It is as lively here at the Centre as ever this winter with now and then a marriage to break the monotony and Fannie has taken to her self a better half too, she is a dear good girl and I hope she will be happy. Ave is unsettled in his mind at present about the Cushion lot Oh dear it is an awful thing to be poor but there are a great many things worse than that if one has their health they ought not to complain had they. Nellie has got home from Belfast and business seems to be pretty lively for her at present she had a call to cut three or four dresses before she had been home a week. I have got my Organ sewing machine and knitting work all combined for some months to come in the form of another poor mortal but such is life and I must have my share of its cares I suppose. Joshie has written to you about his baby Brother I will send it to you as it will doubtless be very interesting Billies wife is bound to be a little ahead of me her youngest baby is five days older than mine but I cant say as I care much if she is I have been keeping house today a part of the day the rest have been to meeting Fred Wiley & wife have been here today
