

WOMAN INJURED IN CYCLE SPILL

In a motorcycle spill on the Kaula highway near the blowhole about 3:30 this morning, Mrs. Raizer Moore, who gave a downtown hotel address, received a broken foot.

She was riding on a motorcycle operated by John T. Wright of the USS Deal, Pearl Harbor. The motorcycle hit a bump, spilling both riders. He was hurt slightly. She is confined in the Queen's hospital.

Youth Asks for Jail Term; Gets 3 Months

Had as conditions may be in the city-county jail, some persons would rather be confined there than live on the outside.

Samuel Pirau, 22, approached Officer Daniel Toomey Thursday afternoon and asked to be arrested. He said he was released from jail three weeks ago and had been unable to find work. He had slept on piers and in parks and had had little to eat.

He said he wanted to go to jail for three months. "All attempts to change his mind were without result, hence his arrest," wrote the policeman in his report.

Pirau was arraigned in district court Friday. He pleaded guilty to vagrancy. Wendell Brooks, assistant prosecutor, explained Pirau's strange request.

Judge Charles Hogg obliged him by sentencing him to three months in jail.

YOUTHS NAMED FOR LINE ISLES

Names of 12 youths who will depart from Honolulu on the coast guard cutter Roger B. Taney November 25 as replacement personnel for American colonists on equivalent islands were announced today by Richard B. Black, field representative of the department of interior.

Simultaneously army authorities revealed the names of three officers who will accompany the line island cruise.

Prospective colonists selected by Mr. Black are Melvin, Paas, Fred Wilhelm, Bernard Akana, L. Walcott, William Taylor, Francis Lee, Kuni Foa, Eugene Burke, Lawrence Chang, Charles Kelliey, Henry F. Flakowski and Francis Stillman.

Mr. Kelley and Mr. Flakowski are radio operators. The former will be assigned to Canton island, the latter to Howland.

Mr. Stillman and one other colonist will be left on the islands only if services are required.

Others are definite replacements. Capt. James B. Newman Jr. of Lt. Frank H. Stearns and Lt. Merwin L. Carter will join the cruise, according to announcements by army authorities.

Mr. Black said Maj. James C. Van Hook, aerologist, will accompany the cruise to inspect aerological conditions on the islands.

Capt. Newman, Mr. Black said, will inspect other equipment on the islands. Lts. Shepardson and Carter, he said, are making the trip at their own request as un-aided observers.

The Taney's itinerary, Mr. Black said, will include stops at Howland, Baker, Canton, Enderbury and Jarvis in that order. He said stops probably will be made at Palmyra and at Fanning island.

A call at the latter island, he said, has been requested by the Fanning residents through the British consul in Honolulu.

The coast guard cutter, commanded by Cmdr. Eugene A. Coffin, will depart from the Standard Oil dock at 5 p. m. Friday.




