Appearing on Tuesday will be Arnold Petterson, singer, and Bill Towry, guitarist.

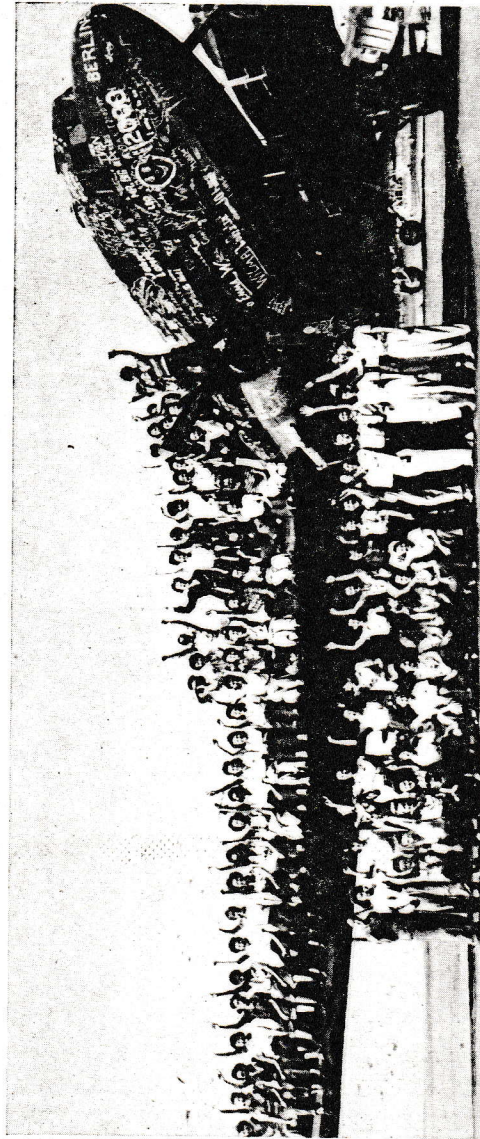
Theresa Fro Grimes, soloist, accompanied by Gladys Dunlap, will present the program on Thursday.

Deadline Drawing Closer For Photo Contest Entries

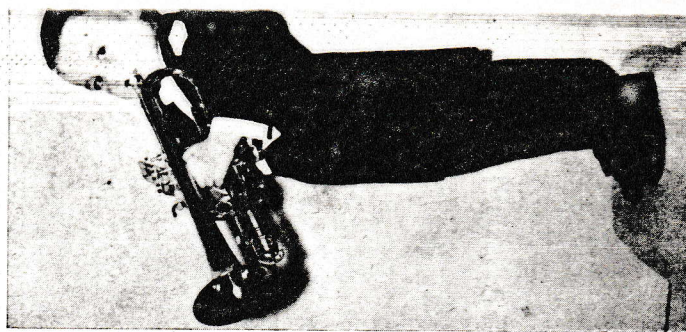
