Descartes believes that some ideas are innate, some from the outside, and still some are the combination of both. He ~~to~~ decides to consider these ideas proceeding from external objects and to find out what ~~they~~ are the reasons which cause him to think that these ideas of things (which he has) are similar to things ~~itself~~ themselves. He believes that if the things outside are not caused by his imagination for when ~~he~~ feel ~~hot~~ the fire make him feel hot, ~~the fire~~ ~~(object)~~ the feeling of heat is imprinted on him involuntarily whether he likes it or not. Nature works the same way; however, nature can ~~to~~ lead man astray because in ~~chose~~ the active choosing between vice and virtue, Descartes thinks that most men would choose the former. Perhaps we only imagine the existence of these external objects ~~which~~ of which we have ideas, and even if these ideas he has do proceed from the external objects, which are different from himself, it still does not prove that the ~~has~~ idea he has resemble any objects in nature.
