Nellie declared her determination to live a noble pure and virtuous life for my sake – strong evidence of her love for me – But tis easy for a young girl to forget their allegiance to an absent lover

Easy to form new and tender ties with others who mingle in their society

The young impulsive heart may not know itself But why should I doubt her love when for more than a year she has said and done all a proud and spirited girl could to convince me of her sincerity

I have coldly acted indifferently and advised her to accept the love of others more worthy than myself In every case she has shown (so far as I know) a loftier spirit a deeper devotion a tenderer heart a purer nobler mind than perhaps even I gave her credit of possessing

But experience bitter experience has made a cynical skeptic of me I doubt even myself and the evidence of my own senses yet I would not be unjust

I strive to prove and test e'er I condemn and if I wrong by skepticism It is because experience ever points to betrayed innocence and simplicity in the past as <u>waiving</u> that I have been to credulous Perhaps now I am to much the reverse
