## P. Y. Chong Slates Opening Of Renovated Waikiki Unit

A 10-year plan of improvements that came to fruition in nine years will be celebrated tomorrow night by P. Y. Chong with a gala opening of his renovated and enlarged Waikiki Lau Yee Chai. The event was to have been celebrated on Dec. 21 of this year, but progress has made it possible to put the celebration forward 10 months.

Those who are fortunate enough to be guests of "Me-P. Y. Chong, Number One China Cook, Allsame Big Boss" tomorrow night will find his Waikiki service a rendezvous for the epicure and the connoisseur of art. "P. Y.", as he is affectionately known to several generations of island residents, is famous for good food. With the opening of his Waikiki restaurant in 1929 he became equally famous for his collection of Chinese art objects.

Now, in the new and larger Waikiki home, his reputation will be enhanced on both scores. Private attraction for the tourist and kamaaina as well will be the garden which is now opened permanently to all visitors. Then there is the dance floor that is set on springs.

New Bar Featured  
A new and amplified orchestra will provide songs of the islands as well as the latest music in Honolulu. One of the features is the new marble bar, given the name "Allsame Big Boss" for year-round comfort a complete air conditioning plant has been installed to maintain a constant, pleasant atmosphere.

For those who would like to serve Lau Yee Chai foods in their own homes at luncheons, suppers and dinners there is a food shop with P. Y. Chong's specialties ready to take out. P. Y. Chong came to Honolulu in 1917 from the Shekai district of Canton. In 1925 he opened a small restaurant on Hotel street. He served good food but his little place had no glamor and failed after three months. He tried again in 1928 in Tin Can alley. In several months word spread around of the genuine quality that was being put into the strange dishes he served there. Business increased and he moved to Beretania street.

For the next six years the popularity of this restaurant increased by leaps and bounds. There seemed to be good opportunity for a branch at Waikiki and on Dec. 21, 1929 "P. Y." opened on the site of the present block-wide structure but with a place that housed only 14 tables.

Success was immediate. It was then that "P. Y." made his ten year plan of improvements and the first step was creation of his rock garden that some day is destined to be the Temple grounds for his family.

Tomorrow night Lau Yee Chai at Waikiki will start on its second ten year plan of growing with Honolulu. The downtown headquarters, moved to Hotel street in 1932, continues to be heartily patronized. And over both establishments "P. Y." keeps a watchful eye as he plans bigger and better ideas for serving his famous foods in an atmosphere of Chinese artistry.

## Regiment Parades Without Officers
