SMALL GRANTS AWARDS

The Small Grants Committee - John Weachter, Rose Marie Barrett and Betsy Dietz - recommended the awarding of four "Small Grants" this past grant cycle. \$2500 awards were presented to the Key West Botanical Garden for protection of existing endangered species at the Stock Island gardens, the Bahama Conch Community Land Trust of Key West for the preservation of the historic finishes at the Lofton Sands Bahamian Museum and Resource Center at 324 Truman Ave. and St. Mary's Star of the Sea Catholic Church for the planning phase of the restoration of St. Mary's auditorium. A \$1000 grant was awarded to the Harry S Truman Little White House Museum for the restoration of the porte-cocheres at the main entrance to the museum.

The Small Grants Program has, since this award cycle, been absorbed by a more complete Grant Program which will assess and present for consideration to the Board all preservation grant applications.

GARDEN REVAMP BEGINS

With \$16,000 in hand, proceeds from last spring's Black and White Ball, the museum committee has begun a major refurbishment of the gardens of the Oldest House Museum. Momy Ortiz-Benavides, board member and designer, has spent many hours developing a general plan for replanting several overgrown or under-planted areas of the garden, enlisting the aid of OIRF members Kitty Clements and Barry Archung.

Joe Miller of Miller's Fantastic Foliage has been contracted to undertake the project, which includes raising the rear lawn area to the height of the brick walkway. Miller assures that the project will be completed by the end of August. Miller is installing an irrigation system for the entire property as well as rearranging some of the current plants and supplying new additions. Among the plantings proposed for the garden are a Royal Palm, Cardboard Palms, Silver Saw Palmettos, Jamaican Capers, Yellow Elder, Giant Crinum Lillies, Keys Thatch Palms, a Silver Buttonwood, Coco Plums and several varieties of colorful bushes.

The final phase of the project will upgrade and add to the lighting plan for the area.

Hal Walsh, museum committee chairman, plans to produce a garden layout to add to our brochure identifying flora and fauna.

WELCOME NEW BOARD MEMBERS

Richard Moody-"Sax Man" has returned to the board and jumped right in to chair the new Education Committee, a fitting position for a Man of the Year for Education Programs (in commercial art), an honor from Orlando area Advertising Federation Assoc. Dick's artistic talents are legion in Key West, corroborated by the recent first place awarded at Hemingway Days' "Paint Your Wagon" contest for his "Pepper Car." He will be teaching commercial art (noncomputerized) at FKAA this winter while also putting together a preservation lecture series and planning a photo documentation of Bahama Village for OIRF, a typical winter for the man who says, "I'm full of ideas; just need a place to use them."

Paula Newhouse- Paula returns to OIRF to take charge of the volunteers for the annual House and Garden Tours, a position she has held so ably in the past. She is a fifth generation Conch and has managed her own and her family's commercial properties in the downtown area for several years. She is a top producing Realtor with Coldwell Banker Schmitt Real Estate and is active in the Key West Sunrise Rotary, Monroe County Leadership and the Panhellenic Sorority Association. 
