5 Injured In Traffic Here

Five persons were injured over the weekend as a dozen minor traffic accidents were reported by police investigators in Honolulu. The number will be increased when reports come in today from the rural stations.

The accident causing two to be injured occurred on Kam Highway near the Pearl Harbor spur Saturday when a light car in which Forrest R. McDowell, 30, Hickam Field, was riding, and driven by Val Lee, USN, skidded, and turned turtle. Police said they had been told that further reports would be available today.

On Saturday at 1:37 p. m., at North Beretania st. and College Walk, a car driven by Valeriano Casumpang, 43, hit a pedestrian. Chink Akana, 42, sending him to the hospital for treatment. The victim has possibly a fractured rib and abrasions to the right elbow.

Pedestrian Charged Casumpang said he did not see Akana until too late to stop his car. He was charged with violating the right of way of a pedestrian.

Another pedestrian was hit, this time by an HRT bus, at 3:03 p. m. Saturday, when Earl W. Trotter, 27, walked out from behind a parked car near the curb. He was not badly hurt, and police gave the bus driver, William Lee, a clean bill of health, but charged the pedestrian with jay walking.

Thomas J. Ellison, 31, 761 Sunset Ave., drove his coupe off the pavement on Dillingham Blvd. near Hauuli st., at 6:50 a. m. Saturday, and landed in the dirt after striking an electric light pole. Ellison at the Emergency hospital told police he did not remember what had happened.

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Isle Colonizers To Honor Trio Who Died In Memorial

A memorial in Honolulu in memory of three of their number—two of them killed by Japanese bombs in December, 1941—was dedicated yesterday by the members of Hui Kupa Aina, an organization of some 80 local men who aided in colonizing Baker, Jarvis and Howland islands.

The memorial plan was organized at a reunion of the group at the home of Cmdr. Richard B. Black, 4396 Kakaia Ave. In addition, members who took part in the colonization from 1935-42 have decided to bring back the remains of Joseph Keliiananiani and Richard Whaley to Hawaii after the war. They were killed by bombing at Howland Island. The third name to be honored, Carl Kahalewai, is that of an expedition member who died at a later date.

As a part of its plan, the group would like to attach plaques to lighthouses on the islands in honor of the trio.

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Huge 200,000-acre Forest Fire In Oregon Still Unabated

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (UP)—One of the worst forest fires in the history of the Pacific Northwest raged on out of control in western Oregon today. New fires are breaking out on the vast 200,000-acre circle of blackened timbers and smoking ruins.

Slight encouragement came to 2,000 weary fire fighters last night when winds lessened and humidity rose, but the flames continued out of hand this morning.

The fire line between Portland and the coast, mainly in Tillamook county, site of the all-time record fire of 1933, when 240,000 acres were burned. With no improvement in weather predicted, it appeared certain the 1945 fire would break all records as it neared the end of the third week. More than 2,000 civilians, soldiers and sailors were on the fire lines.

Reckless Started Three lives have been lost and crew retreated in many cases where stoutly-held fire lines were crossed by new outbreaks.

Western Oregon was covered by a pal of smoke which obscured the sun. The towns of Forest Grove and Hillsboro had their water supplies threatened.

Situation 'Definitely Bad' State Forester Mel Rogers termed the fire situation "definitely bad" and said only rain would end the threat of wider damage. The first stages of the fire were in second growth and underbrush on the same of the 1933 and 1939 burns.

crews were winning a fight to save the Consolidated Timber Co.'s plant near Glenwood.

One arm of the fire raced north into Clatsop county and the southern and eastern fronts spread 25 miles south, in Washington county. A huge backfire operation was being tried in southern Tillamook county in an effort to block off the flames.
