Heat Increases As CROPPAGE ESTIMATED AT 300 MILLIONS

Mercury Continues to Rise From East Coast To Rockies; No Relief Seen

Record High Temperatures Reported; Fire, Lightning, Hail Add To Destruction

NEW YORK, July 10. (AP)—The thermometer registered 96 degrees at noon today, bringing some slight relief from the all-time record high of 102.3 degrees at noon Thursday.

However, several persons died of the heat in the metropolitan area and numerous prostrations were reported. In one case, 75 woman seamstresses working on a WPA project were unable to withstand the heat and collapsed.

CHICAGO, July 10. (AP)—The roasting east and the parched west suffered further heavy punishment today as the eighth successive day of suffocating heat encompassed most of the United States and much of Canada.

Upwards of 375 deaths in the past four days were attributed to the heat. Crop damage already estimated at \$300,000,000 continued to increase. New record records were established from the Mississippi valley to the Atlantic.

High marks established included the following readings at noon: Bowling Green, Ohio, 108; Cumberland Md., 107; Jamestown, N. D., 107; Richmond, Va., 104; Baltimore, Md., 104; Chicago, 102.

Thermometers in most of the states from the east coast to the Rockies went even higher than in the seven preceding days of record breaking temperatures. There was no relief in sight for the millions of stricken sufferers.

Struck down by the broiling rays of the sun, or drowned while trying to escape momentarily from the terrible heat, a total of more than 200 persons had died up until this noon since the heat wave began.

Crop losses amounted to a sum too large to be estimated, as wheat and corn burned up in the prairie states and garden crops were destroyed in other areas.

Forest fires scoured thousands of acres of wooded land, sweeping through the dried trees at terrific speed. In some few states, where the heat spell was broken momentarily by storms, large damage was done by lightning and hail.
