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Report Shows Havoc Is Fastest U. S. Bomber

The Douglas A-20 Havoc is the fastest American bomber in the war today! That fact was established by the War Department last week in its new listing of American aircraft, released by United Press originating in Washington.

In acclaiming the Havoc as the "fastest bomber . . . with a speed of over 320 miles an hour, radius of 300 miles, bombing load of 2000 pounds and armament of nine .50 calibre machine guns," the War Department revealed that the Douglas P-70 Havoc night fighter is one of the heaviest armed planes, carrying four 20 mm. cannons.

In a previous OWI report on American aircraft performance, the A-20 was declared "in a class by itself." This latest War Department release establishes this fact beyond any doubt.

Other Performances Cited

Included in the War Department's release is a performance comparison among principal American fighter planes, based on speed, ceiling and tactical radius. Some of these are as follows:

P-38 Lightning—400 mph., over 40,000 feet, over 400 miles.

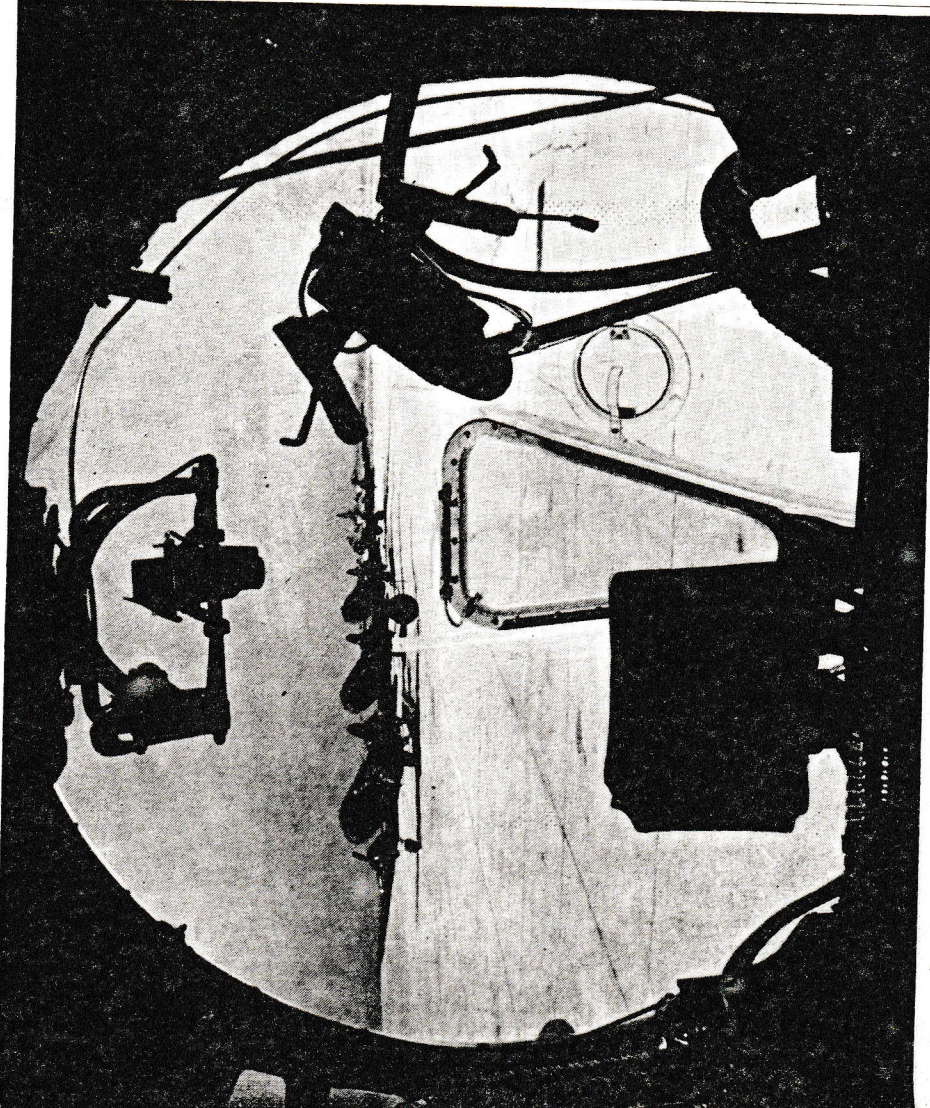
Red Cross Asks Only That You Think A Bit
