Worst accident here since 1946 —

Nine die in Whidbey plane crash, one lives

In one of the worst air tragedies in the history of Whidbey Naval Air Station, a two-engine P2V Neptune patrol bomber caught fire and crashed in a wooded area less than a quarter-mile south of Ault Field Monday morning, carrying nine men to death.

The one lone survivor of the crash, Radioman Gerlando P. Iardi, was dragged from the burning wreckage by crash crew members who arrived on the scene within seconds after the plane plunged to earth, to hear him cry "My God! Get me out of here!"

Iardi was rushed by ambulance to Whidbey Naval hospital and then by plane to Bremerton where Tuesday he was reported resting easily despite five broken ribs, a broken leg, possible internal injuries and 35 per cent burns over his body. His wife, Rose Marie, was flown to his side. The Iardis have four children.

THE BIG PLANE, on early morning flight, caught fire in the number two engine as it left the runway. The tower radioed the information to the pilot who acknowledged it, but loss of power caused the plane to go out of control, and it veered sharply to the right, hovered for a moment in the air and then plunged with a terrifying crash into a wooded area between Goldie Road and old highway I-D just outside the limits of Ault Field.

Flames shot skyward and black smoke rolled from the tangled wreckage.

The crash truck and crew which had followed the stricken plane down the runway arrived at the scene to smother the fire with foam and rescue Iardi. Navy officials credit-

ed the efficient performance of the crash crew with saving the life of the one survivor.

Oak Harbor Volunteer Fire Chief Charles Bos, one of the first persons at the scene, who was working at Ault Field on construction work, gave this eye witness account of the wreck:

"I was working near one of the hangars, looked up to see this plane taking off down the runway with one engine smoking. It passed behind the hangar and when it came out from behind the hangar it was afire, with the crash truck trailing it.

"IT ROSE INTO the air, veered off sharply to the right, and fell, right about where I thought the Triangle Apartments were located. I jumped into my jeep, set the siren going and tore out the gate, because I was sure there was big trouble.

"AS I turned into the road by the Triangle Apartments, I pulled off to the side so as not to hamper the crash truck which was coming behind me. I started running up the road into where the smoke and flames were rolling out and the crash truck passed me.

"By the time I got to the wreck, the crash crew had smothered the fire and pulled Iardi out. I have never seen such efficiency in fire fighting as was displayed by that Navy crew."

Navy ambulances, rushed to the scene, removed the bodies as crash crew members probed the smoldering remains for other possible victims.

Officers and men stood by silently and disbelievingly as the wreckage was sifted.

All but two of the men lost were married, and with the exception of one, the families lived in the Oak Harbor area.

18 drivers in court for violations

Errant drivers apprehended by the State Patrol have beat a steady path to the court of Justice of the Peace J. E. Kramer this week.

GEORGE D. MALPASS, USN, was fined \$57.50 for speeding having no valid operator's license and illegal possession and consumption of liquor.

Speeding brought Shelton H. Dawson, USN, a \$10 fine.

ORVILLE P. BROWN, NAS, convicted of negligent driving, was fined \$50, \$25 of which was suspended. A similar charge against Thomas L. Bastien, USN, brought him a \$20 fine.

Failure to yield the right of way cost George J. Pehling, of Pine Village Apartments, Oak Harbor, a \$15 fine.

An accident at Crescent Harbor netted Grace Whitehead of Oak Harbor a \$25 fine for negligent driving. Dorothy Bayer, of Oak Harbor, forfeited \$10 bail for speeding, and Rita Harrington forfeited \$20 bail for driving with and having no valid operator's license.

LEONARD CAUSLEY, Kent, forfeited \$10 bail for permitting an unlicensed person to operate an automobile.

William C. Jackson, NAS, forfeited \$20 bail for driving with an expired vehicle license and failing to have his operator's license on his person.

Sentence of 5 days in county jail for Daniel A. Bartek, NAS, was suspended because of his good service record. He was found guilty of driving while under the influence of liquor, and the mandatory 30-day suspension of driver's license was imposed by Justice Kramer, along with a fine of \$52.50. His companions, Monte Pearson, Russell E. O. man and Richard L. Most, paid \$15 fines for illegal consumption of liquor.

A charge of negligent driving brought a \$30 fine for William F. Sheats, who ran his car into the ditch. Investigating officers found Sheats unconscious, called an ambulance to take him to the hospital.

20-ton theatre screen hoisted into position for Whidbey's first drive-in

The 20-ton screen for Whidbey Island's first outdoor drive-in theater, located on the highway near Hastie Lake, was hoisted into place Friday of last week. Constructed by the Texmo Pole Co. of Bellingham, the 58 foot by 84-foot wooden screen was lifted erect by the Sickle steel construction Co. of Mount Vernon and fastened firmly into a steel and concrete foundation.

The ticklish job began about noon, when the first lift revealed structural weaknesses in the uprights which had to be strengthened. By midafternoon the giant screen was again hoisted by two derricks, but operations came to a halt when the great

weight of the screen tipped the vehicle supporting one of the derricks so that the front wheels were off the ground. Workmen hurriedly chained the vehicle to another truck to secure it and went for heavier equipment.

Meanwhile, the heavy panel, supported by cables attached to the derricks, swung in every gust of wind, and spectators drawn to the operations predicted calamitous results should the wind become stronger.

George Dickson, local Bakery owner and co-owner of the new theater, along with two partners, W. W. Cecil and R. Gardner, said the enterprise is scheduled to open about June 1.

Islands agriculture

In modern agriculture Weed Control is imperative. In fact every angle in production and marketing is important if adequate net income is to be realized.

Chemical weed control is thoroughly accepted as a regular farm practice these days. However, let me say that proper tillage and even the hoe are still required at times. In stating it another way, good tillage, chemicals, and even hand methods might be necessary to control certain weeds.

In young pastures and recently planted hay seedings, weeds can be controlled by using Di-

nitro amine which is sold under such trade names as Pre-merge and Sinox PE. Timing is most important. Spray when legumes have developed at least one true leaf. Rate of application is two quarts of Diniro amine in fifty gallons of water per acre at low pressures.

In pure grass or grain plantings one can use 2-4-D against such weeds as mustard. How do we control the perennial morning glory or bindweed and Canadian thistle? These are perennials and in small areas an effective job is done with a hoe or duck-foot cultivator by going over the area every ten to fourteen days. This course must be followed all season.

The chemical most used is 2-4-D and near orchards, gardens, or other plants be sure to guard against wind drift and use amine form of 2-4-D. Use two quarts of the formulation in enough water to cover an acre. Hand sprayers use one to two tablespoons of 2-4-D per gallon of water. Just wet the foliage. Spray twice a year, once in spring and again in the summer but not when plants are in flower. Keep in mind 2-4-D will also kill clover and most legumes.

Hints for using non-fat milk

Baked Custards Baked custards made with milk that is not homogenized will take only a little more than half as long to bake. The custard will brown more rapidly and will be softer. Using homogenized milk may result in a custard with a tough thick skin.

Mashed Potatoes Mashed potatoes that are mashed with the water in which they are cooked plus dried skim milk will hold up well when kept hot over a period of time. Use a little bit of water when you cook the potatoes. By using dried skim milk you will have a low-fat food, if you do not add an excess of butter. Butter will add flavor.

Triangle Cove may be fish hatchery

Development of Triangle Cove on the east side of Camano Island as a fish rearing station is being considered by Washington State Fisheries.

In answer to an inquiry from Island County's engineer, George Norris, the state department said a feasibility report is now being prepared.

Should the project reach the development stage, providing funds are available, an earth and rock dike will be built across the opening of the cove. The proposed dike would allow a good volume of tide water interchange and would keep water at a level of five or six feet, the letter said.

There would be no restriction against boating or swimming in the cove, and a powered mechanical boat lift would be maintained to allow boats to go in or out.

Camano Commissioner Frank Guest told his fellow commissioners Monday that he is not convinced this is a good project for Camano, and he felt Camano Island Sportsmen's group would not approve.

Commissioners Meeter and Andrews withheld their opinion for investigation. County commissioners were assured by the state fisheries department that property owners around the cove would be contacted individually, the project explained and permits obtained
