FORT ADAMS. - It has been supposed by many that the operations at this great work might possibly be continued the present season, (on account of the existing relations with France,) by means obtained on the responsibility of the President of the U. States, we state for the information of the public, that there is no possibility of any thing's being done on the works this season. The rumor that such orders have been received from the War Department in Washington, as forbid all hope of further operations, we think it fully confirmed by the fact which has just been communicated to us, - the Col. Totten has been obliged to dispense even the services of his Secretary, Mr. Wm. E. Almy, until The trying domestic appropriation for the work is made. disappointments which the suspension of the Fortifications will ocion in various parts of the country must be very numerous, to say nothing of the loss which must necessarily accrue to the Government by the works lying in an unfinished state.

One or two of noisy and enlightened leaders of the Jackson party in this town, having been going about the streets, we understand, bestowing their curses on our Senator, Mr. Robbins, for having voted, as they say, against the bill appropriating money for continuing the Fortifications, and particularly the works at Fort Adams. These learned Thebans are not supposed to know much about politics; but if they have sense enough to spell out their newspaper, they ought to know, that Mr. R. Voted in favor of the bill, in every stage of it, and for every amendment that went to establish either new works, or to arm those already erected. Mr. Robbins' great offence is, that he voted in company with every Whig of the Senate, and with JUDGE WHITE, of Tennessee, against placing in Gen. Jackson's hands, THREE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS, with unlimited power to dispose of it, as HE thought proper, either for the Army, Navy, Fortifications, or any thing else, that might come into the head of our discreet Executive. In this, we think, he acted as an intelligent legislator and an upright man.
