REPORT OF PHILADELPHIA STEAM CAR MEET

On October 11, 1941, a beautiful Saturday afternoon, 33 people from all walks of life met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hyde W. Ballard. Merion (Philadelphia). Pa., for our first Steam Car Meet.

Four cars were there - a 1903 Locomobile in working order, Mr. Mershon's most interesting coal-fired Steamer, Deneale Hunter's 5-passenger Stanley, driven down from Hackensack, N. J. in record time, and last but not least the finest operating and best looking Stanley in America, Hyde Ballard's Model 740 Touring.

Following an afternoon of real enjoyment, riding in and driving the cars, becoming acquainted with one another, etc., the group adjourned for a banquet and business meeting at which President Spence presided. The following business was transacted:

As a "Get Acquainted" feature, short talks or self-introductions from everyone present were given. Especially interesting was the description by Mr. Sprinkle of his new car, now ready for the road, and Eugene Goodwin's talk of his visits with Steam men from California to Maine. Last, but most interesting of all was Mrs. Harvey Gowing's witty description of her 10 years experience driving Stanleys, "Never A Dull Moment".

Mr. John Lincoln showed samples of the printing and described at length the magazine, "New Steam Age", which he is to publish. Mr. Lincoln had a splendid background of experience in the publishing field, and in addition is a trained and capable engineer.

His publication is the fruit of about two years of spare time work and investigation. This has more or less been forced upon him for immediate action by many of his friends and by actual cash subscriptions before the first issue is out. This shows the real need for a magazine published in this country to keep us all up to date on Steam developments.

It was the concensus of the meeting that every possible support should be given such an effort and that everyone who is a member of the Steam Motor Association should surely an ellott aim that everyone who is a member of the Schem North Scholarston Shock to Scholarston Schola official organ.

Mr. Davis led a general discussion on the name to be chosen for the organization. Finally chosen was "THE STEAM MOTOR ASSOCIATION".

Discussed were the regional groups, how they would operate, and the functions which the various officers would have. Mr. Stevenson's selection was defined as National Vice President. Mr. Goodell's selection was defined as New England Vice President. Elected Vice President of the Association and head of the Philadelphia Regional Group was the very capable Hyde Ballard, whose choice was unanimous.

Following this there was a considerable discussion of dues, suggestions for Constitution and By-Laws, etc., out of which resulted the appointment of the following committec on Constitution, By-Laws and Dues:

It was voted to have the Treasurer pay any expenses such as postage, paper and printing which have been incurred to date by Mr. Spence.

At this time in the evening, the meeting was adjourned, but unofficially re-convened in the door yard in order to give Hyde Ballard free advice on how to light the main burner and raise steam from 300 to 500 pounds."
