## Isle Colonizers To Honor Trio Who Died In Memorial

A memorial in Honolulu in memory of three of their number—two of them killed by Japanese bombs in December, 1941—was decided upon yesterday by the members of the Hawaiian Islands organization of some 80 local men who aided in colonizing Baker, Jarvis and Round Island.

The memorial plan was organized at a reunion of the group at the home of Cmdr. Richard B. Black, 4386 Kahala Ave. In addition to those who took part in the colonization of the islands, the members have decided to bring back the remains of Joseph Kihlmann and Richard L. Johnson, who died after the war. They were killed by bombing at Baker Island. Their names are to be honored. Capt. Kababana is their last expedition member who died at later date.

As a part of its plan, the group would like to add a lighthouse to lighthouses on the islands in honor of hand that morning.

## Huge 200,000-acre Forest Fire In Oregon Still Unabated

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (UPI)—One of the worst forest fires in the history of the Pacific Northwest raged out of control in western Oregon yesterday. New fires breaking out on the west 200,000-acre circle of blackwood timber and smoking ruins.
