Mr. Don Mitchell, a faculty member of the Kamehameha Schools. gives a vivid account of his adventures with several other men and Kamehameha school alumni and students on the trip to the South Sea islands.

"I found all the colonists well and happy, and I could not interest them to return to civilization. I am very glad that I made this trip," said Mr.

At Palmyra, Mr. Judd and I took the boys to collect specimens for the Museum. We all had great fun Museum. catching giant coconut crabs, land crabs and gathering plants and insect specimens. "I caught a yellow-billed booby and tried to establish an inter-island communication there, but it did not work. There are many thousands of birds on this island.

"We left Archie Ching and Samuel K. Kalama on Baker with Abraham Piianaia in charge. "James Kamakaiwi and Killarney

Opiopio waded out on the Howland shoal to help us beach our boat.

"All the boys were examined by Major Porterfield of the Schofield Medical Staff and Dr. Meyer of the Itasca. These two men pronounced that our boys were in perfect phy-

sical condition.

"Was left William Anahu and William Toomey on Howland with James Kamakaiwi in charge. Since all the kamaainas insisted on remaining on these islands it was necessary to bring back Arthur Har-ris and Elmer Williamson. These boys were later sent on another trip."
