

The Ladies Aid Society of Oak Harbor are talking of devoting what funds they have toward building a social hall on a lot donated by Mr. Ely near the public school building. The hall will be large enough to accommodate church services and Sunday school as well as social occasions. Feb. 23—a subscription is in circulation this week for aid in building a social hall. "We the undersigned, agree to subscribe the amount set opposite our names toward building a social hall in the town of Oak Harbor, to be held in trust by some responsible person to be selected by the Ladies Aid Society of Oak Harbor, to be transferred to the town of Oak Harbor when incorporated. The purposes of the hall are for all sociable events".

March 15 1912—The commercial club of Oak Harbor—100 or more members—proposed a lighting system for Oak Harbor, among the best is a kerosene-burning lamp at a cost of about \$1.50. Also suggested having a ferry across Deception Pass.

March 22—The new high school \$9,500, will be completed and ready for occupancy about June 1.

McCrehan home (hotel run by Mrs. McCrehan) building now owned by Tom Cleveland behind Union Oil, 1966) Moved it up from main street. Mrs. Hamilton rebuilt it completely in late thirties. Steamer Calista was a new boat, run by Capt. Arnold (father of Warner Arnold)
