of these are known and alterations are of no great importance.

On the first floor, an office was built for Captain Watlington by enclosing part of the back porch and adding a bay to the side. A small outside porch provided private entrance to the office from the street. Later, the other end of the porch was enclosed. A second porch (screened) was later added on other side.

Originally the front porch rail had rectangular ballusters, but these have been replaced by simple cross supports. DURING W.WIT? I

HISTORICAL EVENTS AND PERSONS ASSOCIATED WITH BUILDING

Captain Watlington was one of the early settlers and prominent figures in maritime activities. A fine pilot, he was in command of not only merchant ships but wrecking vessels as well.
