COMPETITIVE DRILL TO BE HELD SUNDAY

**"Bill" Anahu Will Substitute
In Major Carroll's Place At
Next Dress Parade**

Battalion parade will be held at K. S. B. on Sunday afternoon, February 2. The parade will include retreat and company competitive drill. William Anahu will be acting major in place of James Carroll, who went to the equatorial islands. Rodney Burgess will be acting adjutant. Theodore Awana will be captain of Company A; Irving Maby, captain of Company B; William Toomey, captain of Company C; and Archie Ching, captain of the First company. The company competitive drill consists of these movements: Squads right column right; right oblique and halt; to the rear march twice; squads right and halt; left by squads; squads left about; on left into line and halt; right by squads; squads left; squads left column left; right front into line and halt; company left and the manuals.

The points for the best company cup will be based on the points of the company competitive drill and the best line—for the drill: 5 points for first place, 3 for second, and 1 for third; for the best line: 3 points for the best, and 1 for second.

The First company is leading with three points and Company C is second with one point. These points were won at the Founders day parade on December 15, 1935.

The uniform will be gray coats and white trousers.

Arthur Harris Tells Of Trip To Beautiful Island Of Pacific

(This is a continuation of a series of articles told by Arthur Harris, high-eleventh grader, who recently returned from the equatorial islands and the South Seas.)

"The island of Swain is about the size of the campus of the three schools combined—Kapalama, Kala-kaea, and Kamehameha School for Boys—and is densely covered with coconut trees, pandanus or lauhala trees, plumeria shrubs, banana trees, papaya trees, and other tropical shrubs one would expect on a tropical island. The grass houses are constructed in Samoan-Hawaiian structure, lying peacefully under the coconut palms. The island is teeming with pigs, chickens, and birds; the waters are filled with fish, all of which are unmolested by man. The natives, with rings in their ears and noses, are happy and carefree. This is what one finds on Swain island—little known, but a pearl of the South Seas.

"Copra is the only source of income which the inhabitants depend upon. Exchange comes in form of the old-time bartering, for what good would money be to those who have never known money well enough to realize its value?

"The natural characteristics of this island are similar to most of the islands of the South Seas. It is low

Tournament Is To Be Held For Revival Of Old Hawaiian Games

A tournament of Hawaiian sports to be held this spring is being planned by the student Hawaiian clubs of several of the Honolulu schools. The Hui O'iwi at Kamehameha Boys' School is actively preparing for this competition and is interested in promoting Hawaiian games in the other schools as well.

The Kamehameha boys began their revival of the old games with a program and demonstration before the student body. Mr. Charles Kenn, who has made an intensive study of Hawaiian recreation, explained the rules of several games. The members of the Hui O'iwi, using the sports implements, demonstrated the correct method of play.

Each Friday afternoon a different play group is instructed in one of the games. The first game taken up was the ulu maika, or rolling the stone disc. This is rolled for distance, or rolled down the course between paired stakes to show the skill of the play. It is hoped that this game will prove so interesting that the boys will play it during their free after-noon periods.

Another sport to be revived is Kaka laau or fencing with a short spear, which is still enjoyed on other South Pacific islands. Uma and pa

uma, which test the strength of the contestants' wrists and his quickness, will probably be popular games.

A dozen or more additional games and amusements are being considered and will be introduced if they prove sufficiently interesting. Mr. Donald Mitchell, leader of the Hui O'iwi, is directing the Hawaiian sports activities.

Those interested in Hawaiian sports believe that the old games can be revived and will be popular as soon as the young people become familiar with them. Surfing, which is now Waikiki's most popular sport, had become a nearly forgotten sport until it was revived and encouraged by the Outrigger Canoe club about twenty years ago. The same may be true of many other Hawaiian sports, and the initiative for reviving them should be taken by the young men and boys of Hawaiian blood. The equipment needed for Hawaiian games is simple and easy to obtain. The sports are adapted to the climate of Hawaii. There are amusements suited to men, women, and children. The games which thrilled the thousands of spectators at the Makahiki festivals of old Hawaii will surely hold an appeal for the people of today.
