Horses were her life

Karen Parrish, holding a photograph of herself on a horse, remembers her days as a champion horse rider. While she has taken a break from her horses, she hopes some day to return to her native land and her first love.

Australian native's hiatus from horses temporary

"There wasn't a single man who could come between me and my horses, until I met my husband," declared Karen Parrish, her eyes sparkling. "Horses were my life."

This vibrant, soft spoken Australian lady's romance with horses started when she was only 4 years old, in Southern Australia, where she was born. It was a romance that led her to become a champion horse woman. Sitting in her living room, in Navy housing near the Seaplane Base, she told of how it all began.

"We lived across the street from racing stables. The trainers would allow me to sit on the horses and lead me around. Then, when I was around 7, we moved to the Outback where I had a Shetland pony to ride," she recalled.

Her description of life in the Outback immediately brings to life the vivid description in Colleen McCullough's book *The Thorn Birds*. There was a one-room school where grades one through seven were taught, a police station and a hotel that her parents owned.

"We spent a year and a half in this incredible place, a barren desert. There was no TV, very little contact with the outside world. People lived on cattle stations whose boundaries were 100-200 miles from each other. The stations are large because of the lack of pasture," she explained.

Her family's next move was to Mel-

bourne where she lived until she married. Within two weeks of the family move, Parrish had talked her parents into buying her a horse. She had been bitten by the horse bug.

"Cracker was just an ordinary, run-of-the-mill horse, but he was mine. I was the only one he liked — he was pretty crafty and he could be mean," she said. "I joined the local Pony Club and spent every weekend at the club taking care of my horse, who was stabled there. Once a month we would have a rally day, with special instruction on riding and horse care. I loved the social aspects of the group and stayed with it until I was 13."

Here she got her basic education in the care and training of horses — learning how to groom and muck out the stalls. During this time she bought and sold four or five horses.

"When I was 13 I bought my first Thoroughbred race horse. She was only 6 months old and I named her Emma. I did all the training and handling. Eventually I began to show and breed her. We were friends," she explained. "If I was upset, I would talk to Emma for comfort."

With eyes puddling up, she described a night when Emma's second foal was born. "I couldn't sleep. I tossed and turned. Finally I decided I had to go to the stable. As I was leaving the house, the phone rang to tell me she was in labor. When I reached the stable, her foal was just starting to stand on its wobbly legs," she explained. "What a thrill."

As a young woman in her 20s she discovered the Australian Pony, bred from a

Welsh Pony. She bought a stallion, "Yar-rayong Posh," who became a champion at local shows and was first-place winner in the Royal Show. "Posh" was a three-time winner. His banners are all around the living room of her home.

"When I first got him, he wasn't even hip high. When he was an adult, he was 48 inches high. Only children can ride them. The maximum height of these horses is 14 hands, or 56 inches."

She put her heart and soul into horses. She once rode the Australian horse of the year in competition. There is a picture of her riding a horse on the coffee table. "This is the first Thoroughbred I ever saw race that I wanted to lose. I was praying that he would lose. I was overjoyed when he came in second from the last. I wanted Placido for show," she explained.

After the race she sought out the trainer and learned the name of the owners. It took her six months of talking to get them to sell. He did much better as a show horse.

"Each time I acquired a horse, I did better and better as I learned how to choose. You know the bottom line is that it costs as much to work with a bad horse as a good one."

Parrish became a beautician and opened her own salon in Melbourne. "I was frightfully busy, juggling my business and my horses. I had four horses in training and was up early to care for the horses, then put in a full day at the salon and then back with the horses. I had no time for a social life."

And then one day some friends intro-

duced her to the man she was to marry. It was love at first sight. He was in the U.S. Navy, in Australia on leave.

"We met in November and were married in Honolulu in March of 1987. I always knew I would marry an American," she said, smiling. "I sold all the horses but one, which is leased to friends for breeding, and came to America."

Although she enjoys Whidbey Island, because it is so similar to Melbourne, she is looking forward to her husband's retirement in 1992 and the family's return to Australia to live, she said. Parrish is the mother of a 20-month-old daughter and a 12-year-old stepson.

She has resisted acquiring any animals while here, because of the expense of transporting them back to Australia, but more important because of the long quarantine imposed by the Australian government.

"I was completely out of horses until I met Amoy and George Morse, who have a Pony Club nearby. They gave me the opportunity to instruct again, and I love it."

Parrish doesn't know how the horse bug bit her because there is no one in the family who has the virus, but she is glad it did. To parents of young girls who are begging for a horse, she suggests they lease a horse before buying to see if the young one is ready for the commitment.

Our recent appeal to readers for favorite recipes brought two family specialties from Katharine J. Tapp of Coupeville, who sent in what the family of four growing children called "Meat and Potatoes" plus her mother's prize-winning recipe for spring Rhubarb Roly Poly.

In the Meat and Potatoes recipe, the suet is beef fat that can be supplied by your butcher. Only 1/4 cup is required. Tapp says the suet is what gives the dish its flavor.

We are reminded of a dear friend who raised her four children (and her husband) on a family recipe she called "Meat and Beans." They all seemed to like it, and it supplied all the protein they needed. Meat and Beans became the staple for the family over a 20-year period. One day my friend realized she hadn't made the family's special dish for some time, so she served it that night. Her husband looked at the bubbling concoction for a minute then said, with a sigh, "You know, I never did care much for Meat and Beans!"

MEAT AND POTATOES

1 lb. hamburger
1/4 cup diced suet (ask a butcher for this)
4 large potatoes
salt and pepper
Fry suet until melted, then add 1/2 of hamburger and brown. Remove and set aside. Peel potatoes and cut in 3-inch chunks. Wash and put in pot and cover

OVER THE BACK FENCE

Joyce Kieviet of Oak Harbor sent in a recipe from Aunt Reka Haga's favorite collection. She says it may appear more complicated and time consuming than it is, but you sure get a lot of rolls from one package of yeast. Your early morning guests will be impressed with these rolls hot out of the oven.

OVERNIGHT CINNAMON ROLLS

4 cups water
2/3 cup sugar
1 Tbs. salt
Boil five minutes then add 1 cup shortening. Cool to lukewarm.

Dissolve 1 pkg. yeast in 1/2 cup warm water. Beat 4 eggs and add to liquid, then add yeast. Add 12-16 cups flour and knead down. Let it rise in a greased bowl for two hours, then punch dough down and let rise again for 2 hours. Punch down and let rise again.

Roll out on floured board, spread with melted butter, cinnamon and sugar and raisins. Roll up and cut into slices. Place on cookie sheet or in pan and let set in a cool place overnight. In the morning bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. When slightly cool, you may give them a powdered sugar glaze.

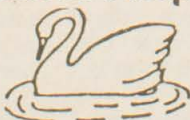

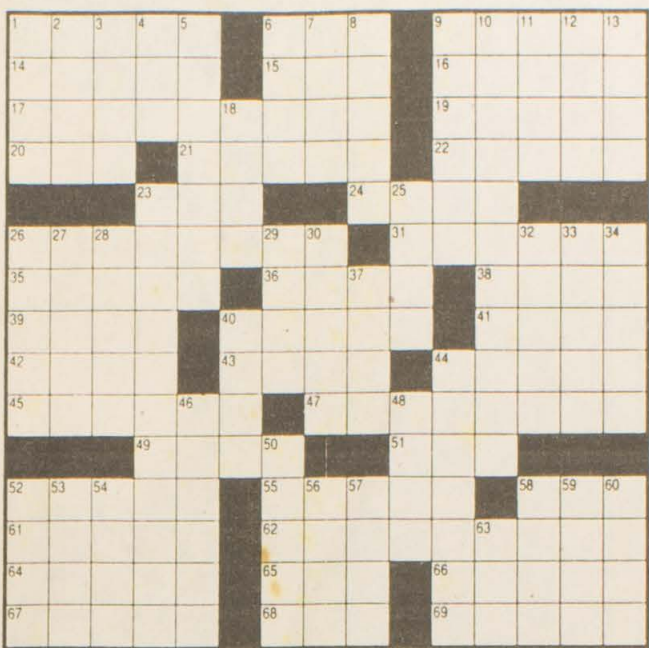

Jockey Olguin looks to light up track

Everybody loves a winner, especially at a racetrack.

So if 1989 is any clue, look for 18-year-old Gerry Olguin to be a popular figure this season at Longacres. In other words, look for the San Diego native to be posing for pictures on a regular basis in the winner's circle.

Olguin (pronounced Ohl-gween) rode 128 winners last season at Exhibition Park in Vancouver, B.C. He finished in a tie for second place in the jockey standings and becomes the first rider in the track's history to have his mounts earn over \$1 million. Not bad considering Olguin arrived a week late and lost his apprentice weight allowance early in the meeting.

It didn't take Vancouver trainers long to discover that Olguin was blessed with talent. The 5-foot-6, 114-pound jockey was adept at hustling his mounts out of the starting gate and securing position into the first turn, a must on Exhibition Park's smaller five-eighths oval. Others may have remembered Olguin's father, Rogelio, who enjoyed success in Vancouver from 1970 to

1972, and might have figured Gerry was blessed with good bloodlines.

Now, however, after some prodding from veteran jockey agent Pat McDowell, Olguin is ready to try his luck at Longacres.

"My goal eventually is to ride in California, and I think people notice riders from Longacres more than ones from Canada," Olguin said.

Olguin broke his maiden in January 1988 at Agua Caliente in Tijuana, Mexico. The filly was named, appropriately enough, Light the Tote, which is something Olguin hopes to do often this season at Longacres.

Olguin realizes a fast start will be important at Longacres. Trainers and owners will line up to employ a talented rider, but they usually wait for the rider to prove himself first. Olguin has been galloping horses for trainer Bud Klokstad, perennially among the leaders here, and has

been aboard last season's Champion Two-Year-Old, T.D. Passer, twice in morning workouts.

Olguin, who won two \$125,000 stakes races last year at Exhibition Park — the Jack Diamond Futurity on Golden Pursuit and the British Columbia Derby aboard Fleet Reserve — said T.D. Passer is the best horse he's ever been on and hopes to secure the mount for coming races.

"Hopefully, I'll get to ride (T.D. Passer) in a race," Olguin said. "So far I'm happy here. I like Longacres. I think it's a good track and I think I'll do good here."

The Saturday Horses In Training exhibition will be from 8 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. April 14 in the north grandstand.

Opening day comes to Longacres track

Gary Stevens will display his skills — in race silks as well as with fountain pen — as Longacres presents the first of 125 days of racing Wednesday.

Currently the nation's leading rider and twice a Longacres champion, Stevens will accept several mounts on the card including Hilco Scamper in the featured Doo Dah Express. Stevens will also sign autographs beginning at 1:15 p.m. under the main line grandstand prior

to the first race. The 27-year-old native of Caldwell, Idaho, currently tops the standings at Santa Anita and has the mount on leading Kentucky Derby prospect Mister Frisky.

Opening Day Schedule — Post time 3 p.m. Gates open 1 p.m. Fans will receive 1990 Longacres pocket calendars upon entrance, and the Navy Band will perform near the winner's circle prior to the first race.

Doo Dah Express tops 11-race opening card — Hilco Scamper, No. 10 on the all-time Washington-bred earnings list with \$353,505, makes his first Longacres appearance since 1987 and will be a strong contender in the \$30,000-added Doo Dah Express, a 5-1/2 furlong

race restricted to state-breds. The 10th of 11 races on the opening day card, the Doo Dah is also expected to attract the venerable Kent Green who, if he starts, will be competing in his record 58th straight stakes race at Longacres. Others who may go postward include Super Seven, Honest John and Justa City Boy.

Santa Anita Derby simulcast on Saturday — The first simulcast of the season, the \$500,000 Grade I Santa Anita Derby from Arcadia, Calif., is set for Saturday, April 7. In addition to win-place-show betting, Longacres fans will be able to place \$2 exacta wagers on this traditional stepping stone to the Kentucky Derby. Stevens will ride the undefeated Mister Frisky, who will attempt to stretch his winning streak to 16 in the 1 and 1/8 mile test.

Seniors Day, backstretch tour, H.I.T. show on agenda — Two popular events and a new feature are on tap for the first weekend of action. The first Seniors Day of the season is set for Saturday, April 7. Seniors age 60 and over can receive coupons for free admission through the Seattle Mayor's Office. For information contact 684-0500. For fans who want to see Thoroughbreds in a different light, a Radio KRPM Longacres Backstretch Tour is the answer. Tours are available most Saturdays and Sundays throughout the season. Reservations are available by calling 1-800-7-DOO-DAH.

Get the dirt on potting soil

My coworker, George Pinyuh from King County, wrote an interesting piece on bagged potting soils. Since many enjoy growing plants inside and outside the home I felt this might be a good one to share. Here is what George had to say.

Some weeks ago an article appeared in a locally available national newspaper dealing with the topic of bagged potting soils. Based on a great deal of the research and experience of Dr. Frank Gouin, a horticulturalist at the University of Maryland it warned purchasers about the lack of information on the label of the various potting media available and the too frequent lack of quality of the stuff inside.

Because there are no standards, regulated either by the industry or government agencies for potting soils, manufacturers can say just about anything they want to on the outside of the bags. Most often they don't say much so it's absolutely impossible to tell anything about the physical or chemical makeup of the mixes.

According to Dr. Gouin, many of the packaged potting media he analyzed were not appropriate to grow plants in. Many had no fertilizer in them at all, so unless one started fertilizing right away, the plants would begin to starve immediately.

On the other side of the coin, Dr. Gouin found that one brand of mix had too many soluble salts (fertilizer) in it and it would likely burn up any plant or seeds put in it. Another's pH was so low, nothing much would be able to survive in it either.

In 1986 a researcher at the University of California, Riverside, carried out a similar analytical project on 15 different potting soils available in our region, and his results turned out to be pretty much the same as the information recently reported from Maryland.

Besides finding many of them chemically inadequate, the California research found quite a few deficient in their ability to provide air to the roots of plants in them. In other words, they would drain poorly and retain too much water in the pore spaces. After a pot is watered and drains away excess water, a considerable number of a soil's pore spaces should be filled with air, not water. Most plants tend to rot at the roots and die when kept in water logged potting soil.

A potting soil must contain a high proportion of bulky organic materials like bark, wood chips or peat moss as well as nonorganic things like sand, perlite, vermiculite, pumice or calcine clay (cat box litter). These materials

will assure that the mix contains plenty of pockets or pores that can fill with air once gravity has pulled the excess water from the pot. Many of them also hold enough moisture for good plant growth.

There was a wide range in chemical properties for the potting mixes analyzed in California. A number of them had pH's quite a bit below the accepted range for a container soil of 5.0 to 6.5. A couple had pH readings of above 7.0. Salt levels were much too high in some of the mixes, high enough that plants put into them would suffer serious injury, if the levels remained high.

The upshot of all this is that you've got to be careful when you buy a prepackaged potting soil. Information on the label is often lacking or does not accurately state the quality of the contents inside. Dennis Pittenger, the California researcher, suggests that when buying bagged potting soil, choose a mix that is high in bark or other wood products, sphagnum peat and inorganic materials like perlite or vermiculite. If you can't see into the bag, squeeze some of the stuff at one of the corners. Knead it a bit with your fingers; if it feels too light, or soft, look for another brand.

He also suggests that any packaged soil be thoroughly leached three or four times before putting any seeds or plants in it. This will get rid of excess soluble salts which may be in it.

Finally, it's necessary to begin to fertilize very soon after the plants are growing in the mix, say within about two weeks. This fertilizing will replace the leached minerals as well as what has been taken up by the plants.

Of course you can avoid any of the possible problems associated with packaged potting mixes by preparing your own. An easy one to put together consists of equal parts of sandy loam garden soil, clean builders sand and horticultural or sphagnum peat moss. To each bushel (8 gallons) of this mixture, add one quart of steamed bone meal and one pint of dolomite lime. You could substitute for the bone meal one cup of 5-10-10 fertilizer and half cup of 0-20-2 single superphosphate.
