

My dear Doctor Dyrenforth:

In reply to your letter of April 1st, I am very pleased that you are interested in our test. Under separate cover I am sending you about 25 cc. of our antigen which you may wish to try out with one that you prepare yourself. The antigen for our test may regularly be obtained from the Difco Laboratories in Detroit, Michigan.

At this time, our supply of reprints on the technique of the test has, unfortunately, been completely exhausted. I am, therefore, obliged to give you the reference, as follows:
