Coupeville Festival began in 1964

The Coupeville Arts and Craft Festival, held the second week-end in August, was begun in 1964 in an effort to save and restore the historic buildings on Front Street that were threatened with demolition.

The Front Street Development, a group of people who owned buildings on Front Street, assessed the property owners \$2, and later \$5, per month for improvements. Active in the development were Walt and Peggy Sewell, owners of Front Street Antiques (now Butler's Bell); Jack and Marian Williams, owners of the Blockhouse Inn; Lucille Whelan, owner of the building that once held Lester Still's law office; Myrtle Rosenfield, who lived in the building that now houses Tartans and Tweeds; and Helen Williams who owned the Sea Gull Restaurant.

"Almost everybody on Front Street was involved," remembers Jimmie Jean Cook, local historian. Archie Poor had the barber shop in the title company building (now Kristen's Ice Cream); Lorine Kippen, the city clerk, lived in the port building; and Elmer Calhoun and his sister, Maude Atherton, lived upstairs in the Glenwood or Calhoun Hotel.

"Eric Larsen, who owned a gift shop which is now The Town Potter, was active and Dick Hansen who had the wharf and Bill Pinkston who owned the Cove were helpful," said Jimmie Jean. Easton Mudgett, a retired postmaster, sold shells in a shop on the first floor of what was recently McPherson's Confectionary. Restoring Front Street was a volunteer effort by community members.

"Evelyn Johnson didn't have an economic interest, but like the other volunteers, always put in a lot of work on the festival," recalls Maryalice Brooks.

The money earned from the assessment bought paint for the buildings, erected the fence along the water side and put in new sidewalks. "I pulled all the weeds in the street with a putty knife," Walt Sewell remembers.

Lucille Reid, broker of Baker-Reid Realty, doing her part in the preservation effort, was intent on finding buyers for the old buildings. She was also instrumental in the purchase of the Alexander Blockhouse by the Chamber of Commerce. Funds raised by the festival and chamber assured that the Blockhouse would remain in its present location. It was later deeded by the Central Whidbey Chamber of Commerce to the town of Coupeville and was recently sold to the Island County Historical Society.

After a visit to an arts and crafts festival in Bellevue, Walt Sewell proposed the idea for a similar event in Coupeville in order to further raise money for the preservation of Front Street. The vision of the festival also was to create an arena for "retired folks in the community to develop an avocation from a hobby" by having a place to sell their crafts, said Walt.

The same year, Jimmie Jean, Lila Snover, Vic Sealey, Joe Hinds and Dorothy Neil, had been in Seattle participating in a project at the site of the previous year's world's fair. Each county in the state was invited to set up a display of their area, and the group attended to represent and

promote Island County. They too felt that Coupeville would be an ideal location for an arts and crafts festival, because Oak Harbor had its Navy Days and Langley hosted the Island County Fair.

"Vic Sealey, mayor and owner of the tavern, currently known as Toby's, was a man who did things," remembers Jimmie Jean. "Vic would get people to work together. He was for anything that was good for Coupeville — very civic minded." Vic got the festival ball rolling and enlisted the help of Treva Carter to coordinate arts and crafts for the event.

"Treva should be proud of herself," said Jimmie Jean. "She did all the work and she was always a lady with good taste. She did a beautiful job."

From the beginning, the festival was a community affair. Citizens pitched in to clean out the old grey buildings, long unoccupied and run down, to make them usable for the festival. The Garden Club landscaped the hillside and volunteers painted the fence and buildings.

"Albert Heath worked out a color scheme for all the buildings," said Jimmie Jean. "They were coordinated, using no blues, so that they would show up against the blue of the water behind." And all the property owners agreed. "I remember Walt and Peggy's building was painted cream — or at least the canopy — and they had hanging baskets and a bench," reflects Jimmy Jean. "It was a very cheerful looking building."

Treva remembers, "The first year was mainly elbow grease. We tried to put something in every building to lend to the overall scene."

Some of the buildings were readied for the first festival in just three months. Lucille recalls bringing in all the "hammers, saws and ladders to fix up the old Calhoun Hotel." The main floor was used as an art gallery for the first several years until the hotel was sold. In the ensuing years the gallery has been located in the Recreation Hall.

In 1963, Holace Perry and Mickey Becker bought the two buildings that are presently The Old Town Shop, and The Knead and Feed. In the basement of the Puget Race Drugstore (The Old Town Shop), Holace and Mickey found a cobbler's bench and old wooden lasts in all shapes and sizes. (A last is a wooden form shaped like a person's foot on which shoes are made or repaired.) "I could see where one was made for someone with a deformed foot," said Holace.

For their first two years of the festival, they put the cobbler's bench in front of the store. "We borrowed a large crock from Peggy Sewell that fit down into the bench and filled it with Sarsaparilla and tea," recalled Holace. "We found the recipe in an old time recipe book and called it Cobblers Punch. We thought it was very good but the children didn't like it so well, so next year we sold Kool-Aid for 10 cents a glass." A sign, propped against the bench, read "Support your local blockhouse."

Holace remembers telling people about the lasts. "After we had moved there we found that all the people we had been talking to were born and raised there. We were new and didn't know a thing. They were so kind and listened to us."

During the third year of the festival, the Sedge Building (presently the Knead and Feed) housed the children's art and the Puget Race building housed handmade furniture and photographs. The photographer was the minister of the Methodist Church, Pastor Truman Cotten. "Every year something else was added," said Holace. "One year the art was out on the street." As the festival grew and the buildings were refurbished, "each one had something in them that pertained to Whidbey Island's early days," said Peggy Sewell

Weather was a critical element in the success of the festival and Treva remembers waking up in the morning and running to see if the skies were clear. "The weather has always been beautiful," she said. "Clear skies were always important and the weather has cooperated to this day."

The festival was a community event. "People brought their picnic tables and umbrellas. It was a pleasant experience from the beginning," said Treva.

"It shows what people in a community can do together," reflects Peggy. "It was a homey thing — it wasn't commercial." The festival was an effort by and for the local community.

To open the first day's festivities, Carolyn Hancock, the Naval Air Station Queen, arrived by boat. She was greated by well wishers bearing a bouquet of flowers. Maryalice Brooks remembers gathering all the flowers for the bouquet and her sister Jimmie Jean Cook recalls bundling them together until "it was really a weapon." Before the arrival of the Queen, Treva suggested that they remove some of the flowers. "She was very kind," says Jimmie Jean.

In the early days a platform was erected in the vacant lot across from what is now the Sea Gull Restaurant, and Kathryn Johnson brought her dance class to perform.

Carl Dean drove the antique Holsman 2 cylinder car down Front Street. "He and his wife Vera were always dressed in garb fitting for the occasion," said Hollace. (The 1902 car, once owned by Judge Still, on permanent loan to the Historical Society by Carl's children, is presently on display in the Museum Annex next to Coupeville Travel.)

The Whidbey Playhouse performers came to the festival and presented a "skit about the landing by the early timers," remembered Peggy. "People were so fascianted with it. It was typical of early days of Whidbey Island."

Some of the early craftsmen were Stan Willhight with his potters wheel, the spinners and weavers from the newly formed Whidbey Weavers Guild, a woman that cut silhouettes, and jewlery maker Orval Chatt.

The Historical Society was active in the festival and provided coffee, iced tea, lemonade and home-made pies under the old apple tree in front of the society office. "Some of the women dressed in period costumes," recalled Inger Mathews. "It was a hard job but a lot of fun. We made and sold pies the first few years but stopped when the Health Department told us we had to make the pies all in one place." The Island County Historical Society once again occupies the building located at the corner of Main and Coveland.

At the Blockhouse Inn at the head of the pier, Dick Hastie served clam chowder. "I was afraid everybody would be poisoned," said Maryalice Brooks. According to some accounts, there was reason for concern.

The Lions Club showed movies in Lindsey's Livery Stable (presently Traders Wharf). "They showed Laurel and Hardy movies for the first couple of years," reflected Jimmie Jean. Fire insurance was impossible to obtain for the old building, so the movies were discontinued.

The first and second years of the festival also boasted a street dance held in the parking lot of the shopping center on Main Street. A band was hired and "all the kids came down and danced," said Maryalice.

The posse from the Sheriff's department were on horseback to control traffic during the first years of the festival. Jimmie Jean recalls that Herschel Atherton, Maude's son, was angry that he couldn't drive his car to the hotel and that he "drove into a horse, causing the horse to have an accident on the sidewalk. I don't remember if Herschel moved his car."

Another event that Jimmy Jean remembered were the Indian canoe races in Penn Cove. "In looking out at them I thought it could have been a hundred years ago. Then someone shouted from the shore and an Indian turned and yelled, "What the h--- do you want?" Jimmy Jean was startled back to reality.

"From time to time, during the first years, Betty McPhee would come out in the street with a bull horn. Someone put a stop to that too," said Cook.

During the early days of the festival the Sportsman Club hosted a salmon derby at the Keystone ferry. Lions club members served coffee and breakfast to the sportsfishermen. "There was a puppet show in the Masonic Hall before they started putting in the quilt show," remembered Jimmie Jean.

In 1964, the first year of the festival, Vic Sealey and his wife Irene drove to Bellingham with Buzzy Stoddard and invited the Lummi Indians to bring their fish to the festival for a Salmon Bar-B-Que at Keystone.

The second year, the Bar-B-Que, sponsored by the Central Whidbey Chamber of Commerce moved to City Park. Bob and Helen Punch remember that Herb Pickard made the coleslaw for the event at Prairie Center and that Paul Walker was in charge of the cooking of the fish. Eventually the Sportsmans Club took the responsibility for the Bar-B-Que in City Park.

Booths have been set up in the street from the begining, although the number has grown from 2 to over 200. The art didn't stay in the buildings very long and was soon moved to the street.

The posters which advertised the Coupville Arts and Crafts Festival were designed by Jimmy Jean Cook. The logo incorporated the blockhouse, an Indian woman and a salmon.

"We had the communities cooperation said Holace. "A teacher at the high school got her students involved in the festival by typing the minutes of the festival meetings and running them on the ditto machine."


Alan Hancock, was a student at Coupeville High School when he first participated in the Coupeville Festival. "Our teacher, Pat Jennings, had her advanced art students enter

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
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Register now for 4-H camp

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

their work in the festival.'

But it was after selling watermelon with Dennis Argent and John Stone to raise money for a Peace Corp African School Project that Alan had the idea that would considerably change the festival. His suggestion that the concession booths be located in one area to centralize the power and electricity was a "brilliant idea," according to Holace. "Before that the booths were every which way. He knew that people wanted to find the coffee next to the hamburgers." That move stabilized the concessions and the festival grew.


It grew even more as the festival organizers enlisted involvement from artists and craftspeople who were non-island residents. Holace remembers going with Betty McPhee to the "Anacortes Arts and Crafts Festival, which was a week before ours, and inviting the craftspeople to attend our festival."

Twenty-four years has brought a lot of changes to the festival, but the spirit of a community project, and the original intention to provide an arena for local artists and craftspeople to display their wares is uppermost. Coupeville still offers one of the few non-juried shows in the area.

"The locals didn't envision the festival to become as successful as it has," said Treva. "It's always been well received and the craftsmen were always there to contribute to it."

Since the time it's started, all the buildings have become occupied and the streets are filled. "Sometimes it's even hard to find a place to park," remarked Treva. "The island attracts creative people because of the slower pace."

The festival was always a rewarding experience for Treva. "Those people were wonderful to work with because they had a vision. They wanted Front Street to become restored and to become an interest to tourists and local people alike." They have succeeded.

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
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McCann flashes his colorful silks

the last few years. The most successful runner from his seven stall barn at the track is unquestionably Kent Green. The 5-year-old has won four stakes and earned over \$130,000 since he started running in 1985.

A native of Renton, McCann grew up with nine brothers and sisters on a dairy farm that is now the site of the Renton shopping center. His father T. J. McCann introduced his family - a small brood of nine brothers and sisters - to Longacres when he claimed a horse nearly 25 years ago.

Mike played basketball and football throughout high school and college, and also worked at Longacres as a groom for trainer Glen Williams during the early 1960s.

Drive safely over holiday

Between 400 and 500 people may die in traffic accidents this Memorial Day weekend, according to the Evergreen Safety Council. The three-day holiday begins at 6 p.m. Friday, May 22 and ends at midnight Monday, May 25.

An additional 18,000 to 23,000 people may suffer disabling injuries in motor vehicle accidents during the holiday.

To help reduce the number of tragic accidents, the Evergreen Safety Council offers the following driving tips:

— If you drink alcoholic beverages, do not drive. Use the 'Designated Driver' program where one person in a group refrains from drinking and is then responsible for driving the others home safely.

— Have your vehicle inspected before going on any long distance trips. Special attention should be given to the brakes, tires, and cooling system. Switch drivers periodically during extended trips or, if you travel alone, stop when you become drowsy.

- Fasten your safety belt and make sure all passengers do the

same. Children should be securely fastened in child safety seats.






