

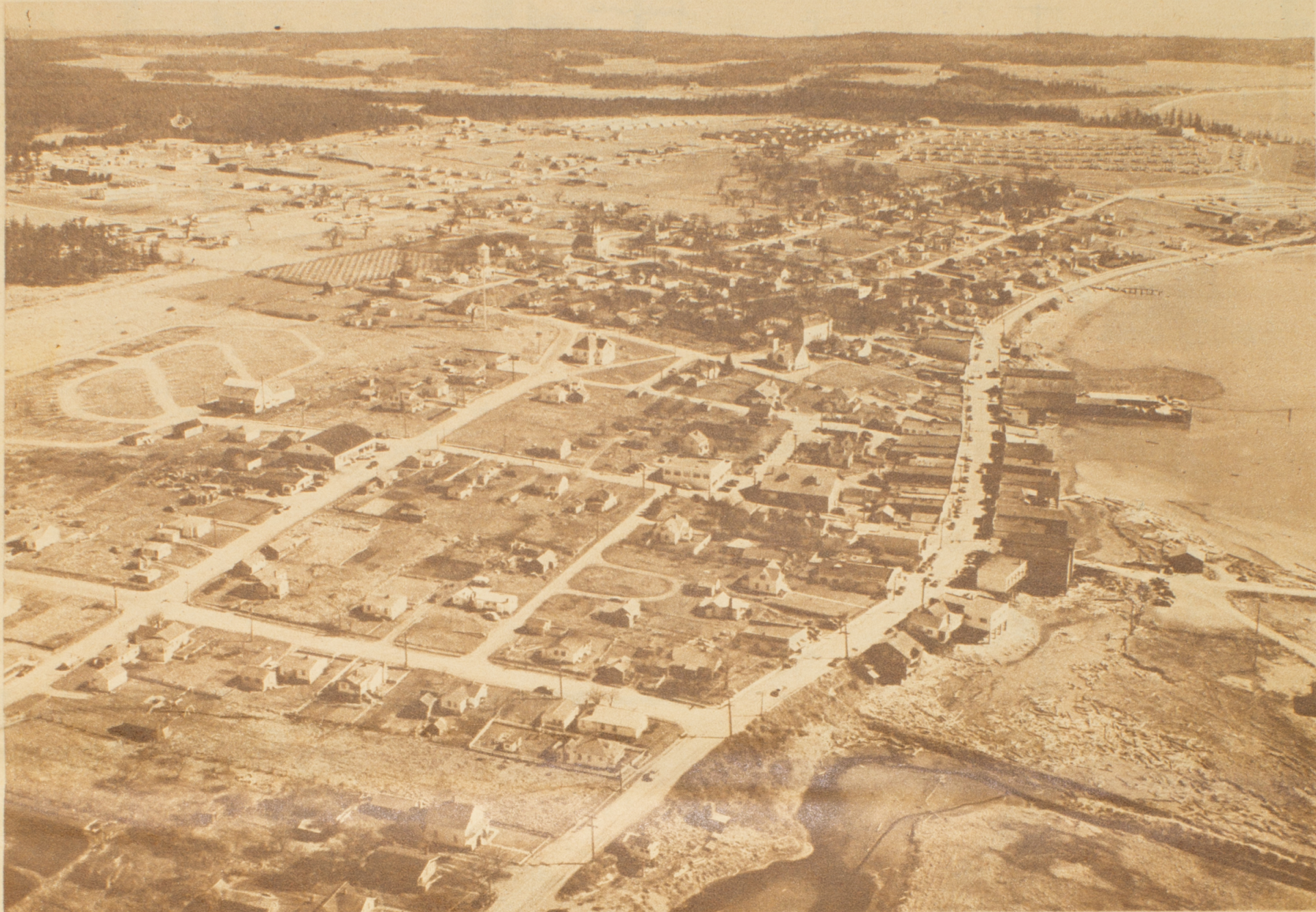

# OAK HARBOR: AIR-BASE LOCATION



OAK HARBOR, largest population center on Whidby Island, grew from a village of 300 in 1940 to its present 1,200 residents. The presence of the naval air station, with both enlisted and civilian personnel and their dependents, brought 5,000 new inhabitants to the surrounding district. This spring the town celebrates the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the first white settler.



NO ONE denies that a Dutch carpenter may have influenced the shape of the water tower on the former farm of James Neil, early logger. In Neil's lifetime most of the neighbors were from Holland, and Dutch was spoken by the elder citizens. Neil himself was Scottish. His sightly barn alongside the tower last year was converted into a roller-skating rink.



OAK TREES gave the town its name and still are growing in their natural state in Oak Park, hiding their roots beneath a carpet of wild buttercups and dogtooth violets. # POPULATION DOUBLES TWICE IN 10 YEARS



WHIDBY ISLAND'S population is 80 per cent rural and the Washington Co-operative Farmers Association is an important economic factor in Oak Harbor, last year handling \$1,024,000 worth of feed, seed, fertilizers, farm supplies, eggs and turkeys. William Van Dyk is loading feed.

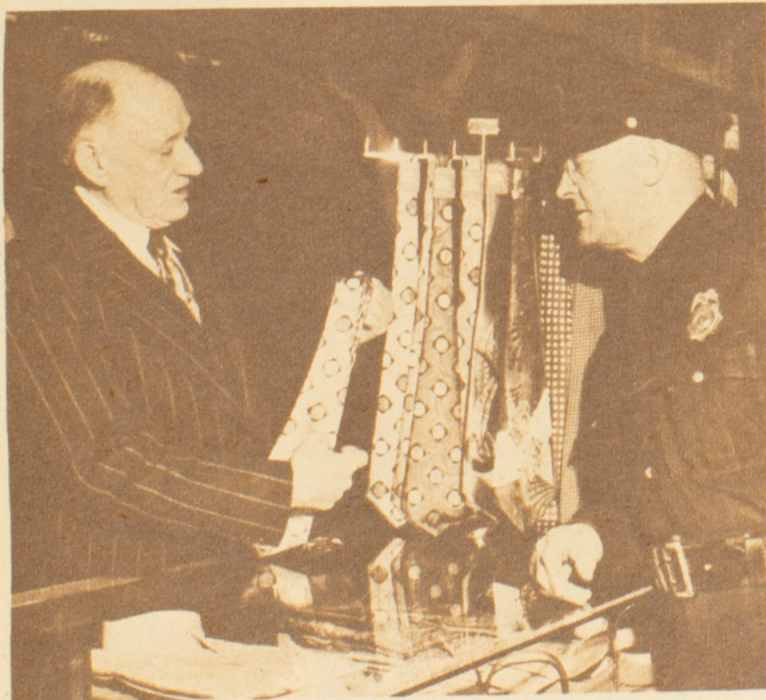
NEW BUILDINGS like that of the Everett Trust and Savings Bank (left) are rising along Barrington Avenue, which the Navy rechristened Midway after the South Pacific battle. Old residents prefer the former designation, though the Navy named another street Barrington. An improvement district has been formed to attempt to have the pavement widened and utility poles better placed. Service clubs have a project for posting street names to avoid further confusion and numbering houses in order to keep pace with rapid growth. This view looks east from in front of the newly completed postoffice.



MAYOR GEORGE R. HEAP divides his time between a dental practice and helping solve civic problems in the overgrown village that has doubled population twice in the past decade.

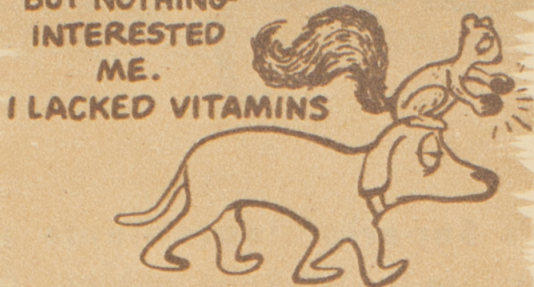

# LIFE LESS STRENUOUS ON STATE'S LARGEST ISLAND



THE MAJOR scenic attraction on the north end of Whidby Island is Deception Pass with its state park and spectacular bridge over which the highway crosses to the mainland. Fishing enthusiasts in Oak Harbor moor their boats at sheltered Cornet Bay, a short distance southeast of the pass.



PATTON'S PASTURES, a new residential development, was sponsored by Lloyd Patton, a former Navy man who stayed on after the Second World War. He plans to erect 50 more homes within the next few months. With the influx of young children to the island, the school district is asking for ten more rooms, to be added to elementary building.

OAK HARBOR CHRISTIAN SCHOOL is supported by the First Reformed and the Christian Reformed Churches. As one resident explains, the Dutch families wanted a little religion mingled with teaching. Excellent attendance at Oak Harbor's five churches reflects this spirit of religious interest.

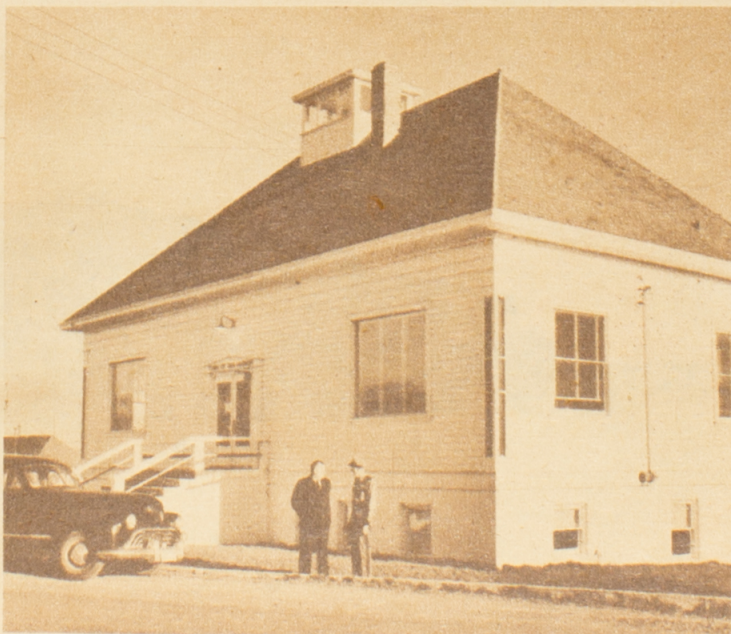
AT ALL DRUGGISTS

Bill Eastbury is delivering to him 8,500 chicks from the Washington Co-op Chick Association in Mount Vernon. Wardenaar is raising 50,000 fryers this season on three floors of a huge barn. He is chairman of the Oak Harbor school board.



(Left) — **TURKEYS** have been the district's most important farm product. Little Nordis Wardenaar pets a week-old turkey poult in Jake Wardenaar's brooder. He and his wife are raising 2,600 birds for next Thanksgiving. Each brooder houses 300 poults. "I don't know of anything that grows faster," says Mrs. Wardenaar, who tends the babies.

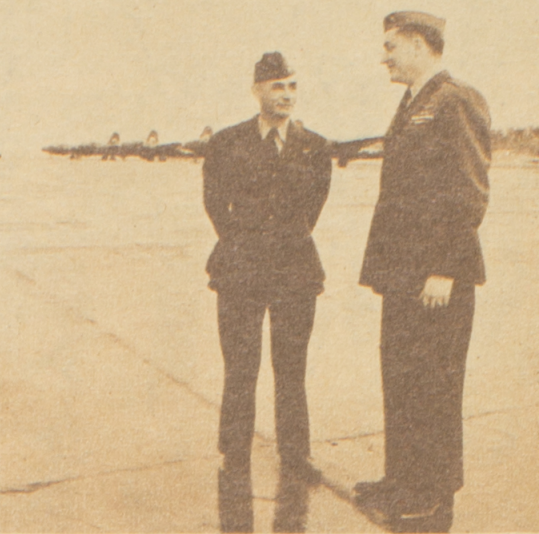
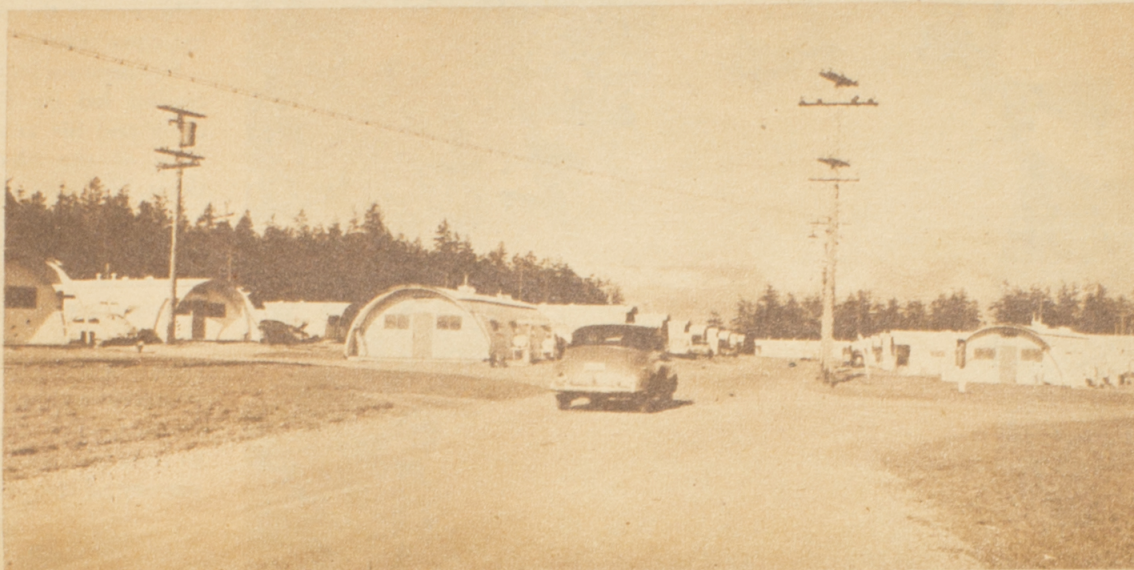


# ISLAND BECOMES 'UNSINKABLE FLATTOP'

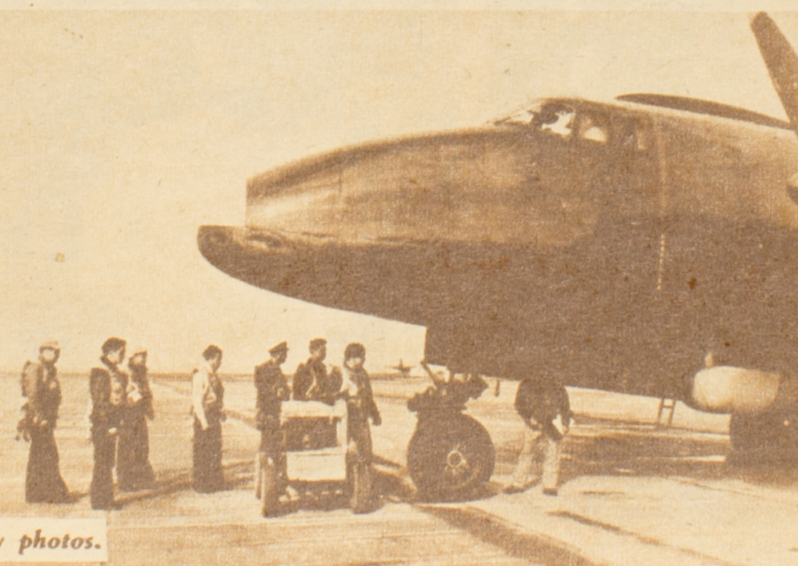

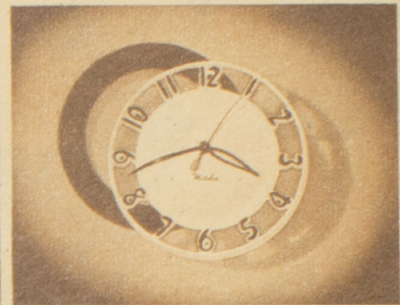

# SEATTLE CHURCH DEDICATED FOR ETERNITY



TREADING WITH SOLEMN, measured step, Bishop Connolly led the procession, attended by priests and preceded by white-surpliced altar boys carrying cross and candles. A tall miter on his head, His Excellency wore red-embroidered, rich vestments and carried a curved golden crozier in his hand. Jubilant parishioners lined the procession route; girls of the Holy Rosary School stood in a straight line, and men of the Holy Name Society formed a guard of honor marking the way for the celebrants.



CEREMONIAL WATER to be used in the consecration was blessed by Bishop Connolly outside the church door. At the left is the Rev. William Gallagher, master of ceremonies for the centuries-old, impressive ritual. The anointment being concluded, His Excellency prayed: "Let this temple be sanctified and consecrated."



HEART FILLED WITH GRATITUDE, Father Lanigan (right) swung a censer of fragrant incense as he celebrated Solemn High Mass at the main altar, banked with flowers and glowing candles. The pastor, a native of Templeuohy, County Tipperary, spearheaded the work of self-sacrifice which made it possible for Holy Rosary to have a modern school, convent, rectory and church costing \$441,000 for the West Seattle congregation.

NEW spiritual dignity today cloaks Holy Rosary Church in West Seattle, first Catholic church to be consecrated in all the century-old history of the Diocese of Seattle. Few edifices on the Pacific Coast have been so honored. Consecrated to the perpetual glory of God, Holy Rosary never may be put to common or profane use.

A glittering, solemn ceremony lasting two hours was conducted April 7 by the Most Rev. Thomas A. Connolly, Seattle diocesan bishop. Solemn High Mass followed, celebrated by the Rev. James Francis Lanigan, pastor of the church for 27 years and an Irish-born priest whose zeal and self-sacrifice had lifted the magnificent church from all debt, one of the requirements for consecration.

Ceremonies included a procession led by Bishop Connolly and his attendants, circling of the church three times, blessing with Gregorian water, chanting of psalms, outlining the letters of the Greek and Latin alphabets in ashes, forming a huge cross on the church nave, and anointing crosses with holy chrism. The consecrational crosses were marked, and candles affixed, to burn all day on each anniversary of the ceremonies.

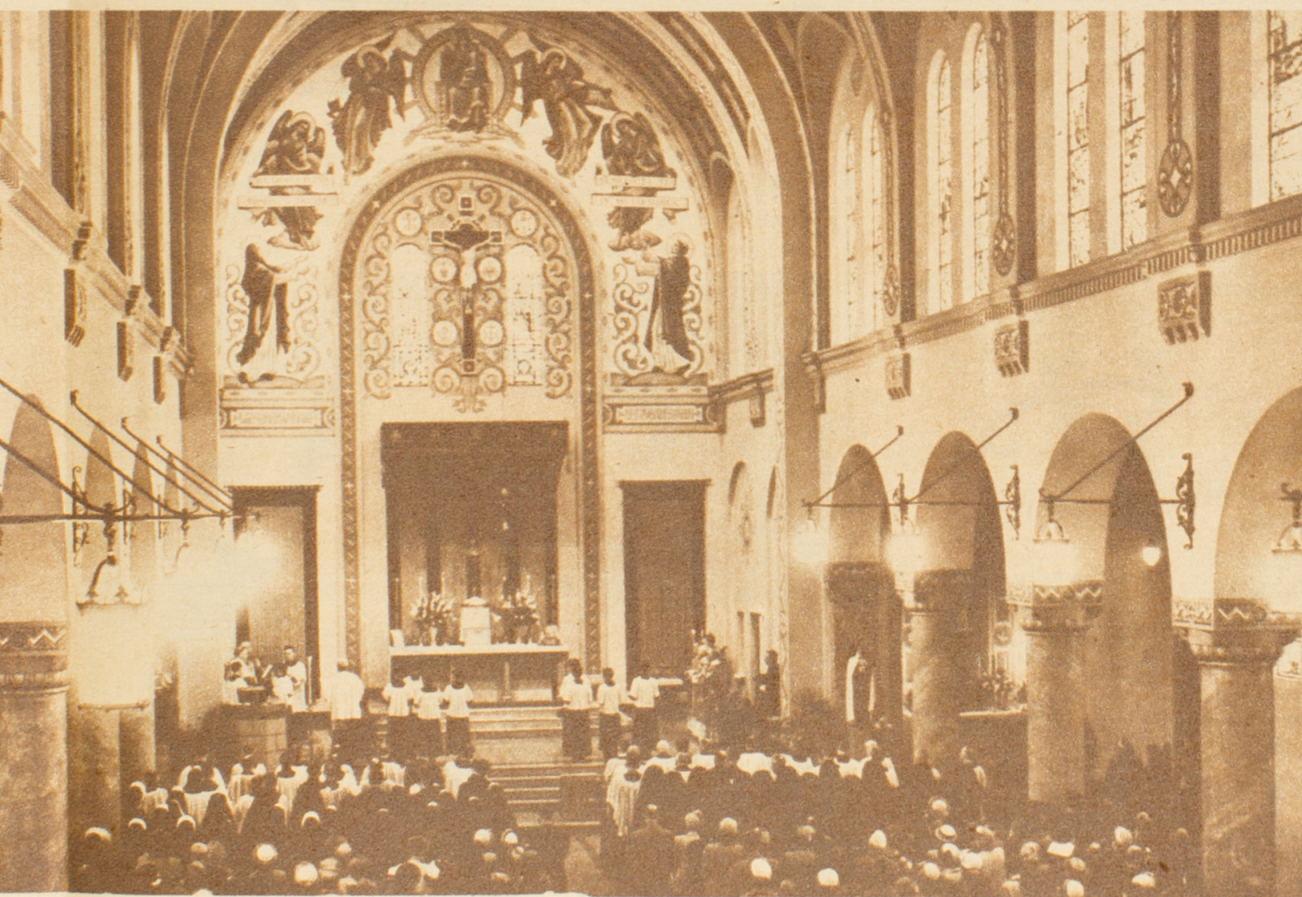

LILTING, YOUTHFUL VOICES were raised in lovely harmony as Mass was sung by the Rosarian Choir of the parish school. Behind the singers are examples of the exquisite church art at Holy Rosary, with delicate murals and gorgeous antique stained-glass windows, through which sunlight filters in rich hues.



AND COLOR always are present at Holy Rosary, for its richness is uniform. Hundreds of candles were carried into the newly consecrated edifice after the marble crosses had been anointed. Over the altar hangs a giant crucifix; above it, figures of the Virgin Mary and St. Dominic are flanked by 63 antique glass windows in the church.

Mural decorations around the altar show the Virgin Mary giving the rosary to St. Dominic and St. Catherine. Heraldic angels soar on the curves of the great arch, representing the heavenly gift. Scrolls form the Angelic Salutation: "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou amongst women," the message of the Annunciation.

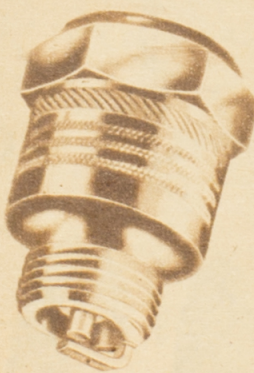

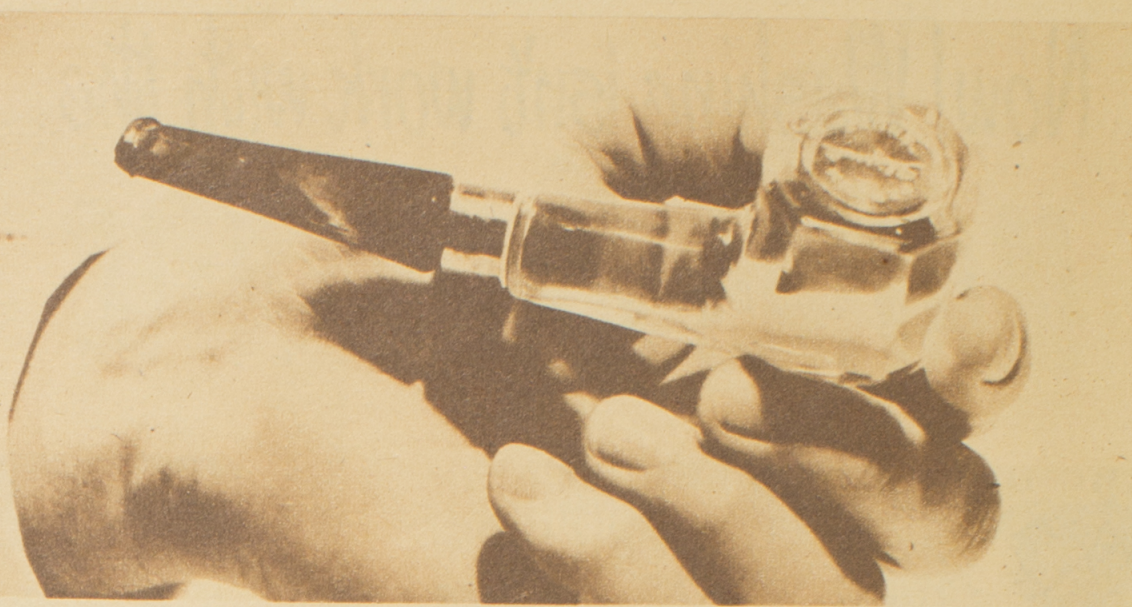

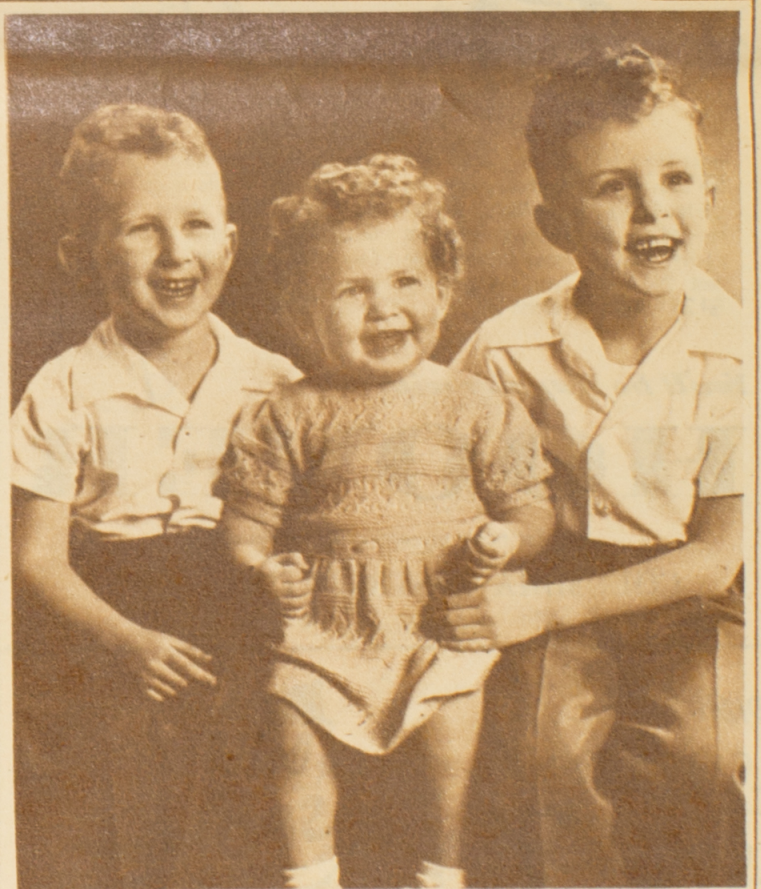
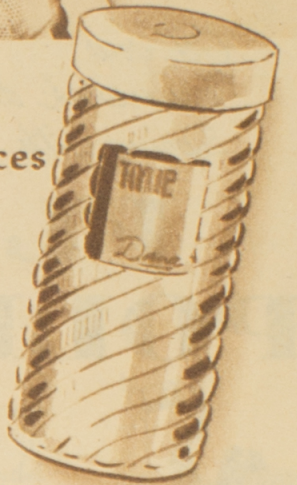
