has a esparate budget. The budget is drawn up by the director in consultation will the core stell. The director edministers the total budget, but each level edministers ins port of the total budget. The constraints are that the Board approves the budget, as Minumice the Parish Councils where they emixt, and a budget report is prepared twice a year, with a certified accountsat chacking the books at the end of each fiscal year.

The program was thereughly cooperative at all levels in its initial planning stages. Pasters, pricots, parents, and interested people were involved in the initial planning. Ind lay group with two sistors, and one priest involved, designed the all periah survey questioness, and piloted in through an adult group before presenting it to the parishissecure at the parish liturgies on Religious Education Sunday. The program was also reviewed as proposed by the Diocesan Board of Education and the Bishop.

Three Main Characteristics that I believe make this program a success ers:

- 1. The recognition of the need for this type of program. Awareness was precipitated by the closing of all area Catholic Schools because of financial difficulty.
- 2. Interested, dedicated pasters who were aware of our great need, and also deeply committed to the communication of the gospel of Christ. These men, further, are magnanimous in that they are not protectors as it were, of their personal pasteral power in the limited way of guarding my parish. They were interested in combining resources and coming up with what may possibly be the greatest good for the people of God on the whole.
- 3. A core staff that is committed to the communication of the gospel of Christ, and who were trusting enough of the Spirit to risk their all in giving to this community whatever competencies they have, coupled with a great hope and a deep personal faith.
