FE: Closing out of Wassermen Laboratory in Building E-2.

In a review of the situation made by Drs. Hinton, Friend and Mr. Fowke, the following figures were agreed upon concerning repairs, permanently attached equipment and plumbing.

1. Permanently attached equipment such as tanks, lights and benches to be disconnected, and walls patched and painted by Harvard University maintenance men. Estimated cost of this work is \$300 which is to be paid for by the Wasserman Laboratory. These items in detail are as follows:

Dr. Hinton's Office: White sink to say, all other furniture to be moved.
Main Office: Counter and all furniture to be moved.

Large Laboratory: Wall benches, fluorescent lights, water baths, refrigerator and steel locker to be moved. This room to be repairted. All pipes and plumbing to be returned to former state.

Small Laboratory: In exchange for scapstone sink, Harvard University will give a similar sink from our stock thus permitting the one there to remain in position. All other equipment to be moved.

Small Laboratory #2: Sink and window bench to stay, all other equipment moved.

Small room with blackboard: Sink and blackboard to stay, all other equipment including batter of needle valves to be moved.

Animal room: Large monkey cages and sink to stay. All other equipment to be moved.

Basement storeroom: Steel shelving and stored equipment to be moved.
Window shades, light fixtures and items definitely known to belong
to the Harvard Medical School are to be left.
