The Connecticut School fund, on the 1st of April amounted to \$1,882,261, in mortgages, stocks, lands &c. The revenue from the fund last year, was \$20,243. There are 208 school societies in the state containing, 84,896 children between 4 and 16. \$72,164 have been paid the past year, for the support of common schools.—Connecticut is indeed the Athens of America, so far as the means of education are concerned.
