August 12, 1934. - Greetings! The old order gives place to the

new! Mother Bernardine brought three doves fresh

from First Year to Woodlawn to re-found the Branch

Novitiate. The three fortunate foundresses are

Sr. De Chantal, Sr. Ancilla, and Sr. Juana. We

were warmly welcomed by the new Superior, Mother

Callista; and other members of the community.

After partaking of a little refreshment during

which we were given recreation we retired.

August 13 -

Boxes!!! Barrels!!! Fackages!!! More and more of them! Exclamations: "Oh! that was the electric clock out in the hall at the Branch!"

"The chapel chairs in the Noviceship?!!" "Oh, two sewing machines a typewriter, and a victrola in the noviceship!" "Where shall we put the statues and the pidestals?" All this and more.

August 14 -

Mo'her and Sr. De Chantal arranged the noviceship, Sr. Ancilla the south domitory, and Sr. Juana the north dormitory. At last order is emerging from chaos.

August 15 -

Our Lady's Assumption! Exposition and novices at Adoration at Woodlawn. Another blessing! Our own refectory. It used to be the young ladies' refectory.

August 17 -

Sr. Bernarda and Ør. St. Maurus generously came over to help us get settled in our new home. Thanks to their splendid efforts our refectory is finished, even to putting up the curtains in the

cupboards at the end of the room. Imagine dining in the same room as one's trunk! But there happens to be a partition in between. The chairs from the old noviceship are in the refectory. The curtains that used to be here have been given to us to put up so that our little refectory looks very dear and homelike.

- August 19 Visiting Sunday, our first in the new Branch! True to custom our visitors brought supplies for our larder.
- August 21 An exciting day for the pioneers! In honor of Sr. De Chantal's feast day we enjoyed extra recreation and a 10 lovely walk through Jackson Park to the Lake.
- August 25 Two more of our family have arrived! Sr. Hilary and Sr. Alice are home at last. They were met at the station by Mr. and Mrs. Whitehead and so arrived very safely.

 Again the privilege of recreation during the little repast. They brought much mews from the dear ones at the Abbey and help out hopes of the arrival within a few days of the remaining four.
- September 1- At last our Ship is complete! Morning brought a telegram from the Abbey that our four were actually on their way.

 There were many guesses as to the identity of one member of the party, for the reason of the delay was the failure of Sr. Mary Carl's birth certificate to reach the Abbey which prevented her from getting a visa. - 9:20. Hopes are high! The train must be in by now.

 9;40. The train must be late! 10:00. Still no sign of them, but Mr. Whitehead brought the news that the train was late. 10:30. Where, oh where can they be? 11:00.

 "Go to bed and we will call you when they come". 11:10.

 Servite domino in laetitia! Home at last! The mystery

- is solved at last! Sr. Mary Clare arrived in place of Sr. Mary Carl. Welcome, Sisters Mary Stanislaus, Blance, and Benita! More recreation and more news from Toronto.
- September 2 Retreat over at four o'clock. Gala times in honor of the homecomers.
- September 4 All aboard for school! South Shore Express for St.

 Bride's: Sr. Mary Clare, grades five and six, Sr. Hilary grades three and four, and Sr. Benita grade two.

 Woodlawn local to St. Cyril's: Sr. Ancilla grade seven, Sr. Alice grade six, Sr. Mary Stanislaus grade four, and Sr. Blance grade two.

 Englewood special to St. Bernard's: Sr. De Chantale grade four, and Sr. Jana French and Latin in the high school.
- September 5 The board's marked! For a noviceship of nine we are well supplied with sacristans! One to assist Sr. Hild egarde t St. Cyril's Sr. Mary Stanislaus, and two in the house Sr. Juana and Sr. Alice, under Sr. Giovanni. Sr. Mary Clare is in full charge of the closet located in the dark room. Sr. De Chantal is assistant to Sr. Ignatius, the mistress of house, and Sr. Ancilla is infirmarian under M.M. Lorenzo. Sr. Hilary, going to the board: "Oh, mops again." Sr. Blance is Mother Callista's assistant in the pahtry, and Sr. Benita is our librarian.
 - October 1 Some more acquisitions for the noviceship a sewing machine, a victrola, records, two lamps, and a bed. Mrs.

 Gallagher, Sr. Juana's mother, is the donor. Won't it be fun to have the three sewing machines, the two vic-

- trolas, the piano, the violin, and the mandola all going at the same time?
- October 60- Back to school days again! Two of our number are University bound Sr. Ancilla and Sr. Alice are going to De
- October 14 Mother Callists's feast day: The day began very propitiously with singing at Mass, recreation for breakfast,
 visitors, gifts, and a little entertainment by the novices.
- October 15 -Mother General's feast. We sent her a spiritual bouquet and a "Welcome" by Mother Loyola
- November 10 -We scarcely recognized Sr. Mary Stanislaus when she appeared in the pristine splendor of new spectacles.
- November 13 -St. Stanislaus' Day! Cur guests, the J.P.'s, arrived bright and early Sr Ellen and Sr. Teresita from St. Bride's, and Srs. St. Maurus. Christina, Pauline, St. Daniel, Kenneth St. Paul, Bernarda, Laura, and Myron from Englewerd. Sr. Colete was ill and couldn't come. The usual round of good times was had, with an exciting basketball game between the "Blacks" and the "Whites" in the after-noon. Need I add that the Doves were the vactors? How unusual! Five o'clock, the bell rings, and still we talk on uninterruptedly. The evening was filled with pleasant reminiscing of the day's activities and at nine we retired, weary but happy.
- December 17- Sr. Juana has responded to the call of "School Days" too and has registered at Loyola for a course in French.
- December 21-Welcome, Sr. Ermelinda! Our happy numbers are increased and depleted by one. Our wee little mother has succumbed to an attack of the flu and is in retirement "just off

the dorm."

- December 22 Sr. Hilary is added to the number of those off duty temporarily.
- December 23 Retreat for the novices.
- December 24 Christmas preparations going on in full force. Be careful where you go:
- December 25 Pax vobiscum! He is come, the Holy One, the Long-Expected. On the stroke of twelve midnight Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Anderson, O. Carm. amid twinkling candles and flowers. At Communion time the nuns renewed their holy vows. After a brief repast all retired for the morning. A very meir, and holy and happy Christmas to all! We all trooped up to the noviceship after breakfast and found it transformed thru Christmas magic. A tail tree stood in the center of the room from which streamed red and green paper ribbons attached to our desks which were arranged in a semi-circle. As each package from our dear ones at home was anwrapped exclamations of joy and thanksgiving were he rd from all sides. Soon Mother Callista came up to wish us joy on this day. Kneeling about the crib we sang the usual hymn, "Jesus is Here", to the Wee Occupant. Then we showed our gifts to Mother Callista. In the afternoon our friends and relatives came to wish us a merry Christmas, and each one returned from the parlor laden with gifts of all descriptions.
- December 27 Hurrah! Another famous date in history. A party at

 St. Bride's! We were not complete however for we left
 at home Mother, Sr. Ancilla, and Sr Hilary. We were
 entertained by games until the middle of the afternoon
 when we felt that the time had come to pay our adieux.

- What was not our dismay to come home and find Sr. Ancilla a victim of mumps!
- December 28 Sr. Ermelinda has retired from the lists; Who is next?

 Why, Sr. Alice! Has she the mumps or chicken pox?

 Who knows? She has neither!
- December 29 Alas and alack! We have lost another! Sr. Blanche.
- December 31 Our little mother is ill again and the trip to Oak

 Park is cancelled.
- January 1 All hail to the New Year! May it be a holy and healthful one, ushering in the year of our holy profession.
- January 3 Back to school again:
- January 5 Sr. De Chantal has succumbed to the attack of an enemy and is in bed.
- January 9 Sadly we bade farewell to dear Sr. Ermelinda who has returned to the Abbe, with M.M. Alphonsus. What a difference it makes for a person to come, stay awhile, and then go. We shall miss you, Sr. Ermelinda. Sr. De Chartal is back at school.
- February 6 A real live crow has flown to us from Toronto! Sr.

 M. Consuela, the former Miss Marie McKugo, of St. Bernard's parish, just entered last Saturday on the feast of our Lady's Purification. How good it is to see again a really truly postulant in cap and gown!
- February 8 Sr. M. Consuela has returned to the Abbey, taking our love with her.
- February 15 St. Valentine's masquerade The costumes were indeed unique and the entertainment most amusing.
- February 11 Sr. Mary Stanislaus was operated upon this morning for appendicitis. Reports are favorable regarding the patient's condition.

- uary 24 Sr. Mary Stanislaus has returned home and Sr. Blanche is appointed her nurse.
- March 17 Greetings to St. Patrick! In his honor we sang Irish hymns and had "rek for brek". Also to celebrate we took a long walk through the park and back with the privilege of recreation en route.
- March 18 We all attended the gym demonstration, and enjoyed it very much, especially the costumes since we had made some of them all day.
- March 24 The alumnae retreat! Due to the large numbers attending, the conferences were held in the assembly hall which was adorned to the last degree for the occasion. Rev. Father Walter Croarkin was the retreat master. The novices sang the high Mass and also during the hoty hour.
- April 6 Our dear Sr. M. Loo finally passed to her reward this morning just five dear before her feast. May she rest in peace.
- April 18,19,20-We had the priv lege of attending Holy Week services at St. Cyril's.
- April 21 Happy Easter! How good it was to see one's mother after the silence of Lent. Again we came from the parlor laden with all manner of good things.
- April 22 Another red letter day in the noviceship calendar! Off for St. Bride's once more, the last frolice there for Mother Imelda and also for us. The old order must give place to the new! Two parties of hikers tripped through the park and arrived much before those who came by train. An egg hunt was on the program with the prizes being won by Mother Bernardine and Sr. De Chantal. After a most delightful, afternoon we said farewell and returned home.
- April 28 A rare treat! A visit with our mothers all alone!

Sr. Mary Clare played her violin to Sr. Hilary's accompanimers.

May 25

- We're in three month, now! Somehow we don't feel any different than we did this ima yesterday, except that now our time between 6:30 and 7:00 is spent in the chapel meditating on the vows.

May 30

- Ascension Thursday! Shall we ever forget it? There was a general Cisca meeting at Mt. Carmel today and all the nuns present were invited over to the convent for their dinner. The novices helped with the serving and the speedier one was the better!

June 1

- Our promised excursion was to the Aquarium. the Planetatium, and the Field museum. It was a full day and a very pleasant one.

June 4

- Thanks be to God! Sr. Hilary has regained her voice after four weeks of silence. She have up her class at St. Bride's several weeks ago. M. M. St. Benedict is supplying for her.
- June 10 The good old golden rule lays are over for St. Bernard's and

- and St. Bride's. St. Cyril's closes on Wednesday.
- June 11 We went to the graduation exercises of the high school this evening.
- June 14 Good-bye Sisters Mary Clare, Mary Stanislaus, Hilary, Blanche and Benita! We shall miss you but it won't be for long. In the meantime pray for us during retreat. Keep a place for at the Abbey.
- June 15 Ssh! Ssh! The nuns are in retreat. Where can we recreate without disturbing them?
- June 24 Ah! Retreat is over and we are on our way! Bon vogage!

 Chug! Chug! All aboard for the Appey and Profession!

1935.

Mother M. Bernardine and Sr. M. Colette kept the home fires burning until August 15th. Our house reopens to smiling faces and happy laughter. Tonight saw the arrival of Sisters M. Mædalena (Savoie) and M. Beata (Purpura).

August 18th Sr. M. Ildephonse (Offonnor) arrived in time for Mass.

August 20th Two more lively members were added this evening to Woodlawn's younger quarters, namely Sr. M. St. Frederick, Kompare and Sr. M. St. Bernadette, Burns.

This concludes the arrival of our white veils. Five is our quota.

August 28th One of the biggest questions since the Armistice has been settled! Yes - there will be J.P's in the noviceship. On all sides since time long past we have heard snatches like the following: "Do you think?" "Yes". "I am sure they won't". "Time will tell", et has told. Sisters M. Ancilla Dwyer, M. Alice, Whitehead, M. Chabanel, Ordway, and Mary Carl, Philion, arrived to settle any doubts as to whether the above named newly professed would be young community- ites or elder members of the good ship novice!

August 30th Our family is complete! Sisters Mary Stanislaus
Drummond, and M. Benita, Bannon (going to St. Brides)
and M. Juana, Gallagher, met the reception committee
at a rather late hour, nevertheless the committee
was wide awake. M. Mary Theresa took good care of
Sister Juana en route from Canada but the community
claimed the former immediately upon arrival, she is
not a candidate for the noviceship.

- September 4th. Books! Pencils! Paper! everywhere!! Yes, school is open again. Our family is divided up among Woodlawn, St. Brides, St. Bernards and St. Cyrils. We feel quite proud of our Sisters going forth to each of our Chicago Schools to carry our ideals to others.

- September 12th Loretto's biggest feast! The Holy Name of Mary. The day was beautiful and a holiday, the first of the year, added to each ones enjoyment.
- September 14th They're off! Yes, the community and noviceship

 went on a picnic together -- still they weren't to
 gether! Figure it at for yourself. We suggest you

Several of ours are school bound. Sisters M. Ancilla, M. Alice, and M. Ildephonse are heading for De Paul bright and early on Saturday morning, while Sisters M. St.Frederick and M. Beata go towards

St. Xaviers. A.M.D.G.

September 26th Happy Feast! Sister M. Chabanel and glorious birthday one month old black veils! Our thoughts were not
quite what they should have been on account of having
no benediction on such a big day!

September 28th Sister M. Juana could stand only one day of School.

Is it old age or no room? It seems Sister started a

library course today and is finished too. Too much

for us!

October 14th

Yes - the old order must give way to the new. Each ones best foot went forward today even in Singing.

Yes, 'tis Mother Callista's resst. The finale was the repetition of "The Grand Cham's Diamond" by the members of the positiate. Two performances in one day ought to make the headlines. Don't you think so?

November 13th Once again hovices get the very most from their biggest of big days. St. Stanislaus Day! A treasure hunt proved to be a real hunt but after a hard battle Sisters M. de Chantal and M. Ancilla repeated their postulant days by again winning the coveted prize.

Mother gave each Sister present a beautiful remembrance of a very happy St. Stanislaus day.

November 20th Eve of Presentation. Sr. M. St. Bernadette left
smilingly for St. Bernards hospital accompanied by
Mother M. Bernardine and Mother M. Callista. The hour
was 7:15 P.M. What was that we learned about, "after
night fall?"

November 21st Sister St. Bernadette has returned to the dove cota

December 20th School closed for Christmas holidays.

December 21st Great preparations are under way.

December 22nd The Community entered wholeheartedly into the spirit of the retreat.

December 25th All astened to be first in greeting the new born Babe and then we enjoyed our temporal food with recreation. Nine o'clock Mass at St. Cyril's was very Christmasy. About ten fifteen M.M. Callista was warmly welcomed into the Noviceship to view our lovely

> and realistic crib, credit for which goes to Sister Mary Stanislaus. Each received His gift. Soon all found their own desk hidden 'neath boxes, bundles and cards. Santa forgot no one. There was as much pleasure in watching others open gifts as in doing so oneself. The parlors had quite a steady business in the afternoon.

January 26th Our Mother has le?', 'o spend the day at St. Brides.

'Tis Mother Beravice's first feast as Superior.

January 27th St. Cyrils enjoyed their fifth free day. The furnace with't want to go to school so it went out on order. No tears were shed at the scene of the accident.

February 10th We attended Loretto's Gym Demonstration.

February 14th Valentines in the form of hearts surmounted by crosses were distributed to all in the Noviceship.

March 15th

Sisters M. Colette, Ancilla, Alice and Ildephonse have graduated in dreams. In other words their respective terms are over for this year. Sister

M. Juana is starting a course for her M.A.

Great things seem to be astir. What can it be? Oh! we are going to have a jubilee!!

March 17th The day has arrived !!! Sr. M. Johanna is today

helping in many ways, chiefly by keeping out of sight. Sr. M. Juana has charge of Sr. Johanna's relatives as regards one major portion of the festivities i.e. their meals. Mother General came for the day. her last in Chicago this year. God be with her. A timorous bell riger inquired nervously at the community room door about one-fifty one whether or not she should ring the one forty-five bell.

So - this is three months, no it is only the Monday morning. Yes the five doves are in three months. They are not doing too badly starting out with recreation for breakfast but 'tis not on their account. Our Mother renewed her vows this morning. I'm sure all had a share. Aren't you?

May 20th

Yes. The great day has arrived - Mother's Feast!

Though we are celebrating tomorrow, Ascension Thursday, because of the holiday, the day has been most enjoyable starting with recreation for breakfast accompanied by a beautiful spiritual bouque nade by Sister Mary Stanislaus.

May 21st

Real action is taking place today. The order of the day is as follor. Holy Mass, Exposition, recreation for breakfas' preparations for coming J.P.'s, candy making, - 'prajers for its hardening), last minute touches to the noviceship, etc. etc. a dress rehearsal of cur intertainment was given in the afternoon for our visitors, namely; Sisters St. Daniel, Teresita, Sylvester, St. Paul, Kenneth, Laura, De Chantal, Raphael, and Benita. After early night prayers our little program was diven for the Community in the gym. It consisted of Mother's Feast day song to the tune of "The Wedding of Jack and Jill", a play entitled, "Be a Little Cookoo" and the Minuet. The closing was "The World of Praise". Judging from reviews everyone enjoyed the "show". Mother was the recepient of many lovely gifts among which was numbered a famous office book which drew Sisters Ancilla and Alice downtown after school on a "secret trip". They burned down the

- January 30 Three little kittens were playing "pie" in the snow. Two came in to play a joke on the third. The third came in later to find Mother trying her best to gain addmittance to the cloack room. Evidently the key was lost.

 A forthcoming "mew "from behind barred doors and a slight movement showed that someone was inside. What was the dismay of the two "maughty kittens" to find that their "mother they had locked."

- Feb. 22 Washington's Birthday this year ushered in the season of penance. But strangely enough no one gave up holidays for Lent.
- Mar. 6 A mysterious telephone call hurried the De Paulites home.

 Mother was going away--our mortgage had expired--somebody
 had died suddenly--Sr. Edwardine's father was going to

- June 9 Are we just having another dream or is it really true? Yes, after a week of acting the part of "book Worms" the De Paulites' exams are over and the scot-free students are playing "ladies of leisure" instead of "Ladies of Loretto".
- June 14 Tsk, tsk: Where were the J.P.'s and what have they been up to? Just more class picknics with the inevitable red noses and gay spirits resulting.

- June 18 Retreat begins for all except the "Whites" who, instead of "retreating" are stepping very much into the foreground. Sr. Susanne is playing Superiorand finding that it really isn't so much fun. Messages have a way of getting twisted. Duties are well divided and the house runs on three wheels.
- June 24 After a week of "running the house", Srs. Susanne, St. David and St. Norbert start on their journey to Toronto and----Profession. True to themselves, they're leaving at the latest possible dateThe train had better be on time or else----!
 Goodbyes were whispered because it was still the reign of peace and quiet at Woodlawn.

Sept. 4 Imagine Mother's surprise when a "walking candy store", as it appeared to her, rang the doorbell! And underneath it all were her three newly professed, Srs. Susanne, St. David and St. Norbert! Tut, tut. They have just returned for another year of good solid work at De Paul, after a delightful ten days' vacation at home where they thoroughly enjoyed a splendid time with all their various relations and friends. It might be added that the trip to the Soo was preceded by a well spent summer at the Abbey in preparation for their First Holy Profession.

- Oct. 12 "Columbus, the gem of the ocean", may have been on the lips of the nation today, but to we DePaulites, it was just another day of lectures and more lectures! However, the Community spirit was high—they spent the day in the "darling little summer home" at Fox River. Cheer up, dears, your day is coming——
- Oct. 19 Congratulations have been pouring down upon our wee Sr. M. St. David these days. Can't you guess? She is our first President at the new DePaul normal which is only a year old. Heartiest Congratulations, dear Sister!
- Oct. 26 "All work and no play makes Jack a wil boy"---nuns, too, says our little Mother. The remedy? Pyan's woods, of course. Sounds goo, doesn't it? And good is was--with the exception of an un-welcome visitor. An honest to goodness rain storm. However, it only dampened our clothes but not our spirits... at least, not until we arrived nome when "pressing" began in real earnest!
- Nov. 12 Although there were several fun-loving and loved J.P.'s absent this year at w. annual celebration of St. Stanislaus's day (Srs.M. St. Frederick, Magdelena, Beata), we had some compensation in Living our three darling crows--it is their first festival in his honor. (They didn't know one saint could be so popular!) In the nun's refectory, a very Christmas-like atmosphere prevailed with its unique decorations, contrary to the yearly festive streamers and trimmings. We, too, have taught the spirit. All our wishes and greetings were sont through the medium of our little play, "A Bit of Heaven', which was "short and sweet and right to the point", "ccording to comments. At the close of the play the spiriual bouquet was presented to Mother on the petals of rear bouquet of red roses. And thereby hangs the tale! Jan. 4 For those artistically inclined came another surprise today. Mother was the proud possessor of free tickets to the Art Museum where some of the original masterpieces from Italy were on display. This is to be the last time these paintings will be released from Italy's possession—so valuable are they.

Just in passing, the readers may enjoy this as much as we did. Our dear Sr. M. Edwardine stood very meditatively in front of Correggio's Madonna and Child, the while remarking in her own characteristic way, "Why she looks just like me"! The crowd which had gathered in the meantime enjoyed it as much as "ours" did.

- Jan. 29 There's always something to take the joy out of lifethis time mid-semester erans. But cheer up! Only 5 days
 of worry, work and fuss compared to 14 days relaxation
 (mostly relaxed on one jobs about the house). "Keep the
 faith", as they say-you won't fail. A positive guarantee
 at DePaul Normal;
- Feb. 1 It's a case of "now we see her and now we don't". Sr. M. Edwardine just can't make up her mind whether she prefers living with us or at St. Bride's. Or so it would appear. The first time she deserted the 'ship' happened three weeks serve Christmas when she went as supply for the finish of the term. Back home she came and "burnt the midnight oil" studying to make up for her absence at DePaul. Exams were just over when word came that she must again pack—this time permanently (at least until July 31?) As one priest has put it —and we agree—"all joy on this earth is tinged with some sorrow". - March 1 A new element of interest was introduced tonight! It happens to be Sister St. David's feast.—Happy Feast, Sister—so the postulants thought they would celebrate. An invitation to please present ours lives at 8 o'clock in the club room was graciously received at supper. Prompt we were to be on time. Whether it be a farce, short story, comedy, or what (let Shake peare decide on it) there hasn't been a recreation filled with so much clever nonsense and laughter in a long time. Congratulations, postulants!
- March 17 "All hail to St. Patrick". Yes, even those of us who don't claim to be Iris can well afford to sing his praises this morning when how is so good as to bring us "rec for brek"! Shamrocks sprouse over night, it seems, for from outward appearance, we have purely an Irish order.
- Another 'reat in store for our postulants, as well as for the res' of us. Keeping watch with Our Lord, compassionating Him in His sorrows of the morrow and thanking Him for giving that stupendous gift of Himself to us was a new experience for them. At least new, in the sense, of spending these few last precious days before the glorious Ressurection at St. Cyril's, with all of the Carmelite's chanting in their beautiful white array.

"Mary is childless but we are redeemed" is the simpliest explanation of all the wonderful mysteries that have occurred since Holy Thursday night. We can now truly say, "O death where is thy sting" for our Risen Lord has triumphed over it in a marvelous fashion. June 10 No "Pomp and Circumstance", no bows, or fuss or fills but just us -- the first graduates of the new DePaul Normal. Although plain and in one of the lecture rooms in the Science Building, it was what we wanted and meant more than a graduation in the Civic Opera House could possibly mean. Fr. O'Connel, C.M., president of the University, gave a short and appropriate address to us, which we hope, will be carried out by each one of us in the years to come.

> And at home, while we three-Sisters Susanne, St. David, and St. Norbert-very excitedly spent the recreation talking graduation with Mother and the few present, the other few absentees prepared a celebration in the refectory. (Sr. M. Wilhelmine supplying the dainties at Mother Superior's request). The last minute decorations were none the less effective and surprising; the gifts had a character all their own. Instead of finding the inside

as beautiful as the wrappings--what a disillusionment! In one package were 4 straight pins on a piece of blotter with a note to this effect: "Hope you won't find this educative process too painful"! The other gifts were all of this nature. We just can't surpass these postulants--they aren't surpassable!

June 24 "Rec for brek" climaxed a glorious 8 day retreat conducted by Rev. Fr. Fitzgerald, S.J. Father had his own simple and sincere methods together with a good sense of humor which he didn't fail to let us appreciate. It was 8 days of many special graces as well, preparing us in a more perfect way for the coming year—and notandums!

All coarts thrilled and were exceeding grateful that three new souls were found ready and determined to "erult as giants to run in the way of God's service".

Our Woodlawn House, sheltering the Branch Novitiate of our Institute, has witnessed today, the first Reception ever held within its precincts. Previous to 1940, the postulant year terminating with reception has been spent in Toronto. Noteworthy too, is the fact that this first ceremony in the House of the Immaculate Conception claims products of all our American schools--Sr. M. Francesca a graduate of St. Bride's Elementary School and Woodlawn Academy, Sr. M. Aloyse of Englewood parochial and High School, and Sr. M. Corona of our Sault schools. Let us thank God and say, as was said of Mary Magdalen, "They have chosen the better part which shall not be taken from them."

1940 August 28

Today witnessed the arrival of six new crows, "the Jolly Half-Dozen." Amid happy smiles of relatives and friends, at the shrine of Our Blessed Mother, Mother Mary Carmel, assisted by Mother Superior and Mother M. Bernardine, gave to each the cap. Then the group proceeded to the chapel where each read the Act consecrating herself to Our Lady and Her Divine Son. From thenceforth Miss Therese Rooney, Loretto Englewood, will be known as Sister M. Xaveria, Miss Mary Madigan, Loretto Englewood, as Sister M. Felicitas, Miss Nora Lowe, Loretto Woodlawn, as Sister M. St. Catharine, Miss Irene Hayes, Loretto Niagara, as Sister Mary Emmanuel, Miss Patricia O'Connor, Loretto Woodlawn, as Sister Anastasia, and Miss Margaret Lynch, Loretto Englewood, as Sister Marita.

- Sept. 1 After three days of leisure to help them become acclimated to their new surroundings, the postulants began three days of recollection and pray r, that they might learn at least a few of the secrets of close union with God in religious life.
- Sept. 4 The retreat over, the postulants were officially enducted into membership in the novitiate by an "oh, how exciting" initiation. The high spot of the evening was an air plane ride for each. The pilotowas Sister Edwardine and co-pilot, Sister Edwarda. Our "Chicaro Clipper" was a copywrited model of straw and wood more commonly known as a broom.) - Sept. 9 Loretto Woodlawn officially opened. Two from the Novitate are of the teaching staff. Sister M.Colette is teaching Latin. Undern History, American History and American problems. Sister M.Edwarda is teaching English, Religion and Ancient History.
- Vacation has departed on the wings of yesterday and the "Six" sally forth with Sister M. Edwardine and Sister M. Irene to meet new adventurs. This year the scene of educational endeavor has become dual. Sister M. Irene, Sister M. St. Catharine and Sister Marita are to pursue the arts at Saint Kaviers College, while Sister M. Edwardine will continue her course at DePaul University. Sister M. Xaveria, Sister M. Felicitas, Sister Mary Emmanuel, and Sister M. Anastasia are making thorough preparation for their life's work, by attending the Normal School of DePaul. At table tonight se had new and varied adventures to relate, concerning, for some of us at least, our first day at College.
- Sept. 12 In the experience of the postulants, today was their first big Feast, the most important in the Institute, the Feast of the Holy Name of Mary, and the feast day of our youngest, Sister Marita. The popular "rek-for-brek" was not among the least of the highlights of the day. Sister Marita was showered with holy pictures and best wishes to express our

appreciation of our little Sister.

- September 14

 We had a "Picnic" at the picnic! Mother M. Bernice and the St. Bride's Community were our gracious hostesses for an outing held at Pelcher Park, near Joliet. The Junior Professed of the three houses, whe novices and postulants, and the nuns from St. Bride's, forty-two strong depa ted in a Willett Bus shortly aftenine. The repast was served in typical picnic fashion and proved the most fun ever. We returned home, tritely "tired but happy". Thank you, Mother Bernice for such a lovely day.
- Visiting Sunday! What excitement throughout the house! The first official visiting Sunday for the "Crows!" The parlors were full to overflowing, and beaming smiles radiated happines. As the afte noon dr w to a close each postulant was seen leaving the parlor laden with numerous hmysterious, inviting packages of all shapes, sizes, and weights. The larder will be well stocked with dainties during the ensuing weeks.
- The De Paulites started to shhool in Parnest. There are eighteen in the whole class among whom are Sisters of the Holy Family, Felicians, Benedicties, and I.B.V.M.'s. The classes proved interesting and he professors entertaining as well as instructive. The urriculum covers Biology, Psychology, English, Social Etudies, and Religion. Among the instructors are Father Thomas Powers, Father William Powers, Father Glenn Toellaer, Father Merlin Feltz, and Mrs. Ruth Mikesell, the year should prove ever so profitable and oh, so enjoyable.
- September 18 The happy trio Ceparted for a day of hard work at St. Xavier's. Their programs include English, Biological Science, Social Science, History, French, and Mathematics.
- September 20 The first casualty thus far. Sister Mary Emmanuel returned home min's bicuspid. But she remains smiling despite her loss, and confidentially, I believe she approves of the whole affair.
- September 20 In honor of St. Michael, and in thandsgiving for his protection of the Institute, we carried his picture and sang Glorias throughout the house, on the vigil of his feast.
- September 28 There was great stir throughout the house this morning for Mother Gene al arrived from Toronto. Mother Virginia accompanied her. How thrilled is each membe of the noviceship to see their dear Mother General.
- October 2 Mother General was our honored guest in the "ship" at recreation

this evening. Even at recreation Reverend Mother's hands were not idle; rather, she busied herself with some beautiful needlepoint, while she told us, among other things, of the new postulants at the Abbey. Since tomorrow was to be the third anniversary of the founding of our convent at Port Colbourne, Mother General described their adventures during the first few days in their new home.

October 10

During lecture Mother General gave us an inspiring talk. How much more shall we appreciate the Little Office after her beautiful suggestions. An an outgrowth of her tald we shall esteem and reverence the customs of the Institues in a greater degree. And, what magic advice is contained in the "Apostolate off a smile". Then to bring the day beyond the pinnacle of joy, mothe Gene al has supper in our refectory.

October 15

Such good news has not been heard for many a day! How thankj ful we are to Our Lord for sending us a new postulant. Sister Sophie, our youngest, was Miss Evelyn Hinker, who has come all the way from South Dakota to enter Loretto. She received the cap before Mass on this, the feast of our dear Mother General. At breakfast Sister Sophie was confromted with a lovely vase of flowers at her place. Mother's "Laudetur Jesus Christus" was net with excited "Amen. "hankyou, Mother. OH--Sister Sophie!", followed by all kids of congratulations. "Rek for brek" on one's first day in religion! How fortunate!

October 16

The DePaulited have a holiday, but for a not so happy cause. Since it was today that the young men were to register for the draft...De Paul chised its doors for the day. We spent the on day vacation making "Lambie Pies". No, we were not flounting our ulinary achievements, we were sewing and stuffing toy lambs. How laughable it was, yet, how discouraging, is stuff until you could stuff no more, only to stand the poor little animal up, and have his legs immediately fold up under him. At the end of the afternoon, hower, the lambs were sewed, stuffed, dressed up, pack d, tied, posted, and on their way to the missionary for whom they were made as prizes for a bazaar.

October 20

Is it an asset or a liability to be tall? An incident occured today which opened today that highly debatable question. During the Children's Mass at St. Adrians, petite Sister M. Laura decided to send a message to our stately Sister M. St. Norbert to kneel down, and not to remain standing. Imaging her embarrassement if she had acted on her decision, for Sister St. Norbert had been kneeling all the time.

October 21

"There is something in the Autumn
That is native to my blood---"
The members of the noviceship answered the call to the great outdoors. We spent the afternoon at weiner roast at Jackson Park. How delightful and invigorating was the lovely breeze, our beautifullake with its whitecaps, and the big open fire. Thank you, Mother dear, for such a grand outing.

October 25 /

As a fitting conclusion to Liturgical Week the parochial schools and high schools of the archdiocese were closed. Magnificent ceremonies were conducted at Holy Name Cathedral this morning, a Pontifical Mass, and a sermon by our beloved Archbishop Stritch.

Sister M. St. David and Sister M. St. Norbert attended the Mass, and afterward came to De Paul, where a veritable class reunion was held by the 1940 graduates of the Normal School. The sisters were guests at the first meeting of the Edgar Allen Poe Club. Jack Russell was the guest speaker.

November 1

"All Saints Day." We tardily celebrated Mother Superior's feast. Visit prayers were said early, so that we might have ample time to present our program. That which started out as a group of serious tableaux was in reality a "howling" success. Our program was introduced by a feast day song to the tune of "Over the Rainbow." Then followed a series of tiny dramatizations of an outstanding event in the lives of St. Martin of Tours, St. Peter Claver, St. Jeanne d'Arc, St. Paul, Juan Diago, Mother Mary Ward, and finally Mother Mary Theresa. Mother Superior seemed to enjoy particularly watching herself perform. The tableau ended with a tableau of heaven with angels extending a golden crown, while a verse choir chanted.-----

"For I was hungry; and you gave me to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave me to drink; I was naked, and you clothed me; I was a stranger and you took me in.

Amen, I sav un o you, as long as you did it to one of wese, My least brethern, you did it to Me."

November 10

When Mother recurred later in the afternoon, who should be with her but 3. Laveria. The "Nov" met her at the front door and escorted her in regal style to her bouddir where Nurse "Pepeem u" was readywith basin towel and soap in hand waiting to take over her post. (Nurse consisted of a lamp. base, rops for hair, a nightgown, a sacristy apron. The De Paulit have resumed their interest in menageries. This time giranges are being made of brown and white checked girahum. There are to be four mother or daddy giraffes and four habits. Sr. Xaveria is spending her time sewing and stuffing all affes. Chesterton in verse choir, Sr, Mary Emmanuel read "Ex Ore Infantium" by Francis Thompson, and Sr. Anastasia spoke on "Christmas Peace". As a reward for our efforts, Father O'Cornell granted us an extra holiday. So. School resumes for 13 on January 7.

December 21 How lost we feel: We have been put out of house and home. Mother, the white veils, and the postularts gave over the noviceship to the professed at their request. The dermitory became general headquarters till Christmas. Mysterious doings went on behind the closed door of the "Nov", juta which our "babies" could not get even a peek. Our curiosity will burn us completely before the twenty-fifth dawns.

December 28

December 30

Sister Xaveria'; brother, Father William Rooney, said Mass for us today, at the delightful hour of eight o'clock. How we appreciated a sleep-in till seven-fifteen. After breakfast, all of us went to the parlor to meet Father Rooney.

Will Sister St. Catherine ever live down the ignominy of gaining seven pounds: We all teased her so much, she resolved never again to tell us a "personal" secret.

January 5

A scurry on the middle of thestairs!! Sister St.
Camillus deposited an overnight case outside the
noviceship door. What a clue! En masse we rushed to meet
our little Mother whose return was a grand surprise. We were
so happy to have you back with us, Mother.

Mother brought a little surprise package with her from the Abbey. The newest member of the Institute is Sister Colette's baby doll dressed in a Loretto habit.

January 6

February 18

Jokingly Father said that this talk was for Mother Bernardine, but each of us gained a beautiful lesson from his conference.

February 20

We returned from school today to be met with the news that Sister Irene had been taken to the hospital from St. Xavier's. The cause of the sudden departure was due to her knee, which has the happy faculty of slipping out of place. We started a novena to Mary Ward to cure Sister, who is a member of the Mary Ward Ceremony.

March 1

A quiet Saturday afternoon was considerably cheered by the return of our missing one. How glad we are to see Sister Irene, and how good it is to see her Cheery smile once more. Now we shall see two "white heads" in the chapel and about the halls.

March 17

Mother Bernice sent to each in the noviceship a St. Patrick button decorated with a Kelly green ribbon. Thank-you so much, Mother, for helping us to celebrate St. Patricks's Day.

March 23

Tis Laetare Sunday -- the Sunday of lenten joy, and everyone in the noviceship is in the best of spirits just to keep up with the spirit of the day. Monsignor Hillenbrand, Canonical visitor, officiated and also preached the sermon. He grove a three-fold message and note of congratulation in his duress. One to the parents of those who received the veil the members of the Institute and finally to the perly received themselves. - June 15 Five of our novices, Sisters M. St.Rose, Pierre, Michel, Jane Frances, and Mary Grace boarded the Canadian Pacific ton on speeding onwards to the Abbey and -- Profession.
- June 16 Father Grace S.J. opened the annual retreat at 7:30 P.M. The J.P.'s are not only making the retreat but also going into the Community refectory for the summer. Mother, Srs. M. S. bastian and St. Alfred are staying with Sr. M. Sophie in our refector; until their departure next week.

- July 6 We are praying for the speedy recovery of Sr.M. Sophie who underwent an appendectemy this morning at St. Bernard hospital.
- July 15 "The fields are white for the harvest" in the diocese of Trenton, New Jersey. Therefore the Bishop of Trenton has requested the I.B.V.M. to conduct catechetical schools in that vicinity and the I.B.V.M. has consented. Who will be the fortunate pioneers????..is now the burning question.
