My dear Dr. White:

I am enclosing budget sheets for the year 1928-29.

As you will note, the total of Budget Sheet I is the same as last year. Owing to the variation of the work, the distribution has been slightly altered. This is particularly true with regard to the items of Postage and Stationery. This increase over the amount asked for in these two items last year has been due to the fact that we have done more tests for the smaller institutions and for physicians. The postage in these two classes is usually one stamp for each test.

Budget Sheet II for personal services indicates proposed increases, which are in accordance with the Standardization Schedule and which are deserved on the basis of both an increase in the number of tests and the efficiency of the workers.
