

This new movel, though complete in itself, carries on the
story of the Starforths - - the
descendents of Hernsth, the 'blue
and allyer knight' whose love for
Fiorense was told in Mrs. Dorden's
previous story, "Thite Lawrourn".

The scene is law chiefly in England, shafting from the Etar-Torthal casale in Yourseins to London and Windsor . Maris, the chief character in the novel, is playmate and them ladv-in-waiting to the Frincess, Mary Tudor, and the action takes place partly in the reign of Henry VIII, then of Edward VI, of Mary Tudor, and the first of Queen Elizabeth. The pictures of life at court are of absorbing interest, heightened by the devotion of Maris to the unhappy Mary Tudor and her queenly mother, Catherine of Aragon, and her fearless defiance of King Henry's power.

Starforth is a tale full of color and dramatic incident;
Mrs. Borden shows ability to create characters who deeply a gage the reader's sympathy, and remance and idealism throughout the rovel.
